\$2.1 MILLION TO PROMOTE CIVIC EDUCATION

* * * * *

THE GOVERNMENT WILL SPEND \$2.1 MILLION NEXT YEAR FOR THE PROMOTION OF CIVIC EDUCATION, THE DEPUTY SECRETARY FOR DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION, MR BOWEN LEUNG, SAID TODAY (FRIDAY).

MR LEUNG WAS SPEAKING AT A RECEPTION FOR ORGANISATIONS WHICH HAD PARTICIPATED IN THE "TO CARE AND TO GIVE : CIVIC EDUCATION DAY" HELD AT VICTORIA PARK ON DECEMBER 18.

MR LEUNG SAID IT WAS ENCOURAGING THAT ABOUT 20,000 MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC HAD VISITED THE VARIOUS STALLS SET UP IN VICTORIA PARK ON THE DAY, MANY OF WHOM HAD SHOWN THEIR SUPPORT THROUGH DONATIONS OR JOINING THE VARIOUS SERVICE GROUPS ON THE SPOT.

"IN ONE SINGLE DAY, SOME 100 PEOPLE HAD DONATED BLOOD, 130 PEOPLE DONATED THEIR CORNEA AND 450 PEOPLE THEIR KIDNEYS," HE SAID.

IN ADDITION, THOUSANDS OF RESIDENTS HAD PLEDGED TO SERVE THE COMMUNITY BY HANGING HEART-SHAPED CARDS ON TO A CIVIC EDUCATION TREE, HE NOTED.

"THESE FIGURES CLEARLY SHOW THAT MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC ARE AWARE OF THE IMPORTANCE OF MUTUAL HELP AND CARE THROUGH ACTIVE PARTICIPATION AND INVOLVEMENT," MR LEUNG SAID.

THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE CIVIC EDUCATION DAY WAS TWO-FOLDED. FIRSTLY, IT HAD PROVIDED AN OPPORTUNITY FOR MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC TO KNOW ABOUT THE SERVICES OF THE PARTICIPATING ORGANISATIONS.

"SECONDLY, IT ENABLES THE COMMITTEE ON THE PROMOTION OF CIVIC EDUCATION TO ENTER INTO CONTACT WITH THE PARTICIPATING BODIES, THEREBY LAYING A FIRM FOUNDATION FOR FURTHER CO-OPERATION IN THE PROMOTION OF CIVIC EDUCATION," MR LEUNG SAID.

MR LEUNG HOPED THAT ALL PARTICIPATING BODIES WILL JOIN HANDS TOGETHER AGAIN IN FUTURE IN A JOINT EFFORT TO DRIVE HOME TO RESIDENTS THE CIVIC EDUCATION MESSAGES.

AT TODAY'S RECEPTION, WINNERS OF A YOUTH DRAWING COMPETITION HELD ON THE CIVIC EDUCATION DAY WERE PRESENTED PRIZES.

GOOD BUSINESS PROSPECTS FOR HONG KONG'S PRINTING INDUSTRY

* * * * *

BUSINESS IN THE PRINTING INDUSTRY SHOULD REMAIN GOOD FOR THE NEXT FEW YEARS BECAUSE OF THE FAVOURABLE EXCHANGE RATE OF THE HONG KONG DOLLAR, AND PROSPECTS FOR FOUR-COLOUR HARDBOUND BOOKS AND REPRODUCTION WORK ARE PARTICULARLY PROMISING, A NEWLY-PUBLISHED STUDY ON HONG KONG'S PRINTING INDUSTRY REPORTS.

THE STUDY IS THE FIFTH IN A SERIES OF STUDIES ON SELECTED MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES IN HONG KONG UNDERTAKEN BY THE INDUSTRY DEPARTMENT.

THE MAIN AIMS ARE TO GIVE AN INDICATION OF THE PRESENT STATE OF THE INDUSTRY AND TO SUGGEST LIKELY TRENDS.

HONG KONG IS NOW THE SECOND LARGEST EXPORTER OF QUALITY PRINTING WORK IN ASIA AFTER JAPAN.

THE INDUSTRY IS RENOWNED FOR ITS GOOD PRINTING QUALITY, QUICK DELIVERY, COMPETITIVE PRICES, AND ABILITY TO COPE WITH SHORT RUN PRINTING JOBS.

ACCORDING TO THE REPORT, OVERSEAS INVESTMENT HAD PLAYED AN IMPORTANT ROLE IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF HONG KONG'S PRINTING INDUSTRY THROUGH TECHNOLOGY TRANSFER, AND HAD ALSO CONTRIBUTED TO THE TERRITORY'S REPUTATION AS THE PRINTING CENTRE IN THE REGION.

STRONG INTEREST WAS STILL SHOWN BY OVERSEAS INVESTORS TO SET UP PRINTING FACILITIES IN HONG KONG.

THE REPORT HOWEVER WARNED THAT UNLESS LOCAL PRINTERS EXPAND THEIR PRODUCTION CAPACITIES SUBSTANTIALLY, THEY WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO FURTHER PENETRATE INTERNATIONAL MARKETS.

ON FUTURE MARKET POTENTIAL, THE REPORT NOTED THAT BOOK PRINTING AND THE PRODUCTION OF COLOUR SEPARATION PROVIDED THE GREATEST EXPORT OPPORTUNITIES FOR HONG KONG PRINTERS, PARTICULARLY IN MAJOR MARKETS LIKE THE UNITED STATES, UNITED KINGDOM AND AUSTRALIA.

AS FOR THE CHINA MARKET, HONG KONG PRINTERS WOULD HAVE AN INCREASING ROLE IN PRODUCING HIGH QUALITY PUBLICITY MATERIALS FOR CHINA'S EXPORTS AND TOURIST INDUSTRY.

ON FUTURE TRENDS IT WAS ENVISAGED THAT PRODUCTION OF ALBUMS AND DIARIES, WHICH REQUIRED LOWER PRINTING SKILLS, WOULD CONTINUE TO MOVE TO CHINA TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF LOWER LABOUR COSTS.

BUT PRINTING OF OTHER PRINTED MATERIAL WOULD REMAIN IN HONG KONG MAINLY BECAUSE HIGHER LABOUR SKILLS WERE NEEDED.

SHEET-FED OFFSET WOULD CONTINUE TO BE THE MOST WIDELY ADOPTED PRINTING METHOD OF HONG KONG'S PRINTING INDUSTRY.

BESIDES LABOUR SHORTAGE, THE STUDY IDENTIFIED A NUMBER OF PROBLEMS FACING THE INDUSTRY, SUCH AS THE LIMITED NUMBER OF LARGE PRINTERS, SLOWDOWN OF CAPITAL INVESTMENT, INSUFFICIENT TRAINING FACILITIES, SHORTAGE OF INDUSTRIAL PREMISES IN URBAN AREAS, HIGH PAPER COSTS, MACHINE MANNING LEVELS AND ABSENCE OF TECHNICAL CONSULTANCY SERVICES.

THESE PROBLEMS COULD ONLY BE OVERCOME THROUGH HEAVY INVESTMENT IN MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT, IMPROVED TECHNICAL TRAINING, OVERSEAS TRADE PROMOTION AND EMPLOYMENT OF TECHNICAL CONSULTANCY SERVICES.

IN SEPTEMBER 1987, THE PRINTING INDUSTRY COMPRISED 3,577 ESTABLISHMENTS, CONSTITUTING 7.1 PER CENT OF HONG KONG'S TOTAL NUMBER OF MANUFACTURING ESTABLISHMENTS.

IN TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT, PRINTING RANKED AS HONG KONG'S SIXTH LARGEST INDUSTRY, EMPLOYING 33,702 PERSONS OR 3.9 PER CENT OF HONG KONG'S TOTAL INDUSTRIAL EMPLOYMENT.

AT THE END OF 1987, THERE WERE 19 FACTORIES WITH OVERSEAS INTEREST EMPLOYING A TOTAL OF 2,997 PERSONS. THE VALUE OF OVERSEAS INVESTMENT WAS HK\$1,246 MILLION.

THE GOVERNMENT TODAY (FRIDAY) ANNOUNCED THE APPOINTMENT OF SIX NEW MEMBERS TO THE ACTION COMMITTEE AGAINST NARCOTICS (ACAN), THE SOLE ADVISORY BODY ON ALL POLICY MATTERS RELATING TO THE ERADICATION OF DRUG TRAFFICKING AND ABUSE IN HONG KONG.

THEY ARE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MEMBERS, MRS PEGGY LAM PEI YU-DJA AND DR EDWARD LEONG CHE-HUNG; MR ROBERT GAFF, CHAIRMAN OF THE HONG KONG COUNCIL OF SOCIAL SERVICE; FATHER FRANCISCO LERDA, PRESIDENT OF HONG KONG CARITAS; MRS EVA KO LI BIK-CHI, A SENIOR LECTURER OF THE CHINESE UNIVERSITY OF HONG KONG; AND MR AUGUSTINE NG CHEUK-TAI, A SOCIAL WORK ADMINISTRATOR.

THEIR APPOINTMENTS, EFFECTIVE FROM JANUARY 1, 1989, WILL BE FOR ONE YEAR.

THE GOVERNMENT ALSO ANNOUNCED THE RE-APPOINTMENT OF DR GERALD CHOA AS THE CHAIRMAN OF ACAN FOR TWO YEARS.

ALSO RE-APPOINTED AS ACAN MEMBERS FOR ONE YEAR ARE MR FREDERICK YU SAK-KWONG, CHAIRMAN OF THE SOCIETY FOR THE AID AND REHABILITATION OF DRUG ABUSERS; DR JEFFREY DAY, CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMUNITY DRUG ADVISORY COUNCIL; AND DR SO SING-CHO, A NEURO-SURGEON.

THERE WILL BE A TOTAL OF 12 UNOFFICIAL AND 10 OFFICIAL MEMBERS ON ACAN IN 1989.

THE OTHER TWO SERVING UNOFFICIAL MEMBERS ARE MR ALAN HOO, A BARRISTER, AND MR PAO PING-WING, AN URBAN COUNCILLOR, WHOSE APPOINTMENTS WILL EXPIRE NEXT DECEMBER.

THE TEN OFFICIAL MEMBERS ARE THE SECRETARY FOR SECURITY, DIRECTOR OF MEDICAL AND HEALTH SERVICES, COMMISSIONER OF POLICE, DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION, DIRECTOR OF SOCIAL WELFARE, COMMISSIONER OF CORRECTIONAL SERVICES, COMMISSIONER OF CUSTOMS AND EXCISE, DIRECTOR OF INFORMATION SERVICES, COMMISSIONER FOR NARCOTICS, AND A REPRESENTATIVE OF HEALTH AND WELFARE BRANCH OF THE GOVERNMENT SECRETARIAT.

COMMENTING ON THE NEW COMPOSITION OF ACAN, THE COMMISSIONER FOR NARCOTICS, MR GARETH MULLOY, SAID THAT THE STATUS AND VALUE OF THE ADVISORY BODY WOULD BE FURTHER ENHANCED BY THE ADDITIONAL REPRESENTATIVES FROM PROFESSIONAL AND COMMUNITY BODIES.

"CONSIDERABLE PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE IN RECENT YEARS IN THE FIGHT AGAINST ILLICIT DRUGS, BUT MUCH REMAINS TO BE DONE.

"IT IS HOPED THAT THE NEW APPOINTEES WITH THEIR RICH EXPERIENCE WILL MAKE A VALUABLE CONTRIBUTION TO THE DELIBERATIONS OF ACAN," HE ADDED.

HONG KONG JOINS REGIONAL AQUACULTURE NETWORK

* * * * *

HONG KONG HAS JOINED THE NETWORK OF AQUACULTURE CENTRES IN ASIA AND THE PACIFIC (NACA) AFTER SIGNING AND RATIFYING THE NACA AGREEMENT EARLIER THIS MONTH.

THE INSTRUMENT OF RATIFICATION FOR THE NACA AGREEMENT WAS SIGNED AND DEPOSITED IN THE HEADQUARTERS OF THE UNITED NATIONS FOOD AND AGRICULTURE ORGANISATION (FAO) IN ROME ON DECEMBER 14.

THE BRUSSELS-BASED MINISTER FOR HONG KONG'S COMMERCIAL RELATIONS WITH THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES AND THE MEMBER STATES, MR STEUART WEBB-JOHNSON, SIGNED ON BEHALF OF THE GOVERNMENT.

NACA IS A REGIONAL INTER-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANISATION WHICH AIMS TO PROMOTE AQUACULTURE FISHERIES PRODUCTION THROUGH RESEARCH, TRAINING AND RELATED INFORMATION ACTIVITIES, CO-ORDINATED BY A NETWORK STRUCTURE.

THE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR (FISHERIES) OF THE AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES DEPARTMENT, DR CHRISTOPHER LEE, SAID TODAY (FRIDAY) THAT HONG KONG HAD OVER THE PAST DECADE BEEN ASSOCIATED WITH NACA WHEN IT WAS OPERATED AS A PROGRAMME UNDER THE FAO AND FUNDED BY THE UNITED NATIONS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME.

NACA HAS RECENTLY RECONSTITUTED ITSELF INTO AN INTER-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANISATION WITH ITS HEADQUARTERS IN BANGKOK, THAILAND.

AS A FULL MEMBER, HONG KONG WOULD CONTINUE TO BENEFIT FROM PARTICIPATION IN NACA'S ACTIVITIES DESIGNED TO PROMOTE AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT ON A REGIONAL BASIS, DR LEE SAID.

"WITH THIS IN MIND, IT IS OUR INTENTION THAT HONG KONG SHOULD MAINTAIN ITS MEMBER STATUS IN THE NACA AFTER 1997," HE ADDED.

AQUACULTURE HAS IN RECENT YEARS PLAYED AN INCREASING ROLE IN PRODUCTION IN HONG KONG'S FISHERIES AND IN THE RURAL ECONOMY GENERALLY, AND FUTURE TECHNOLOGICAL DEVELOPMENTS WILL HELP IN IMPROVING PRODUCTION EFFICIENCY AND REDUCING ANY POSSIBLE IMPACT ON THE ENVIRONMENT.

"THE RESEARCH ACTIVITIES OF NACA IN THESE AREAS WILL THEREFORE BE OF CONSIDERABLE VALUE TO HONG KONG WHICH WILL ALSO DERIVE BENEFIT FROM THE TECHNICAL TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES AND OTHER TECHNICAL INFORMATION OFFERED BY NACA," DR LEE SAID.

AT PRESENT, OTHER GOVERNMENTS IN THE ASIAN AND PACIFIC REGION WHICH HAVE SIGNED THE NACA AGREEMENT COMPRISE CHINA, NEPAL, THE DEMOCRATIC PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF KOREA AND SRI LANKA.

CANDIDATES MAY SPEND MORE ON UC/RC ELECTIONS

THE EXPENDITURE CEILING FOR THE COMING URBAN AND REGIONAL COUNCIL ELECTIONS IN MARCH 1989 WILL BE RAISED FROM \$35,000 TO \$43,000 AS PROMULGATED IN THE URBAN COUNCIL, REGIONAL COUNCIL AND DISTRICT BOARDS ELECTION EXPENSES (AMENDMENT) ORDER 1988 GAZETTED TODAY (FRIDAY).

"THIS ADJUSTMENT, WHICH IS THE RESULT OF A REVIEW CONDUCTED RECENTLY, IS BASED ON INFLATION SINCE AUGUST 1985 WHEN THE PREVIOUS LIMIT WAS SET," SAID A GOVERNMENT SPOKESMAN.

HE SAID THAT THE LIMITS ON ELECTION EXPENSES WERE REVIEWED ON A REGULAR BASIS AND IN TWO STAGES.

"A REVIEW IS CARRIED OUT IMMEDIATELY AFTER EACH ELECTION AND AGAIN SIX MONTHS BEFORE THE NEXT ELECTION SO THAT THE LIMITS MAY KEEP UP WITH CHANGING CIRCUMSTANCES AND INFLATION," HE SAID.

"THE LIMITS MUST BE NEITHER SO HIGH AS TO GIVE A CANDIDATE WITH AMPLE FINANCIAL RESOURCES AN UNFAIR ADVANTAGE OVER HIS LESS WELL-OFF COMPETITORS, NOR SO LOW AS TO RESTRICT CAMPAIGN ACTIVITIES UNREASONABLY."

IMPROVEMENTS TO NEW PENSION SCHEME

IMPROVEMENTS ARE MADE TO THE EXISTING PENSION LEGISLATION BY REMOVING TECHNICAL ANOMALIES WHICH HAVE COME TO LIGHT SINCE THE INTRODUCTION OF THE NEW PENSION SCHEME LAST YEAR.

THE AMENDMENTS ARE CONTAINED IN THE PENSIONS (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS 1988 GAZETTED TODAY (FRIDAY).

"THE AMENDMENTS ARE LARGELY TECHNICAL AND WILL IN NO WAY AFFECT OR ERODE CIVIL SERVANTS' EXISTING PENSION RIGHTS. THE STAFF SIDES HAVE BEEN INFORMED," A GOVERNMENT SPOKESMAN SAID.

THE REGULATIONS WILL BE LAID BEFORE THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ON JANUARY 11, 1989.

LIVE CLEAN AND STAY HEALTHY CAMPAIGN STARTS NEXT WEEK

A TWO-MONTH CAMPAIGN TO DRIVE HOME THE MESSAGE OF THE IMPORTANCE OF ENVIRONMENTAL HYGIENE AND SANITATION WILL BE LAUNCHED NEXT THURSDAY (JANUARY 5, 1989).

JOINTLY ORGANISED BY THE HEALTH EDUCATION UNIT (OF THE MUNICIPAL SERVICES BRANCH, THE URBAN COUNCIL AND THE REGIONAL COUNCIL, THE 1989 "LIVE CLEAN AND STAY HEALTHY" CAMPAIGN WILL BE PUBLICISED THROUGH THE BUILDING SANITATION EXHIBITION.

THE EXHIBITION WILL BE MOUNTED IN THE EXHIBITION GALLERY OF SHATIN TOWN HALL FROM NEXT THURSDAY (JANUARY 5) TO JANUARY 11, 1989; AND IN THE EXHIBITION HALL OF CITY HALL FROM JANUARY 14 TO 24.

IT WILL BE OPENED TO THE PUBLIC EVERY DAY FROM 10 AM TO 9 PM AND RESIDENTS ARE WELCOME TO ATTEND. ADMISSION IS FREE.

"THE CAMPAIGN IS AIMED AT PROMOTING PUBLIC AWARENESS ON WAYS TO PREVENT AND ABATE SANITARY NUISANCES COMMONLY FOUND IN RESIDENTIAL BUILDINGS, AND TO ENHANCE ENVIRONMENTAL HYGIENE," A SPOKESMAN FOR THE MUNICIPAL SERVICES BRANCH SAID.
