GROWTH DEPENDS ON CONFIDENCE, FORESIGHT: GOVERNOR

LOCAL DEVELOPMENT DEPENDS FOR ITS IMPETUS ON THE CONFIDENCE, FORESIGHT AND DETERMINATION OF THE MANY PEOPLE RESPONSIBLE FOR CONVERTING IDEAS INTO REALITY, THE GOVERNOR, SIR EDWARD YOUDE SAID AT THE OPENING CEREMONY OF HARBOUR CITY TODAY (FRIDAY).

DEVELOPMENT ALSO DEPENDS ON A CONSCIOUS PARTNERSHIP AND COOPERATION BETWEEN THE PRIVATE SECTOR AND THE GOVERNMENT, HE ADDED.

SIR EDWARD SAID:

+I AM VERY GLAD TO BE HERE TODAY, IN THIS BUSY DISTRICT OF TSIM SHA TSUI, FOR THE OPENING OF HARBOUR CITY.

+THE COMPLETION OF HARBOUR CITY IS AN ENCOURAGING ILLUSTRATION OF THE ROLE PLAYED BY THE PRIVATE SECTOR IN REDEVELOPING THE OLDER PARTS OF OUR CITY TO KEEP PACE WITH THE CHANGING ROLE OF HONG KONG AS A MAJOR COMMERCIAL, INDUSTRIAL AND FINANCIAL CENTRE. WHAT USED TO BE A SPRAWLING GODOWN ON THE TSIM SHA TSUI WATERFRONT HAS BEEN TRANSFORMED INTO THIS IMPOSING COMMERCIAL AND RESIDENTIAL COMPLEX.

+THE PROCESS OF DEVELOPMENT IN HONG KONG IS SOMETHING WHICH MOST OF US WHO LIVE HERE HAVE COME TO TAKE FOR GRANTED; WHETHER IT TAKES THE FORM OF A MAJOR RENEWAL PROJECT OF THIS SORT OR OUR MASSIVE NEW TOWNS PROGRAMME NOW ENTERING ITS SECOND DECADE, DEVELOPMENT GOES ON UNCEASINGLY AROUND US. BUT WE SHOULD ALSO REFLECT ON WHAT MAKES THIS POSSIBLE.

+DEVELOPMENT DEPENDS FOR ITS IMPETUS ON THE CONFIDENCE, FORESIGHT AND DETERMINATION OF THE MANY PEOPLE RESPONSIBLE FOR CONVERTING IDEAS INTO REALITY; AND ON A CONSCIOUS PARTNERSHIP AND COOPERATION BETWEEN THE PRIVATE SECTOR AND THE GOVERNMENT.

+NEITHER THE COMPLETION OF HARBOUR CITY, NOR THE PROSPECT OF THE SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETION OF THE NEW TOWNS IN THE EARLY PART OF THE 1990S, WILL MEAN A PAUSE IN THE DEVELOPMENT PROCESS. WE EXPECT TO RECEIVE SHORTLY THE INITIAL RESULTS OF A RANGE OF VERY DETAILED STUDIES TO DEFINE OUR REQUIREMENTS FOR FURTHER URBAN GROWTH IN THE 1990S, AND TO IDENTIFY THE OPTIONS AVAILABLE TO MEET THEM. THE INDICATIONS ARE THAT WE SHALL NEED TO TAKE FULL ADVANTAGE OF RESIDUAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES IN THE NEW TOWNS, AND WE WILL ALSO SEE SOME NEW GROWTH IN THE HARBOUR AREA - THE HEART OF OUR CITY.

+THE PRIVATE SECTOR WILL CONTINUE TO HAVE AN IMPORTANT ROLE TO PLAY IN THIS FUTURE DEVELOPMENT, AND I AM SURE IT VIEWS THE PROSPECT WITH GREAT INTEREST.

+I CONGRATULATE THE HONG KONG AND KOWLOON WHARF AND GODOWN COMPANY LIMITED AND ALL ASSOCIATED WITH THE DEVELOPMENT OF HARBOUR CITY.

+THE CITY WITHIN A CITY - AS THIS PROJECT HAS BEEN SO APTLY DESCRIBED - IS MORE THAN AN IMAGINATIVE AND SUCCESSFUL REDEVELOPMENT SCHEME; IT IS A CONTRIBUTION TO HONG KONG'S IMAGE AS A THRIVING, PROGRESSIVE AND SUCCESSFUL CITY.+

ALL MUST HELP FIGHT CRIME - SIR PHILIP

THE FIGHT AGAINST CRIME CAN ONLY SUCCEED IF OUR EFFORTS ARE SUPPLEMENTED BY A SUSTAINED EFFORT BY EVERY MEMBER OF THE COMMUNITY AT LARGE TO SUPPORT THOSE DIRECTLY INVOLVED IN COMBATING CRIME, SIR PHILIP HADDON-CAVE, CHAIRMAN OF THE FIGHT CRIME COMMITTEE, SAID TODAY (FRIDAY).

SIR PHILIP WAS SPEAKING AT A PRESS CONFERENCE ON THE PROGRESS OF WORK UNDERTAKEN BY THE FIGHT CRIME COMMITTEE IN THE SIX MONTHS FROM NOVEMBER 1983 TO APRIL OF THIS YEAR.

ALSO SPEAKING AT THE PRESS CONFERENCE WERE MR DAVID JEAFFRESON, SECRETARY FOR SECURITY; MR ROY HENRY, COMMISSIONER OF POLICE, MR WILLIAM MARSHALL, ASSISTANT TO THE ATTORNEY GENERAL; AND MR CHARLES YEUNG, FCC UNOFFICIAL MEMBER.

+THE COMMITTEE CONTINUED ITS CONSIDERATION OF MAJOR AREAS OF CONCERN RELATED TO CRIMINAL ACTIVITY AND MADE STEADY PROGRESS IN DRAWING UP NEW MEASURES TO ASSIST IN COMBATING CRIME,+ SIR PHILIP SAID.

HE SAID, +I AM, HOWEVER, VERY CONSCIOUS OF THE FACT THAT ALL THIS EFFORT IS IN ITSELF NOT ENOUGH.

+THIS COMMITTEE IS ONLY THE SENIOR CO-ORDINATING BODY WHICH IS HEAVILY DEPENDENT UPON THE DYNAMIC SUPPORT WHICH IT RECEIVES FROM THE DISTRICT FIGHT CRIME COMMITTEES WHICH HAVE A SIMILAR CO-ORDINATING FUNCTION AT A SOMEWHAT LESS RAREFIED LEVEL,+ HE ADDED.

ON THE FCC REPORT NO. 2, SIR PHILIP SAID THAT IT COMPLEMENTED AND UPDATED THE FIRST ONE BY DESCRIBING THE WORK OF THE COMMITTEE IN THE SIX-MONTH PERIOD.

AMONG THE MANY SUBJECTS COVERED BY THE REPORT ARE THE SETTING UP OF THE WORKING GROUP ON GANGS; USE OF FIREARMS IN CRIME, SECURITY OF GOLDSMITH/JEWELLERY SHOPS, BANKS AND GOLD WORKSHOPS; ROBBERIES IN HIGH-RISE BUILDING, USEFULNESS OF FILM CENSORSHIP IN RELATION TO COMBATING CRIME AND USE OF PROVISIONAL ORDERS ON NUISANCE CAUSED BY VICE ACTIVITIES IN RESIDENTIAL BUILDINGS.

THE SENIOR MEMBER OF UMELCO, SIR S.Y. CHUNG, TOGETHER WITH MISS LYDIA DUNN, AN UNOFFICIAL MEMBER OF BOTH EXECUTIVE AND LEGISLATIVE COUNCILS, AND DR Q.W. LEE, AN UNOFFICIAL MEMBER OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL HAVE ACCEPTED AN INVITATION FROM MR XU JIATUN, DIRECTOR OF THE HONG KONG BRANCH OF NEW CHINA NEWS AGENCY TO VISIT PEKING AND TO MEET WITH CHAIRMAN DENG XIAOPING AND OTHER SENIOR CHINESE LEADERS FOR AN EXCHANGE OF VIEWS ABOUT THE FUTURE OF HONG KONG. SIR S.Y. CHUNG AND THE OTHER TWO UMELCO MEMBERS WILL LEAVE HONG KONG ON THURSDAY, JUNE 21, 1984. THEY WILL BE IN PEKING FOR TWO TO THREE DAYS. AFTER THEIR RETURN TO HONG KONG, THEY WILL CONVENE A PRESS CONFERENCE.

DR DAVID WILSON AND MR FRED BURROWS, MEMBERS OF THE WORKING GROUP SET UP TO CONSIDER DOCUMENTS RELATING TO THE FUTURE OF HONG KONG, WILL ARRIVE IN THE TERRITORY ON SUNDAY (JUNE 17).

THEY WILL BE STAYING WITH THE GOVERNOR AND WILL DEPART FOR BEIJING ON WEDNESDAY, JUNE 20, TOGETHER WITH THE POLITICAL ADVISER, MR ROBIN MCLAREN, AND THE LAW DRAFTSMAN, MR GERALD NAZARETH. THE CHIEF INTERPRETER, MR Y.P. CHENG, WILL ACCOMPANY THEM.

THERE ARE NO PLANS FOR DR WILSON AND MR BURROWS TO MEET THE MEDIA IN HONG KONG. A PHOTO CALL WILL BE ARRANGED AT THE AIRPORT FOR THEIR DEPARTURE.

THE JOINT SINO-BRITISH STATEMENT ANNOUNCING THE SETTING UP OF THE WORKING GROUP EXPLAINED THAT IT WOULD +CONSIDER DOCUMENTS SUBMITTED BY THE TWO SIDES IN PURSUIT OF THEIR OBJECTIVE OF REACHING AGREEMENT AS SOON AS POSSIBLE ON THE QUESTION OF HONG KONG. THE GROUP WILL MEET FULL TIME BETWEEN ROUNDS OF FORMAL TALKS AND WILL START WORK IN BEIJING DURING THE WEEK BEGINNING JUNE 18.+

QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

RECREATIONAL AND SPORTS ACTIVITIES WILL BE HELD THROUGHOUT HONG KONG TOMORROW (SATURDAY) TO CELEBRATE THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY.

MORE THAN 100 ACTIVITIES, ORGANISED BY THE RECREATION AND SPORTS SERVICE OF THE RECREATION AND CULTURE DEPARTMENT, WILL BE HELD AT MAJOR PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS.

THE GOVERNOR, SIR EDWARD YOUDE, AND LADY YOUDE WILL BE VISITING SHA TIN SPORTS GROUND TO SEE AND OFFICIATE AT CELEBRATION ACTIVITIES THERE.

SIR EDWARD AND LADY YOUDE WILL ARRIVE AT THE SPORTS GROUND AT 10.30 AM AND WILL BE MET BY THE COMMISSIONER FOR RECREATION AND CULTURE, MR PATRICK WILLIAMSON, THE ASSISTANT COMMISSIONER FOR RECREATION AND SPORT, MR DICKEN YUNG AND COMMUNITY LEADERS.

LADY YOUDE WILL THEN PROCEED TO START A TELE-MATCH.

AT 10.45 AM, THE GOVERNOR WILL PRESENT PRIZES TO MANAGERS OF TEAMS TAKING PART IN THE TELE-MATCH. HE WILL LATER START AN EVENT AT A WATER SPORTS CARNIVAL HELD AT THE NEARBY JOCKEY CLUB SWIMMING POOL.

THREE UNOFFICIAL MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, MR ROGER LOBO, MR WONG LAM AND MR ANDREW SO, AND THE SECRETARY FOR DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION, MR DAVID AKERS-JONES, WILL VISIT VICTORIA PARK, KWAI CHUNG SPORTS GROUND, CHEUNG SHA WAN PLAYGROUND AND MORSE PARK RESPECTIVELY.

FACT-FINDING IN THE SOUTHERN DISTRICT

* * *

THE REGIONAL SECRETARY FOR HONG KONG AND KOWLOON, MR BARRIE WIGGHAM, THIS (FRIDAY) MORNING PAID A FACT-FINDING VISIT TO THE SOUTHERN DISTRICT TO LOOK INTO THE MISUSE OF CAR PARKING SPACES IN INDUSTRIAL BUILDINGS.

ACCOMPANIED BY THE DISTRICT OFFICER, MR K.C. KWONG, THE PARTY TOURED THE CAR PARK OF THE TAI SANG INDUSTRIAL BUILDING IN TIN WAN, AND SAW 13 OF THE 28 PARKING SPACES THERE BEING USED FOR STORAGE PURPOSES.

MR WIGGHAM WAS TOLD THAT THE LOCAL DISTRICT BOARD'S ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE HAD RECENTLY ENDORSED THAT LEASE ENFORCEMENT ACTION BE TAKEN AGAINST MISUSE OF CAR PARKING SPACES IN INDUSTRIAL BUILDINGS IN ABERDEEN AND TIN WAN.

/FINDINGS OF

FINDINGS OF A SURVEY CONDUCTED BY THE LANDS DEPARTMENT REVEALED THAT 45 OUT OF THE 139 CAR PARKING SPACES IN THE 16 INDUSTRIAL BUILDINGS IN THESE TWO AREAS HAVE BEEN CONVERTED INTO STORES, WORKSHOPS OR OFFICES.

AS A RESULT, LOADING AND UNLOADING OF GOODS AND PARKING OF CARS HAVE TO TAKE PLACE OUTSIDE THE BUILDING, CAUSING INCONVENIENCE TO PEDESTRIANS.

EARLIER, MR WIGGHAM TOURED THE TIN WAN ESTATE AND VISITED ONE OF THE FOUR TOP-FLOOR PRIMARY SCHOOLS IN THE ESTATE - THE CHI NAM PRIMARY SCHOOL.

THE BOARD'S SOCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE RECENTLY RECOMMENDED, IN LINE WITH THE POLICY OBJECTIVES SET OUT IN THE 1981 WHITE PAPER ON PRIMARY AND PRE-PRIMARY SERVICES, THAT A NEW STANDARD PRIMARY SCHOOL BE BUILT IN TIN WAN, TO REPLACE THE SUB-STANDARD TOP-FLOOR PRIMARY SCHOOL THERE.

MR WIGGHAM LATER WENT TO BAGUIO VILLA TO SEE THE LATEST DEVELOPMENT OF THE TELEGRAPH BAY RECLAMATION PROJECT, WHICH WOULD PROVIDE 20 HECTARES OF LAND FOR RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT AND FUTURE ROAD IMPROVEMENT WORK IN THE DISTRICT.

THE PARTY ALSO TOURED POKFULAM VILLAGE TO SEE THE MINOR ENVIRONMENTAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS UNDERTAKEN BY THE DISTRICT BOARD.

BETWEEN 1981 AND 1983, THE BOARD HAD CARRIED OUT FIVE PROJECTS IN THE VILLAGE, INCLUDING SURFACING OF FOOTPATHS AND BUILDING OF SITTING-OUT AREAS.

TODAY'S TOUR WAS ONE OF A SERIES OF WORKING VISITS TO THE VARIOUS URBAN DISTRICTS BY MR WIGGHAM DURING THE PAST FEW WEEKS.

TALKS ON EXPORT AUTHORISATION CALLS END

* * *

CONSULTATIONS HAVE ENDED IN WASHINGTON BETWEEN HONG KONG AND AMERICAN OFFICIALS ON EXPORT AUTHORISATION (EA) CALLS BY THE UNITED STATES FOR CONTROLS ON FIVE TEXTILE CATEGORIES.

A SPOKESMAN FOR THE TRADE DEPARTMENT SAID TODAY (FRIDAY) THAT DURING THE DISCUSSIONS, IT WAS AGREED THAT 1984 EXPORTS FROM HONG KONG IN CATEGORY 337 (COTTON PLAYSUITS, SUNSUITS, WASHSUITS, CREEPERS, ROMPERS) WOULD BE LIMITED TO 640 000 DOZEN, AND IN PART OF CATEGORY 659 (MAN-MADE FIBRE SWIMSUITS) WOULD BE LIMITED TO 403 251 LBS.

NO AGREEMENT WAS REACHED ON CATEGORY 650 (MAN-MADE FIBRE DRESSING GOWNS), AND THE UNITED STATES REQUESTED THAT HONG KONG LIMIT ITS EXPORTS IN 1984 IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE TERMS OF THE U.S.-HONG KONG BILATERAL TEXTILES AGREEMENT. THE LIMIT IMPOSED IS 73 592 DOZEN.

/ON CATEGORY

ON CATEGORY 649 (MAN-MADE FIBRE BRASSIERES, ETC) AND PART OF CATEGORY 359 (COTTON COVERALLS/JUMPSUITS/HUNTING SUITS AND COTTON OVERALLS), THE CONSULTATIONS WERE DEFERRED PENDING FURTHER CONSIDERATION OF THE CASES. IN THE MEANTIME HONG KONG WILL CONTINUE TO HOLD EXPORT AUTHORISATIONS AT THE PRESENT LEVELS.

THE SPOKESMAN SAID THAT EXPORT AUTHORISATIONS HAD ALREADY BEEN ISSUED UP TO THE LIMITS IN THREE OF THE FIVE CATEGORIES (CATEGORY 337, PART OF CATEGORY 359 AND CATEGORY 649).

IN PART OF CATEGORY 659 (MAN-MADE FIBRE SWIMSUITS), OUTSTANDING APPLICATIONS WILL ABSORB THE REMAINING AVAILABLE EXPORT AUTHORISATIONS WITHIN THE 1984 LIMIT.

IN CATEGORY 650 (MAN-MADE FIBRE DRESSING GOWNS), A SPECIAL EXPORT AUTHORISATION SCHEME IS LIKELY TO BE HELD TO DISPOSE OF THE BALANCE OF EXPORT AUTHORISATIONS UP TO THE 1984 LIMIT, AND AN ANNOUNCEMENT WILL BE MADE TO THE TRADE.

THE HONG KONG DELEGATION TO THE CONSULTATIONS WAS HEADED BY MR HAMISH MACLEOD, DIRECTOR OF TRADE, AND THE U.S. SIDE BY MR RON SORINI, ASSISTANT CHIEF TEXTILE NEGOTIATOR.

TEACHER RETRAINING IMPORTANT -- HAYE

TEACHERS NEED TO GO BACK TO SCHOOL FROM TIME TO TIME TO BE RETRAINED, NOT ONLY TO LEARN AFRESH BUT TO RE-CHARGE THEIR BATTERIES AND BE UPDATED, THE DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION, MR COLVYN HAYE, SAID TODAY (FRIDAY).

SPEAKING AT THE GRADUATION CEREMONY OF THE FOURTH RETRAINING COURSE OF THE INSTITUTE OF LANGUAGE IN EDUCATION (ILE), MR HAYE STRESSED RETRAINING WAS IMPORTANT, ESPECIALLY FOR LANGUAGE TEACHERS.

+WITH THE HELP OF LANGUAGE TEACHERS, CHILDREN LEARN TO READ, WRITE AND SPEAK BETTER AND SO BECOME EDUCATED.

+THAT'S WHY LANGUAGE -- AND ONLY LANGUAGE -- CAN UNLOCK THE DOOR TO LEARNING. AND OUR EDUCATION IS ONLY AS GOOD AS TEACHERS CAN MAKE IT,+ HE SAID.

TEACHERS NEEDED TO BE +PROFESSIONALLY UPDATED+ AS MUCH HAD CHANGED SINCE THEY WERE FIRST QUALIFIED FOR TEACHING IN SCHOOLS, MR HAYE SAID.

HE ADDED THAT RETRAINING DID NOT MEAN THROWING PREVIOUS KNOWLEDGE AND EXPERIENCE AWAY, BUT RATHER TO ENABLE TEACHERS TO LEARN NEW APPROACHES SO THAT THEY COULD RE-PRESENT THEIR KNOWLEDGE AND EXPERIENCE IN MORE EFFECTIVE WAYS.

QUEEN MARY HOSPITAL TO BE EXTENDED

QUEEN MARY HOSPITAL AT POK FU LAM IS TO BE EXTENDED AND IMPROVED TO PROVIDE BETTER MEDICAL SERVICES.

THE GOVERNMENT WILL BE INVITING CONTRACTORS TO TENDER FOR THE WORK, BUT THEY MUST PRE-QUALIFY FIRST BECAUSE OF THE SPECIALIST NATURE OF THE PROJECT.

APPLICATIONS TO BE INCLUDED ON THE PRE-QUALIFICATION LIST SHOULD REACH THE PRINCIPAL GOVERNMENT ARCHITECT BY JUNE 29.

IT IS EXPECTED THAT TENDERS WILL BE CALLED IN A FEW MONTHS FROM THOSE CONTRACTORS WITH THE REQUIRED EXPERTISE.

TWO BUILDINGS WILL BE CONSTRUCTED TO ADD 76 000 SQUARE METRES OF SPACE TO THE HOSPITAL.

ONE BUILDING OF 29 STOREYS WILL BE MAINLY FOR PAEDIATRIC PATIENTS.

THE OTHER, OF 12 STOREYS, WILL HOUSE THE PSYCHIATRIC UNIT AND VARIOUS MEDICAL UNITS AS WELL AS THE CUSTODIAL WARD AND ADDITIONAL CASUALTY FACILITIES.

THESE NEW BUILDINGS WILL INCREASE THE NUMBER OF BEDS AT THE HOSPITAL BY 844 TO 2 141.

Mr Lewis Mervyn DAVIES, CMG, OBE, JP

Mr Davies came to Hong Kong in November 1973 after a distinguished career in the Colonial Service in West Africa, the Western Pacific, and the Caribbean. He assumed the post of Secretary for Security which he then held continuously until late 1982. Mr Davies' tenure of the post of Secretary for Security was marked by outstanding qualities at times of considerable difficulty for HK when the territory had to confront, among many other problems, successive and large waves of refugees and illegal immigrants. In late 1982, Mr Davies became the Secretary for General Duties, with specific responsibility for assisting H.E. the Governor in matters relating to negotiations on HK's future.

Mr Hilton CHEONG Leen, OBE, JP

Mr Cheong-leen was first elected to Urban Council in 1957 and was appointed to LegCo in 1973. He left LegCo in 1979 but his public service did not stop there as he continued to be an elected member of the Urban Council and subsequently became its Vice-chairman. He was elected Chairman of the Urban Council in 1981.

The Hon. Maria TAM Wai-chu, JP

Miss Tam was called to the bar in the U.K. in 1971 and in HK in 1972. These berths allowed water to be brought in from China and were crucial to the efforts needed to contain the effects of the Emergency. In Dec. 1973 he was appointed Project Manager, Sha Tin in the New Territories Development Department with responsibility for the detailed planning and implementation of the Public Works Programmes in respect of Sha Tin New Town; and in the

following year was appointed Project Manager, Tusen Wan. He is a Past President of the Engineering Society of HK. In March 1983 he became the Director of New Territories Development.
