FOLLOWING IS THE TEXT OF THE NEW YEAR MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR,  
SIR EDWARD YOUDE:

+1984 HAS BEEN A MOMENTOUS AND HISTORIC YEAR FOR HONG KONG.

+THE SIGNING OF THE SINO-BRITISH AGREEMENT ON THE FUTURE OF  
HONG KONG ON 19 DECEMBER PROVIDED A FITTING CLIMAX TO THE YEAR.  
IT MARKED ALSO THE BEGINNING OF A NEW PHASE IN HONG KONG'S  
HISTORY.

+IT IS NOW UP TO EACH AND EVERY ONE OF US TO CONSIDER WHAT  
PART WE CAN PLAY IN MEETING THE CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES WHICH  
FACE HONG KONG AND TO WORK TOGETHER FOR THE COMMON GOOD. THE  
GOVERNMENT, FOR ITS PART, WILL DO ITS UTMOST TO ENSURE THAT HONG  
KONG WILL MAINTAIN AND IMPROVE ITS WAY OF LIFE AND CONTINUE TO  
PROSPER.

DREAM COMES TRUE FOR TWO DISABLED YOUTHS  
\* \* \* \* \*

A PILOT SCHEME LAUNCHED BY THE ELECTRICAL AND MECHANICAL  
SERVICES DEPARTMENT HAS TURNED TWO DISABLED YOUNGSTERS' DREAM INTO  
A REALITY.

MR TANG CHI-KEUNG WITH IMPAIRED EYESIGHT AND MR LAM KWOK-PAN  
WITH PHYSICAL DISABILITY, WERE ADMITTED TO THE DEPARTMENT'S  
APPRENTICE TRAINING CENTRE AS CRAFT APPRENTICES IN SEPTEMBER THIS  
YEAR.

BOTH HAD COMPLETED A BASIC CRAFT COURSE AT TECHNICAL INSTITUTES  
IN JULY AND HAD LONGED FOR FURTHER TRAINING.

THE APPRENTICESHIP SCHEME WAS ESTABLISHED IN MID-1950'S AND  
RESTRUCTURED IN 1969 TO TRAIN CRAFTSMEN AND TECHNICIANS FOR  
GOVERNMENT SERVICES AS WELL AS FOR THE PRIVATE SECTOR, SAID  
MR KWOK SEN, SUPERINTENDENT OF THE CENTRE.

+THE CRAFT APPRENTICESHIP SCHEME, OFFERED TO YOUNG PEOPLE WITH  
FORM 3 STANDARD, IS EXTENDED FOR THE FIRST TIME TO THE DISABLED. WE  
FEEL THAT DISABLED PEOPLE WITH POTENTIAL TO BECOME CRAFTSMEN AND  
TECHNICIANS SHOULD BE GIVEN THE SAME OPPORTUNITIES,+ MR KWOK  
EXPLAINED.

IN FACT, BOTH TANG AND LAM WERE CHOSEN AFTER AN OPEN EXAMINATION  
AND SELECTION INTERVIEW.

/+OF COURSE, .....

+OF COURSE, WE ARE AWARE OF THEIR PHYSICAL LIMITATIONS. TANG, FOR INSTANCE, WOULD HAVE DIFFICULTY TAKING UP DELICATE WORK THAT REQUIRES INTENSE VISUAL CONCENTRATION WHILE LAM WOULD NOT BE SUITABLE FOR WORK INVOLVING LONG HOURS OF STANDING.

+OTHER THAN THESE CONSIDERATIONS, WE ARE CONFIDENT THAT BOTH WILL SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETE THE FOUR-YEAR COURSE,+ MR KWOK SAID.

THE TRAINING CENTRE NOW COVERS EVERY MAJOR TRADE AND PLACES EQUAL EMPHASIS ON THEORIES AND PRACTICAL SKILLS.

INITIALLY, CRAFT APPRENTICES WILL ATTEND A SIX-MONTH FULL-TIME ENGINEERING COURSE AT TECHNICAL INSTITUTES, FOLLOWED BY SIX MONTHS' BASIC TRAINING AT THE CENTRE AND THREE YEARS' ON-THE-JOB TRAINING.

DURING THEIR ON-THE-JOB TRAINING, CRAFT APPRENTICES WILL REMAIN IN THE DEPARTMENT OR BE DEPLOYED TO OTHER GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS WHERE THEY WOULD RECEIVE INSTRUCTION AND HELP FROM WORKSHOP INSTRUCTORS AND EXPERIENCED WORKERS.

+ALTHOUGH THE GOVERNMENT DOES NOT GUARANTEE SUBSEQUENT EMPLOYMENT AFTER GRADUATION, A GREAT NUMBER OF POSTS SUCH AS INSPECTORS, WORKS SUPERVISORS AND ARTISANS ARE FILLED BY THESE YOUNG PERSONS AFTER TRAINING,+ MR KWOK SAID.

MR KWOK HOPED THAT MORE DISABLED YOUTHS WOULD BENEFIT FROM THE GOVERNMENT'S APPRENTICE TRAINING AND THAT THE PRIVATE SECTOR WOULD OFFER SIMILAR TRAINING FOR THEM.

#### IMPORTANCE OF OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH INFORMATION STRESSED

\* \* \*

IT IS IMPORTANT THAT INFORMATION ON OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH SHOULD BE BROUGHT TO THE NOTICE OF WORKERS AND MANAGEMENT IN THE INDUSTRIAL AREAS.

THIS WAS STATED BY THE DEPUTY COMMISSIONER FOR LABOUR, DR JAMES HAYES, AT THE CONCLUSION OF A SEVEN-DAY OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH PROMOTION SCHEME IN TSUEN WAN TODAY (SUNDAY).

DR HAYES SAID THE PROMOTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY AT WORK WAS THE JOINT RESPONSIBILITY OF BOTH EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYEES.

+AT EACH WORKPLACE, THE EMPLOYER MUST KNOW WHAT HAZARDS EXIST AND WHAT MEASURES SHOULD BE TAKEN TO REMOVE OR REDUCE THEM TO A MINIMUM,+ HE SAID.

HE ADDED THAT METHODS AGAINST HAZARDS COULD INCLUDE ADEQUATE VENTILATION, THE SUPPLY OF PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT, OPERATIONAL RULES AND PROPER HANDLING METHODS.

+ON THE EMPLOYEE'S SIDE, HE MUST PAY ATTENTION TO WORKPLACE RULES LAID DOWN BY HIS EMPLOYER, TAKE WHATEVER PROTECTIVE MEASURES ARE ADVISED, AND WEAR WHATEVER EQUIPMENT IS MADE AVAILABLE FOR HIS USE,+ DR HAYES SAID.

HE STRESSED THAT HEALTH AT WORK WAS AN ESSENTIAL PART OF ANY INDUSTRIAL PROCESS AND SHOULD BE GIVEN THE SAME ATTENTION AS DESIGN PRODUCTION, MARKETING AND PUBLICITY.

HE SAID THE TSUEN WAN OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH PROMOTION SCHEME, WHICH HAD ATTRACTED THOUSANDS OF VISITORS, WAS AN IMPORTANT STEP FORWARD.

DR HAYES, WHO IS ALSO CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMITTEE ON INDUSTRIAL SAFETY AND ACCIDENT PREVENTION OF THE LABOUR ADVISORY BOARD, SAID THE LABOUR DEPARTMENT'S OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH DIVISION PROVIDED A STRONG BACK-UP IN THE PROMOTION OF OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH IN HONG KONG.

HE SAID THE DIVISION ADVISED BOTH THE GOVERNMENT AND THE PUBLIC ON MATTERS CONCERNING THE HEALTH OF WORKERS AND THE HYGIENE OF THE WORKPLACE.

IT ALSO UNDERTOOK A SUPERVISORY FUNCTION TO ENSURE THE OBSERVANCE OF OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH STANDARDS AND PRACTICES IN INDUSTRY.

IN 1983, THE DIVISION CONDUCTED 945 FIELD SURVEYS - INCLUDING REFERRAL CASES BY THE DEPARTMENT'S FACTORY INSPECTORATE - AND STUDIES IN SELECTED AREAS SUCH AS COTTON DUST EXPOSURE IN THE SPINNING AND WEAVING INDUSTRIES, ASBESTOES HAZARDS IN THE BUTTON, SHIPBUILDING, INSULATING AND CAR INDUSTRIES, AND OTHER OCCUPATIONAL HAZARDS.

DR HAYES SAID THE DIVISION STROVE TO APPLY TO THE WORKPLACE A FULL RANGE OF MEDICAL AND HYGIENE KNOWLEDGE IN SAFEGUARDING THE WORKERS AND PROTECTING THEM AGAINST HEALTH HAZARDS.

#### EXTENDED TRANSPORT SERVICES FOR NEW YEAR

THE TRANSPORT DEPARTMENT TODAY (SUNDAY) REMINDED THE PUBLIC THAT PUBLIC TRANSPORT SERVICES WILL BE EXTENDED ON NEW YEAR'S EVE UNTIL EARLY THE FOLLOWING MORNING.

THE STAR FERRY'S ROUTE BETWEEN CENTRAL AND TSIM SHA TSUI WILL RUN ALL NIGHT. HONG KONG AND YAUMATI FERRY'S SERVICE BETWEEN CENTRAL AND JORDAN ROAD WILL OPERATE UNTIL 1 AM, WHILE ITS NORTH POINT-HUNG HOM SERVICE WILL BE EXTENDED UNTIL MIDNIGHT.

KOWLOON-CANTON RAILWAY SERVICES WILL BE EXTENDED UNTIL 1 AM.

PEAK TRAM SERVICES WILL BE EXTENDED TO 1 AM. TRAM SERVICES, EXCEPT THOSE AROUND THE HAPPY VALLEY LOOP AND BETWEEN WHITTY STREET AND KENNEDY TOWN, WILL OPERATE UNTIL 2 AM.

CHINA MOTOR BUS WILL EXTEND ITS SERVICES ON SEVERAL MAJOR ROUTES, INCLUDING NOS. 2, 4, 7, 10 AND 23.

THE LAST DEPARTURES ON ROUTE 2 FROM SHAU KEI WAN AND MACAU FERRY WILL BE AT 1.15 AM AND 2 AM RESPECTIVELY; ON NO. 4 FROM WA FU AND CENTRAL WILL BE AT 0.30 AM AND 1 AM; ON NO. 7 FROM SHEK PAI WAN AND CENTRAL AT 2 AM AND 2.30 AM; ON NO. 10 FROM NORTH POINT FERRY AND KENNEDY TOWN AT 1 AM AND 2 AM; AND ON NO. 23 FROM NORTH POINT FERRY AND POKFIELD ROAD AT 0.30 AM AND 1.15 AM.

KOWLOON MOTOR BUS WILL ALSO BE EXTENDING ITS SERVICES.

THE LAST DEPARTURES ON ROUTE 1A FROM SAU MAU PING AND STAR FERRY WILL BE AT 0.43 AM AND 1.40 AM RESPECTIVELY; ON NO. 5 FROM CHOI HUNG AND STAR FERRY AT 1.20 AM AND 2 AM; ON NO. 5C FROM TSZ WAN SHAN AND STAR FERRY AT 0.40 AM AND 1.30 AM; AND ON NO. 6 FROM LAI CHI KOK AND STAR FERRY AT 1.18 AM AND 2 AM.

THE CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUNDS ARE PROVIDED WITH A BROAD RANGE OF EQUIPMENT, INCLUDING SLIDES, SEESAWS, SWINGS AND MULTI-PURPOSE PLAY-STRUCTURES.

BUILT BY THE NEW TERRITORIES DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT, THE PROJECTS ARE MANAGED BY THE NTSD.

TERMINUS FOR TSIM SHA TSUI EAST

THE HIGHWAYS OFFICE OF THE ENGINEERING DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT IS INVITING TENDERS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A TEMPORARY PUBLIC TRANSPORT TERMINUS AT TSIM SHA TSUI EAST TO CATER FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE AREA.

THE TERMINUS WILL BE BUILT ON A 3 700-SQUARE-METRE SITE BETWEEN SCIENCE MUSEUM ROAD AND HONG TAT PATH.

BESIDES THE TERMINUS WITH THREE BUS BAYS, THE CONTRACT WILL COVER THE CONSTRUCTION OF ASSOCIATED FOOTWAYS AND DRAINAGE.

IT WILL ALSO INVOLVE THE PROVISION OF TAXI STANDS AND TERMINAL FACILITIES FOR KMB COACHES AND MAXICAB ROUTES.

WORK IS EXPECTED TO START IN FEBRUARY 1985 AND WILL TAKE ABOUT FIVE MONTHS TO COMPLETE.

The Hon. Rogerio Hyndman LOBO, CBE, JP

Mr Lobo has a long and impressive record of public service in a variety of fields. He is a member of the Executive Council and the Senior Unofficial Member of the Legislative Council.

C.M.G.

The Hon. Michael David THOMAS, QC

Mr Thomas became Attorney General in Hong Kong in June 1983. Prior to that he had had a distinguished career at the Bar and had served as Junior Counsel to the Ministry of Defence and the Treasury in admiralty matters.

C.B.E.

The Hon. CHAN Nai-keong, JP

Mr Chan joined the Government as a Pupil Engineer in 1952. In October 1980 he was promoted to Director of Engineering Development Department and to Secretary, Government Secretariat in July, 1984.

The Hon. Mr Justice LEONARD

Mr Justice Leonard joined the Hong Kong Judiciary in 1957 as Magistrate. He became a District Judge in 1970, a High Court Judge in 1971 and a Justice of Appeal in 1980. He retired in mid 1984.

Mr Gerald Paul NAZARETH, OBE, QC, JP

Mr Nazareth joined the Colonial Legal Service in Kenya in 1954. He next served in the British Solomon Islands Protectorate and with the West Pacific High Commission from 1963-1973. His Hong Kong Service began in 1976 and he has been a Law Officer since 1979.

Mr WOO Hon-fai, JP

Mr Woo has been the Chairman of the Chinese Gold and Silver Exchange Society for the last 12 years. He has been the Chairman of the Kam Ngan Stock Exchange during its 12 years of existence and was the first Chairman of the Committee of the Unified Stock Exchanges.

Mr Eric BLACKBURN, QPM, CPM, JP

Mr Blackburn joined the Royal Hong Kong Police as a Sub-Inspector in 1954 and was promoted to Gazetted Rank in 1960. He now holds the post of Deputy Commissioner of Police (Management).

Mr John CHAN Cho-chak, JP

Mr Chan joined the Civil Service in 1964 in the former Commerce and Industry Department. He later transferred to the Administrative Service in which he holds the rank of Administrative Officer, Staff Grade 'B'.

Mr CHEN Yuan-chu, JP

Mr Chen is Managing Director of Tai Hing Cotton Mill, Ltd. He retired from the Textiles Advisory Board in April 1983 after six years of service on the Board.

The Hon. Stephen CHEONG Kam-chuen, JP

Mr Cheong has been an Unofficial Member of the Legislative Council since December, 1980. He is also a member of the Textiles Advisory Board, Town Planning Board, Export Credit Insurance Corporation and the Transport Advisory Committee.

Mr Morrin joined the Royal Hong Kong Police in 1953 as a Sub-Inspector. He now holds the post of Director, Special Branch, in the rank of Deputy Commissioner of Police.

Miss Lydia CHEUNG Chi-ming, JP

Miss Cheung commenced her career with the Hong Kong Government in 1949 and is now Head of the Nursing Grade.

Mr Roy KILVERT, ED, JP

Mr Kilvert has served the Hong Kong Government for 33 years and has been head of department as the Director of Government Supplies since 1979.

Mr Graham John OSBORNE, JP

Mr Osborne was first appointed in 1958 as a Mechanical Engineer in the Electrical and Mechanical Office of the Public Works Department. He is now the Director of Electrical and Mechanical Services.

Mr Maurice Derek SARGANT, JP

Mr Sargent joined the Hong Kong Civil Service as an Executive Officer in 1950. He has been head of the Office of the Unofficial Members of the Executive and Legislative Councils since December 1978.

Mr CHENG Yang-ping

Mr Cheng joined the Hong Kong Civil Service as Chief Interpreter (Simultaneous Interpretation) in 1972. He was interpreter for the Governor and the Political Adviser in the Sino-British talks throughout their course.

Mr CHEUNG Man-sang

Mr Cheung joined the Government service in 1948 and served with the Health Inspectorate of the Urban Services Department for 35 years. He retired in June, 1984.

Mrs Peggy LAM PEI Yu-dja, JP

Mrs Lam has been Executive Director of the HK Family Planning Association since 1961. She is also a member of the Immigration Tribunal, the Board of Education and the Wanchai District Board.

Mrs Mona LEONG WONG Man-suen, JP

During the course of the last 14 years, Mrs Leong has held the posts of Chairman, and later President, of the HK Chinese Women's Club, one of the leading women's clubs for the promotion of women and children's welfare in Hong Kong.

Mr Edwin LEUNG Chung-ching

Mr Leung was a member of the Executive Committee of HK Federation of Youth Groups (1980-81), and a member of the Board of Architectural Education of the HK Institute of Architects (1979-80). He served as a Director of the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals in 1978-80, as a Vice-Chairman in 1980-83 and is the Chairman of the current Board.

Mr Geoffrey Charles LYTTON

Mr Lytton was first appointed to the HK Civil Service as a Revenue Inspector in 1957. He transferred to the Executive Grade in 1959 which he left in 1970 to become Secretary to the Polytechnic Planning Committee. He then became the General Secretary of the HK Polytechnic when it was established in August 1972, a post which he still holds.

Mr Charles Stuart WILKINSON, JP

Mr Wilkinson has been on secondment from the BBC to Radio Television HK since 1978. Initially he occupied the post of Deputy Director of Broadcasting, but subsequently became the Director of Broadcasting in 1981.

Major Nicholas Ward WOOLMINGTON, E.D.

Major Woolmington joined the Royal Hong Kong Regiment (The Volunteers) in 1967, was commissioned in 1968 and was promoted to his present rank in 1973. He is at present the Second-in-Command of the Regiment.

Mr Chan joined the civil service in April 1959. He was appointed as an Estate Caretaker in June 1961 and promoted to Head Estate Caretaker in October 1967.

Mr Chu started his career as an Office Assistant in 1950. He was appointed a Clerical Assistant in 1961 and has served since then in the Immigration Department.
