

(b) without affixing an adhesive revenue stamp as aforesaid, cause the document to be franked with the amount of duty payable in respect of such document together with the date of franking; or

(c) without affixing an adhesive revenue stamp, or without franking, as aforesaid, cause the document to be stamped with a metal stamp bearing the date of stamping thereon and the document shall also bear in writing as close to the impression of such metal stamp as possible a statement of the amount of the duty and the Collector's signature.

Exemptions.

(2) adhesive revenue stamps for bills of exchange (over-printed with the letters "B. of E."), for contract notes (over-printed with the words "Contract Note") and for receipts shall be sold to the public by the Collector as required.

Requisition for "B. of E." and "Contract Note" stamps.

4. (1) Adhesive revenue stamps over-printed with the letters "B. of E." or over-printed with the words "Contract Note" may be obtained on requisition at the Stamp Office.

Receipt stamps.

(2) Duty stamps for receipts shall be sold without over-printing.

Use of "B. of E." and other stamps.

5. (1) Adhesive revenue stamps for use on bills of exchange, circular notes, letters of credit, travellers' cheques, exchange contract cancellation notes, telegraphic transfer advices, promissory notes drawn out of the Colony and on the instruments specified in Heading No. 41 of the Schedule to the Stamp Ordinance, 1921, shall be over-printed with the letters "B. of E."

(2) Adhesive revenue stamps for use on bought and sold notes (in respect of the purchase or sale of shares) specified in Heading No. 40(1) of the Schedule to the Ordinance, shall be over-printed with the words "Contract Note."

Bills of exchange drawn on current accounts outside the Colony.

6. Bills of exchange, payable on demand, drawn within the Colony, by persons who are not bankers, on current accounts kept by such persons with bankers outside the Colony shall be exempt from duty unless actually paid or indorsed or in some manner negotiated within the Colony, and if so paid or indorsed or negotiated within the Colony shall be chargeable with a duty of 15 cents, to be paid before such payment, indorsement or negotiation by means of adhesive revenue stamps.

7. A coupon for interest on a marketable security as defined by the Stamp Ordinance, 1921, being one of a set of coupons, whether issued with the security or subsequently issued in a sheet, shall not be chargeable with any stamp duty. Coupons for interest on marketable securities.

8. The regulations made under the Ordinance and set forth on pages 937-939 of Volume III of the Regulations of Hong Kong (1937 Edition) are hereby revoked. Repeal.

REGULATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Bills of Sale (Fees) Regulations, 1950.

2. The fees to be taken by the Registrar under the Ordinance shall be as follows—

1. On filing a bill of sale and affidavit therewith. \$4.00
2. On filing an affidavit of re-registration of a bill of sale or any other such document 8.00
3. For an official certificate of the result of a search in one name in any register or index under the custody of the Registrar of bills of sale 4.00
4. For every additional name, if included in the same certificate 1.50
5. For a duplicate copy or certificate, for each folio of 72 words50
6. For a continuation search if made within 14 days of the date of the official certificate (the result to be endorsed on such certificate). 1.50
7. For an affidavit verifying satisfaction 4.00
8. For a summons 6.00
9. For entering a memorandum of satisfaction. 4.00

3. These regulations are wholly in replacement of the table of fees contained in the Second Schedule to the Ordinance.



VEHICLE AND ROAD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE, 1947.
REGULATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 3 of the Vehicle and Road Traffic Ordinance, 1947, the Governor in Council has made the following regulations—

REGULATIONS

- 1.** These regulations may be cited as the Vehicle and Road Traffic (Amendment) (No. 2) Regulations, 1950, and shall be read as one with the Vehicle and Traffic Regulations, 1912, set forth in Volume II of the Regulations of Hong Kong (1937 Edition), hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations.

Citation.
- 2.** Regulation 89 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by the addition of the following at the end thereof—

“In proceedings under this regulation against a licensee for allowing his private vehicle to be used for the purpose of hire, the onus shall be upon the licensee to satisfy the Court that he was not aware and had no reasonable ground for believing that his vehicle was being used for the purpose of hire.”

Amendment of regulation 89 of the principal regulations.
- 3.** Regulation 124 of the principal regulations is hereby rescinded.

Rescission of regulation 124 of the principal regulations.
- 4.** Regulation 128 of the principal regulations is hereby rescinded and replaced as follows:—

“**128.** Except with the permission in writing of the Commissioner of Police, motor vehicles (laden and unladen) of weights in excess of the maxima shown in the following table opposite the respective types of tyres shall not be used on the roads in the districts indicated in the headings of the second, third, fourth and fifth columns of the table—

This regulation shall not apply to motor omnibuses: see regulation 184."

Rescission and replacement of paragraph 1 of Schedule F of the principal regulations.

5. Paragraph 1 of Schedule F of the principal regulations is hereby rescinded and replaced as follows—


"1. Weight—(a) The total weight laden and complete for service shall not exceed—

- (i) in the city of Victoria, 12 tons;
- (ii) in Kowloon, 10 tons;
- (iii) in the island of Hong Kong outside the city of Victoria and in the New Territories, 5 tons.

(b) The weight on any one axle shall not exceed—

- (i) in the city of Victoria, 9½ tons;
- (ii) in Kowloon, 6 tons;

(c) In calculating the total weight laden, the weight of each passenger, of the driver and of the conductor shall be deemed to be 100 lbs."



by the Director of Commerce and Industry, import any automatic
machine into the Colony.



of any person or thing placed thereon, or for the purpose of

The effect of the above amendment is to delete from the form of Game Licence issued under the Wild Birds Ordinance, 1922, the condition exempting the licensee from the provisions of section 4 of the Arms and Ammunition Ordinance, 1933.

The above amendment is consequential upon the enactment of the Arms and Ammunition (Amendment) Ordinance, 1950, which (*inter alia*) authorizes the Commissioner of Police, in his discretion, to grant to any person a written exemption from the necessity to obtain a licence to carry or have in his possession or under his control arms or ammunition.

Any person who holds a Game Licence under the Wild Birds Ordinance, 1922, is under an obligation to obtain a licence under section 4 of the Arms and Ammunition Ordinance, 1933, unless under section 2 of the latter Ordinance he obtains a written exemption from the Commissioner of Police.



(1) All stalls shall be let by the Council without fine or premium, from month to month, at a rent to be ascertained by sealed tender; but the Council shall not be bound to accept the highest or any tender. No person under the age of 18 years shall be eligible to tender or be accepted as a lessee or joint lessee of a stall.

(2) If a market is closed by the Council, the Council may in its discretion reserve and allot to lessees of the closed market stalls in any other market.

(3) The Council may, if satisfied that such a course is equitable to the persons concerned, include the names of several persons not exceeding four in number as joint lesses of a stall.

(4) Stalls shall be used for the retail sale (unless otherwise decided by the Council) of specified commodities."





4. Anchorage fees shall be paid in arrear at the end of each calendar month, or, in respect of vessels clearing port, at the time clearance is granted.

Exemptions.

5. (1) No anchorage fees shall be paid in respect of—
- (a) British and foreign ships of war;
 - (b) vessels of primitive construction, including junks;
 - (c) vessels normally operating solely within the waters of the Colony;
 - (d) vessels equipped to the satisfaction of the Director of Marine as cable ships and based on Hong Kong;
 - (e) vessels equipped to the satisfaction of the Director of Marine as salvage vessels and based on Hong Kong.
- (2) Exemption from payment of anchorage fees will be granted in respect of any day during which a vessel chargeable with anchorage fees—
- (a) lies in a naval anchorage;
 - (b) lies at a government mooring buoy;
 - (c) lies at a private mooring buoy;
 - (d) lies at a private wharf or shipyard;
 - (e) undergoes repairs;
 - (f) undergoes survey.
- (3) As regards the initial stay of 30 consecutive days referred to in regulation 2, if on any day during that period the vessel—
- (a) lies in a naval anchorage;
 - (b) lies at a government mooring buoy;
 - (c) lies at a private mooring buoy;
 - (d) lies at a private wharf or shipyard;
 - (e) undergoes repairs;
 - (f) undergoes survey,

then, any such day shall be discounted so that the initial stay be correspondingly extended.

(4) Any claim for exemption must be established to the satisfaction of the Director of Marine.

FERRIES ORDINANCE, 1917.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Ferries Ordinance, 1917, the Governor in Council amends the regulations under the heading "Excluded ferries", set forth on pages 868 to 870 of Volume III of the Regulations of Hong Kong (1937 Edition) as follows:—

AMENDMENT.

On page 870 of the said Volume III, the following shall be added to the list of Excluded ferries at the end thereof:—

"The ferry named hereunder is excluded from the operation of the Ferries Ordinance, 1917, so long as—

(1) no exclusive and conflicting licence is granted under the said Ordinance; and

(2) such number of vessels be put into service on the ferry-run as will maintain a service and schedule approved by the Director of Marine; and

(3) all directions given by the Director of Marine as to ferry points or piers and the use and maintenance thereof are complied with; and


(4) only vessels licensed and approved for the purpose by the Director of Marine are employed; and

(5) the fares and charges at any time taken and made are approved by the Director of Marine:

Provided that notwithstanding the above prescribed conditions, the period of exclusion shall not continue beyond the 30th day of September, 1950, or such later date as the Governor in Council shall decide.

QUARANTINE AND PREVENTION OF
DISEASE ORDINANCE, 1936.

(ORDINANCE NO. 7 OF 1936)

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 8 of the Quarantine and Prevention of Disease Ordinance, 1936, the Governor in Council makes the following regulations—

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Quarantine and Prevention of Disease (Plague) Regulations, 1950. Citation.

2. "Health Officer", "infected place", "infected port" and "vessel" have the meanings respectively assigned to them by the Quarantine and Prevention of Disease Ordinance, 1936. Interpretation.
Ordinance No. 7 of 1936.

3. No vessel, entering the harbour within 48 hours of leaving a place or port declared by the Governor to be an infected place or port by reason of the prevalence there of plague and having taken on board at such place or port feathers sacks or rags as merchandise, shall be permitted to discharge cargo unless— Fumigation of cargo from infected port.

(a) the vessel has been fumigated to the satisfaction of a Health Officer; or

(b) cargo for discharge from such vessel is loaded with the consent of a Health Officer into lighters and thereon fumigated to the satisfaction of a Health Officer before being landed.

4. Any person who discharges or attempts to discharge any cargo in contravention of regulation 3 shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a fine of five hundred dollars. Penalty.

THE EMERGENCY REGULATIONS ORDINANCE, 1922.

REGULATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 2 of the Emergency Regulations Ordinance, 1922, as amended by the Emergency Regulations (Amendment) Ordinance, 1949, and by the Emergency Regulations (Amendment) (No. 2) Ordinance, 1949, the Governor in Council hereby makes the following regulations—

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Emergency (Principal) Amendment Regulations, 1950, and shall be read as one with the Emergency (Principal) Regulations, 1949, hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations. Citation G.N. A. 277/49.

2. Paragraph (a) of regulation 4 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by the insertion immediately after the words "public officer" of the words "whether designated by name or by his office". Amendment of regulation 4 of the principal regulations.

3. Regulation 21 of the principal regulations is hereby amended— Amendment of regulation 21 of the principal regulations.

(a) by the repeal of sub-regulation (1) and the substitution therefor of the following—

“(1) For the purposes of this regulation—

“suspected apparatus or article” means an apparatus or article which the competent authority for reasons which may appear to him to be sufficient considers to be or to have been used as or to be intended to be used as, whether alone or in conjunction with any other apparatus or article, an apparatus for wireless transmission or for facilitating such transmission or to be readily adaptable for such use;

“competent authority” includes a person authorized in writing by the competent authority to determine whether an apparatus or article is a suspected apparatus or article.



(1a) Any person found in apparent possession, custody or control of a suspected apparatus or article may be charged before a magistrate with a breach of this regulation and shall on conviction thereof be liable to a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months.

(1b) Upon any such charge it shall be defence for the defendant to prove either that he was never in possession, custody or control of the suspected apparatus or article or that during such time as it was in his possession, custody or control such apparatus or article was not intended to be used and was never in fact used whether alone or in conjunction with any other article as a wireless transmitting apparatus or for facilitating wireless transmission.

(1c) If upon such charge as aforesaid—

(i) the magistrate acquits the defendant he may nevertheless order that any suspected apparatus or article which he is satisfied is readily adaptable for use, whether alone or in conjunction with another apparatus or article, as a wireless transmitter shall remain in the custody of the competent authority during such period as sub-regulation (1a) may remain in force.

(ii) the magistrate convicts the defendant the suspected apparatus or article shall be forfeited to the Crown.

(1d) Any authorized officer who has reason to suppose that any apparatus or article when examined by a competent authority will be declared by such authority to be a suspected apparatus or article may seize and hold the same, in the first instance, for the purpose of causing such examination to be made, and thereafter, if such apparatus or article becomes a suspected apparatus or article, for the purposes of sub-regulations (1a), (1b) and (1c) of this regulation,";

(b) by the deletion of the first line of sub-regulation (2) and the substitution therefor of the following—

"Nothing in the preceding sub-regulations"; and

(c) by the deletion of the word "objects" in the fifth line of sub-regulation (3) and the substitution therefor of the words "apparatus or article".

4. Regulations 25 and 26 of the principal regulations are hereby amended by the deletion of the words "in writing" in the second line of each regulation.

Amendment of regulations 25 and 26 of the principal regulations.

5. Regulation 29 of the principal regulations is hereby amended—

Amendment of regulation 29 of the principal regulations.

(a) by the insertion of the words "authorized officer or any" immediately after the word "Any" in the first line of sub-regulation (2) and

(b) by the insertion of the words "or by an authorized officer" immediately after the word "officer" in the second line of sub-regulation (3).

6. Regulation 36 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by the insertion of the words "in prison custody or" immediately after the word "lawfully" in the first line thereof.

Amendment of regulation 36 of the principal regulations.

7. Regulation 57 of the principal regulations is hereby repealed and replaced by the following—

Repeal and replacement of regulation 57 of the principal regulations.

57. The Governor if he considers it necessary or expedient in the public interest may by order provide for prohibiting or restricting the use of territorial or colonial waters or any part thereof."

8. Regulation 58 is hereby repealed and replaced by the following—

Repeal and replacement of regulation 58 of the principal regulations.

58. (1) The Commissioner of Police or any person duly authorized by him may by order or by giving directions or in any other manner—

"Control of roads and travel by vehicle and temporary control of territorial waters and colonial waters.

(a) close any road or restrict control or prohibit its use;

(b) restrict control or prohibit the travelling of any person in any train, tram or vehicle of any description whether mechanically propelled or not;

(c) prohibit or restrict for a specified period or until further notice entry into or movement within any part of territorial or colonial waters;

Provided that in the case of any prohibition or restriction under paragraph (c) of this regulation such prohibition or restriction shall cease to have effect upon the expiration of 48 hours from the time when it was imposed unless it has in the meantime been confirmed by order of the Governor in which event it shall continue for the period specified or until notice of its termination has been given.

(2) For the purposes of sub-regulation (1) the term "road" includes any highway, and any public bridge, and any pier or wharf and any street, lane, footpath, footway, square, court or passage, or other open space to which the public have access, whether a thoroughfare or not."

Repeal and replacement of regulation 65 of the principal regulations.

9. Regulation 65 of the principal regulations is hereby repealed and replaced by the following—

"Powers to stop and search vehicles including railway vehicles and tramways.

65. (1) It shall be lawful for any police officer or for any member in uniform of His Majesty's regular forces or of any local naval, military or air force, corps or reserve—

(a) to require the driver or person in control of any road vehicle in motion or any vessel in motion in any colonial or territorial waters to which the public have access to stop;

(b) to search any vehicle or vessel which fails to stop after a lawful requirement has been made under paragraph (a) or in or upon which he has reasonable ground for suspecting there is to be found evidence of the commission of an offence against these regulations; and

(c) to seize any article found upon any such search as aforesaid which he has reasonable ground for believing to be evidence of an offence against these regulations.

(2) In this regulation "road vehicle" means any vehicle designed or adapted for use on roads or rails.

10. The principal regulations are hereby amended by the insertion of the following regulation as regulation 67A thereof—

Addition of new regulation 67A to the principal regulations.

"Power to commandeer property other than land.

67A. (1) the Commissioner of Police and any police officer generally or specially authorized in that behalf by the Commissioner of Police may if it appears to him to be necessary or expedient in the interest of internal security or for the preservation of public order or safety, commandeer any means of transport and any property whatsoever other than land and may give such directions and take such steps as appear to him to be necessary to secure effective possession of the property commandeered and may for the purposes aforesaid use or deal with the property commandeered as if he were the owner thereof.

(2) Where possession has been taken of any property commandeered in pursuance of this regulation then unless possession thereof is relinquished in accordance with sub-regulation (3) such property shall as from the time when effective possession thereof has been taken be deemed to have been acquired on behalf of the Governor in pursuance of Emergency Powers and compensation shall be payable accordingly.

(3) It shall be lawful for the Commissioner of Police to relinquish possession of any property commandeered which has not perished or been consumed or lost either by delivering the same to the owner thereof or to the person from whom it was commandeered or by notification in the *Gazette* to either of such persons as aforesaid that delivery thereof may be taken at a time and place to be specified in such notification.

(4) Where possession of any property commandeered in pursuance of this regulation is relinquished under sub-regulation (3) then—

(a) if such property was a vehicle vessel, excavator, crane or agricultural machinery, it shall be deemed to have been requisitioned on behalf of the Governor in exercise of emergency powers for the period of commandeerment and compensation shall be paid accordingly; and

(b) in the case of any other property there shall be paid by way of compensation—

(i) a sum equal to the amount which might immediately prior to the commandeering reasonably be expected to be payable by a person for the use of such property during the period of commandeering; and

(ii) a sum equal to the cost of making good any damage to the property commandeered which may have occurred during the period of commandeering (except in so far as the damage has been made good during the period by a person acting on behalf of the Governor); and

(iii) a sum equal to the amount of any expenses reasonably incurred for the purposes of compliance with any direction given in pursuance of this regulation :

Provided that if the property commandeered was perishable or has been consumed or lost or can no longer at the time when possession thereof is relinquished be used for its ordinary purposes or cannot be so used without endangering health or safety, or if the Colonial Secretary so orders, there shall be paid in lieu of compensation under sub-paragraphs (i), (ii) and (iii) hereunder a sum equivalent to the value of the property commandeered immediately before effective possession thereof was taken in pursuance of the powers conferred by this regulation.

(5) For the purpose of this regulation "commandeer" means to require the use of.

(6) This regulation shall have no application to aircraft or to any ship or vessel of a tonnage exceeding 60 tons net or to currency, gold, securities or negotiable instruments".

Amendment of regulation 99 of the principal regulations.

11. Regulation 99 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by the addition immediately before the full stop at the end of sub-regulation (1) of the words "and may seize any article found in the course of such search which he has reasonable ground for believing to be evidence of the commission of an offence against these regulations".

12. Regulation 100 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by the insertion immediately before the full stop at the end of sub-regulation (2) the words "and the expression 'police officer' in these regulations shall include a special constable enrolled pursuant to an order made hereunder".

Amendment of regulation 100 of the principal regulations.

13. Regulation 113 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by the deletion of the full stop appearing at the end thereof and by the addition immediately after the words "shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations" of the following—

Amendment of regulation 113 of the principal regulations.

"and shall, if the offence is in respect of arms, ammunition or explosives, on conviction on indictment be liable to imprisonment for life, and shall, if the offence is in respect of clothing, accoutrements, medals or other appointments, on conviction be liable to the penalties prescribed in regulation 136".

14. Regulation 116 of the principal regulations is hereby repealed and the following regulation substituted therefor—

Repeal and replacement of regulation 116 of the principal regulations.

"116. Any person who without lawful authority carries or has in his possession or under his control arms, ammunition or explosive substance shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations and shall on conviction on indictment be liable to imprisonment for life".

15. Regulation 128 of the principal regulations is hereby amended—

Amendment of regulation 128 of the principal regulations.

(a) by the insertion of the words "or by an authorized officer" after the word "reserve" in the fourteenth line of sub-regulation (1); and

(b) by the insertion of the words "or by an authorized officer" after the word "reserve" in the fifth line of sub-regulation (3).

16. The Emergency (Control of Ships and Aircraft) Regulations, 1949, are hereby repealed.

17. Regulation 137 is hereby amended by the insertion after sub-regulation (3) of the following sub-regulation—

“(4) It shall be lawful for the Governor to declare that the whole of these regulations shall come into force, notwithstanding that at the time of any such declaration part or parts of these regulations or particular regulations or parts thereof may have already been brought into force in pursuance of the powers conferred by this regulation, and, in any such event, such declaration shall be operative to bring into force any part of these regulations not in force at the time that any such declaration is made save and except any part or parts, regulations or sub-regulations which such declaration declares shall not come into operation.”

Explanatory Note.

The regulations make two important innovations—

(a) they enable the Commissioner of Police and police officers acting with his express authority to commandeer means of transport and other articles in an emergency. See the new regulation 67A introduced by regulation 10 of the above regulations.

(b) they authorize the Commissioner of Police to close and control roads and travel by vehicle and to restrict temporarily movement within territorial or colonial waters. See the new regulation 58 introduced by regulation 8.

2. Sub-regulation (1) of regulation 21 as previously drafted required that types of apparatus should be specified which could be readily adapted for the purpose of wireless transmission, and further that articles should be specified which are capable of forming part of or facilitating the use of wireless transmitting apparatus. In view of the large number of articles in common use which might be affected, it is better to recast this sub-regulation to omit this need for specification. It is necessary to have adequate powers to deal with illegal transmitters and the new sub-regulation will assist in this by providing for the onus of proof that any apparatus or article found in circumstances which lead the competent authority reasonably to suspect that it is being used for or in connection with illegal transmission, to be placed upon the person found in possession.

3. Regulation 65 has been replaced to clarify and to ensure that a vessel or vehicle which has refused to stop may be searched as soon as it has been stopped.

4. Regulation 5 confers on authorized officers powers of detention conferred upon His Majesty's Forces and local forces by regulation 29 of the principal regulations.

5. Regulation 116 has been recast to widen its scope and to simplify. For the sake of conformity regulation 113 has been amended so as to make life imprisonment the penalty for offences under that regulation relating to arms, ammunition or explosive substances.

6. Regulation 15 confers on authorized officers powers already conferred on His Majesty's Forces and local forces by regulation 128 of the principal regulations in connection with the removal and search of persons trespassing or loitering in the vicinity of warships, military vessels or premises used for essential services.

7. The Emergency (Control of Ships and Aircraft) Regulations, 1949, are repealed because similar provisions are contained in regulations 50 and 51 of the principal regulations and they are now being brought into force.

IMPORTATION AND EXPORTATION ORDINANCE, 1915.

(Ordinance No. 32 of 1915.)

ORDER OF THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL

(under section 4).

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 4 of the Importation and Exportation Ordinance, 1915, the Governor in Council has made the following Order—

1. This Order may be cited as the Exportation (Prohibition) Citation. (Specified Articles) Order, 1950.

2. In this Order—

Inter-pretation.

“Director” means the Director of Commerce and Industry;

“specified article” means any article specified in the Schedule to this Order.

3. The exportation from the Colony of any specified article except under an export licence issued by the Director is prohibited.

Prohibition of export of specified articles except under licence.


WHEREAS by Resolution made and passed by this Honourable Council on the 3rd December, 1947, pursuant to section 3 of the Dutiable Commodities Ordinance, 1931, it is provided that the provisions of the said Ordinance except Parts II, III and IV thereof shall apply to proprietary medicines and toilet preparations;

AND WHEREAS by paragraph 3 of Resolution made and passed by this Honourable Council on the date aforesaid pursuant to section 4 of the Ordinance aforesaid as amended by Resolution made and passed as aforesaid on the 20th July, 1949, provision was made for the calculation of the Hong Kong dollar equivalent of certain foreign currencies;

AND WHEREAS by section 4 of the said Ordinance it is provided that this Council may from time to time by resolution impose any duty on any dutiable goods or any class of dutiable goods, and lower, increase, decrease or vary any such duty to any extent whatever;

AND WHEREAS the Hong Kong dollar equivalents aforesaid have in fact varied from time to time since the said dates;

NOW THEREFORE IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED under section 4 of the Ordinance aforesaid that in respect of importation of proprietary medicines and toilet preparations after the date hereof the rate for the purpose of calculating the Hong Kong dollar equivalent of foreign currencies in connection with the duty payable on toilet preparations and proprietary medicines shall in all cases be the official rate of exchange prevailing at the date of paying duty on any such importation the said rate for the purpose of calculating the Hong Kong dollar equivalent of foreign currencies being substituted for the provision made as aforesaid in paragraph 3 of the Resolution of this Council of the 3rd December, 1947, amended as aforesaid.


RESOLVED that where an officer who was in the service of this Colony and was detained in the Far Eastern area during the period of the Japanese invasion and who retired from the public service—

(a) on or after the first day of January, 1947, not having been in receipt of salary according to a scale of pay operative in this Colony in consequence of the Salaries Revision, 1947; or

(b) prior to the first day of January, 1947,

and has died or dies before the first day of August, 1952, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, when death was directly attributable to, or the condition resulting in death aggravated by, the circumstances of such detention and without his own default, to grant a pension *ex gratia* to the widow and children of such officer, calculated in accordance with the provisions of section 18 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1932 (now repealed), or if such officer was a police officer in accordance with regulation 14 made under the Police Force Ordinance, 1932 (now repealed), as though such officer had died at the date of his retirement, but to be payable from the date of the death of such officer.

RESOLVED FURTHER that any pension granted hereunder shall be subject to the same conditions as those to which it would have been subject had it been granted under the provisions of the section of the Ordinance or regulation in accordance with the provisions of which it was calculated.

THE PUBLIC SERVICES COMMISSION
ORDINANCE, 1950.

REGULATION BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon him by section 14 of the Public Services Commission Ordinance, 1950, the Governor in Council has made the following regulations—

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Public Services Commission Regulations, 1950. Citation.

2. In these regulations—

Inter-pretation.

“Commission” means the Public Services Commission;

“efficiency bar”, “probation bar” “promotion bar” and “promotion step” shall have the meanings from time to time assigned to them in the General Orders of Government;

“Ordinance” means the Public Services Commission Ordinance, 1950;

“pension legislation” means the Ordinance and regulations concerning the payment of pensions to officers in the public service for the time being in force;

“pensionable office” shall have the meaning assigned to it by pension legislation;

“a vacancy” shall be deemed to occur when a pensionable office for which provision has been made in the estimates is not held by a person who has been appointed substantively thereto;

“special appointment” means an appointment other than an appointment to a pensionable office, being an appointment which cannot be determined by Government at will or upon the giving of one month’s notice or of a period of notice of less than one month.

3. (1) Whenever the Governor proposes to fill a vacancy occurring or about to occur in a pensionable office or to make a special appointment the Establishment Officer shall except as is hereinafter provided notify the Commission in writing of such vacancy or appointment and ask the Commission to advise the Governor as to how such vacancy or appointment should be filled. Vacancy in pensionable office to be notified to Secretary of Commission.

(2) In any case in which a vacancy has not actually occurred the Establishment Officer shall not proceed as provided in sub-regulation (1) unless he is directed so to do by any general or special direction of the Colonial Secretary.

(3) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-regulation (1) if the Governor considers that exceptional circumstances warrant the making of a special appointment without prior reference to the Commission he may proceed to make such appointment but shall at the same time notify the Commission of his reasons for so proceeding.

Prospective promotion to be notified to Secretary of Commission.

4. Similar notice and request shall be given and made in respect of any recommendation by a Head of Department which if implemented would or might result in an officer surmounting an efficiency probation or promotion bar or a promotion step in a pensionable office or special appointment.

Governor may refer to Commission by writing under hand of Establishment Officer.

5. It shall be lawful for the Governor to indicate that he wishes the advice of the Commission upon any matter which he is by the Ordinance authorized to refer, by writing under the hand of the Establishment Officer requesting such advice.

Non-applicability of regulations to certain office, class of office or appointment.

6. These regulations shall not apply to any office, class of office or appointment to which subsection (2) of section 6 of the Ordinance applies.

Procedure for obtaining advice of the Commission.

7. Whenever any matter has been referred to the Commission whether by notice in writing to the Secretary or by such other manner as may from time to time be prescribed, then subject to any regulations for the time being in force the Chairman of the Commission shall, with a view to advising the Governor upon such matter as has been referred to the Commission, cause the matter to be considered by the Commission in such manner as he shall in each particular case deem convenient and shall cause to be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary in writing—

(a) the advice of the Commission or of the quorum thereof by whom the matter advised upon has been considered; or

(b) if the advice is not unanimous, the advice of the Chairman and of each member: Provided that such advice may take the form of concurring with the advice given by the Chairman or member and of indicating in what respects, if any, it differs therefrom.

8. Subject to any regulations for the time being in force it shall be lawful for the Commission for the purpose of advising the Governor upon the filling of any vacancy in a pensionable office or upon the making of any special appointment or upon the surmounting of any efficiency probation or promotion bar or of any promotion step in a pensionable office or special appointment—

Powers of the Commission.

(a) to conduct, supervise or arrange such examinations, interviews or tests of any public servant who is about to be or may be appointed to fill any vacancy or special appointment and of any candidate for the public service as to the Commission may seem fit;

(b) to obtain from the Head of Department of any public servant or the employer of any candidate for the public service such information as may appear to the Commission to be relevant in advising Government on whether such public servant should be appointed to fill any vacancy or to any special appointment or on whether such candidate should be employed in the public service; and

(c) to advertise any vacancy in such manner as the Commission may deem desirable.



THE EMERGENCY REGULATIONS ORDINANCE, 1922.

REGULATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 2 of the Emergency Regulations Ordinance, 1922, as amended by the Emergency Regulations (Amendment) Ordinance, 1949, and by the Emergency Regulations (Amendment) (No. 2) Ordinance, 1949, the Governor in Council hereby makes the following regulations—

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Emergency (Small Change) Regulations, 1950. Citation.

2. In these regulations—

“small change” shall mean any one cent, five cent and ten cent currency notes issued under the provisions of the Subsidiary Currency Notes Ordinance, 1941, and all coins which are legal tender by virtue of the provisions of a proclamation made in exercise of the powers conferred by Article 4 of the Hong Kong (Coinage) Order, 1936.

Inter-pretation.

Ordinance No. 21 of 1941.

3. (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to have in his possession or control small change which is in excess of his reasonable requirements having regard to the nature of his employment or to the nature of the business he conducts.

Possession or control of small change.

(2) Any person who contravenes this regulation shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

(3) Where any person is charged with an offence against this regulation, the burden of proving that the small change which is the subject of the charge is not in excess of his reasonable requirements as aforesaid, shall lie upon the accused.

4. (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to export or to attempt to export from the Colony small change in excess of two dollars in value.

Export of small change.

(2) Any person who contravenes this regulation shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Power of search and seizure.

5. It shall be lawful for any police officer of or above the rank of sub-inspector who has reason to suspect that any small change is kept in any premises in contravention of regulation 3 to enter and search such premises and to seize any small change found therein.

Demanding premium for transfer of small change.

6. It shall be unlawful for any person other than a money changer licensed under the Miscellaneous Licences Ordinance, 1933, to demand or receive any premium as a consideration for the transfer to any other person of small change. Any person who contravenes this regulation shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Penalties.

7. Any person who commits an offence against these regulations shall on summary conviction be liable to a fine of five hundred dollars and if the offence is against regulation 3 or 4 the small change in respect of which the offence is committed shall be forfeited to the Crown.

Explanatory Note.

During recent weeks a shortage of small change (i.e. one cent, five cent and ten cent currency notes and coins) has persisted in the Colony. The shortage has continued notwithstanding that substantial releases of coins representing small change have been made during the period. It is therefore apparent that the situation is not to be attributed to normal causes but may be ascribed to manipulation designed to accumulate small change so as to derive profit by its sale. This situation is causing serious inconvenience to the public and is a factor in increasing cost of living.

2. In these circumstances the above regulations, made under the Emergency Regulations Ordinance, 1922, have been enacted. The regulations make it an offence for any person to have in his possession or control small change (as defined) which is in excess of his reasonable requirements, having regard to the nature of his employment or to the nature of the business he conducts, and for any person to export from the Colony small change in excess of 2 dollars in value. The regulations provide that upon summary conviction of such offences a fine of \$500 may be imposed and provision is made that the small change in respect of which conviction of an offence has been recorded, shall be forfeited to the Crown. It is also made an offence punishable on summary conviction with a similar fine for any person other than a licensed money changer to demand or receive any premium for the giving of small change.

3. It will be observed that money changers licensed under the Miscellaneous Licences Ordinance, 1933, are excluded from the provisions of Regulation 6 which makes it an offence to demand or receive any premium as a consideration for the transfer to any other person of small change. The reason for this is that the maximum premium at which a money changer may exchange Hong Kong currency of any denomination for Hong Kong currency of any other denomination is already prescribed by the Financial Secretary under Regulation 4A in Part V of the Regulations in the second schedule to the Miscellaneous Licences Ordinance, 1933. The premia already prescribed by the Financial Secretary are as follows:—

- 1 cent coins or notes— $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent
- 5 cent coins or notes
and 10 cent coins or notes—1 per cent.

THE EMERGENCY REGULATIONS ORDINANCE, 1922.

REGULATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 2 of the Emergency Regulations Ordinance, 1922, as amended by the Emergency Regulations (Amendment) Ordinance, 1949, and by the Emergency Regulations (Amendment) (No. 2) Ordinance, 1949, the Governor in Council hereby makes the following regulations—

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Emergency Citation. (Principal) Amendment (No. 2) Regulations, 1950, and shall be read as one with the Emergency (Principal) Regulations, 1949, hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations. G.N.A. 277/49.

2. The principal regulations are hereby amended by the addition of the following regulation after regulation 116 as regulation 116A— Addition of new regulation 116A.

“116A. (1) Any person who without lawful authority carries or has in his possession any bomb, grenade, mine or other apparatus, machine or implement used, or capable of being used, as bomb, grenade or mine, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations and shall on conviction on indictment be punished with death.

(2) Any person who without lawful authority uses or attempts to use arms, ammunition or explosive substance against any person or property, notwithstanding that death or injury to a person or injury to property is not caused by such use, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations and shall on conviction on indictment be punished with death.

(3) A prosecution for an offence under this regulation shall not be instituted except with the consent of the Attorney General".

Regulation 137 of principal Regulations not to apply.

3. Regulation 137 of the principal Regulations shall not apply to these regulations.

- (b) in respect of the service of the officer named in the Second Schedule between the 12th July, 1946, and the 23rd July, 1946.

Provided that any such break in service shall not be disregarded in computing the length of service for the purpose of determining the amount of such annual allowance or gratuity.





REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Pensions (Amendment) Regulations, 1950, and shall be read as one with the Pensions Regulations, 1949, hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations. Citation.

2. Regulation 15 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by the addition of a further paragraph at the end thereof as follows— Amendment of regulation 15 of the principal regulations.

"(3) (a) A break in the service of an officer occurring wholly between the 12th day of July, 1946, and the 23rd day of July, 1946, or between the 16th day of August, 1947, and the 23rd day of September, 1947, as a result of the voluntary absence from the place of employment of such


officer shall be disregarded for the purpose of computing the length of service qualifying for pension, annual allowance or gratuity: Provided that any such break in service shall not be disregarded in computing the length of service for the purpose of determining the amount of such pension, annual allowance or gratuity.

(b) Paragraph (3) of this regulation shall be deemed to have had effect from 1st January, 1947, in relation to officers to whom Part V of these regulations do not apply and from the 9th December, 1949, in relation to officers to whom Part V of these regulations apply."




