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KAI TAK AIRPORT BEING EXTENDED AND MODERNISED

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KAI TAK, HONG KONG'S INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT, IS BEING EXTENDED AND MODERNISED UNDER ITS LONG-TERM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME.

EARLY NEXT MONTH, THE NEW EXTENSIONS TO THE ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE LEVELS WILL BE OPENED, MAKING THE GREETING AREA AND THE DEPARTURES HALL MORE SPACIOUS.

AT THE SAME TIME, NEW PASSENGER FACILITIES WILL PROGRESSIVELY BE BROUGHT INTO USE. THESE INCLUDE A DEPARTURE CHECK-IN ISLAND COMPRISING 36 COUNTERS FOR AIRLINES, A GROUP BAGGAGE CONVEYING SYSTEM AND AN INCLINED +RACE-TRACK+ BAGGAGE RECLAIM UNIT.

+ALL THESE NEW FACILITIES ARE BEING MADE AVAILABLE IN ANTICIPATION OF THE TRAFFIC GROWTH AND DEMAND FOR ADEQUATE SERVICES IN THE YEARS AHEAD,+ A SPOKESMAN FOR THE AIRPORT MANAGEMENT SAID.

+AN ANNUAL GROWTH OF ABOUT 10 TO 12 PER CENT IN PASSENGER TRAFFIC IS EXPECTED IN THE NEXT FEW YEARS AND IT IS ESSENTIAL TO MAKE AVAILABLE NEW FACILITIES AT THE AIRPORT TO MEET THE REQUIREMENT,+ HE SAID.

+THE EXISTING DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME WILL CONTINUE FOR ABOUT TWO MORE YEARS AND IN EARLY 1982, KAI TAK AIRPORT WILL HAVE TAKEN A NEW LOOK AND BE READY TO ACCEPT THE CHALLENGES OF THE FIRST HALF OF THE DECADE,+ THE SPOKESMAN ADDED.

THE NEW CHECK-IN ISLAND IS SIMILAR TO THOSE IN THE EXTENDED PASSENGER TERMINAL. EACH OF THE 36 COUNTERS HAS BEEN EQUIPPED WITH A CONVEYORISED WEIGH SCALE WHERE BAGGAGE, AFTER BEING CHECKED AND WEIGHED, WILL BE FED TO A LATERAL CONVEYOR.

THIS CONVEYOR BELT IS LINKED TO A SEMI-AUTOMATIC BAGGAGE SYSTEM AT THE TERMINAL BASEMENT WHERE BAGGAGE WILL BE SORTED BY A COMPUTER AND CHANNELLED TO DESIGNATED POSITIONS FOR LOADING ONTO AIRCRAFT.

THE GROUP BAGGAGE SYSTEM WILL DELIVER THE BAGGAGE OF DEPARTING GROUP TRAVELLERS VIA A VERTICAL CONVEYOR BELT TO A COLLECTION POINT FOR LOADING ONTO AIRCRAFT. IT WILL BE ABLE TO HANDLE ABOUT 1 000 BAGS PER HOUR.

THE NEW BAGGAGE RECLAIM UNIT, THE THIRD OF ITS TYPE TO BE BROUGHT INTO OPERATION IN THE BAGGAGE RECLAIM HALL, WILL BE ABLE TO HANDLE THE PASSENGER BAGGAGE OF A JUMBO JET WITHIN 15 MINUTES.

BAGGAGE OF ARRIVING PASSENGERS WILL BE FED BY TWO INDUCTION BELTS ONTO THE INCLINED +RACE-TRACK+ CONVEYOR AT A RATE OF ABOUT 70 BAGS PER MINUTE.

JAM DETECTION DEVICES ARE PROVIDED AND IF A BAG IS BLOCKED AT ANY POINT, AN INDICATOR SHOWING THE LOCATION OF THE JAM WILL ENSURE RAPID ATTENTION.

/AFTER THE .....

AFTER THE OPENING OF THE EXTENDED GREETING AREA AND DEPARTURES HALL, SOME PORTIONS OF THE OLDER TERMINAL BUILDING WILL BE CLOSED FOR DEVELOPMENT.

THESE WILL INCLUDE THE OLD CHECK-IN COUNTERS AT THE DEPARTURES HALL AND THE EXISTING BANK PREMISES, POLICE POST AND PRESS ROOM AT THE ARRIVALS LEVEL.

THE BANK HAS BEEN RE-LOCATED TO NEW PREMISES AT THE DEPARTURES HALL AND THE POLICE AND PRESS TO ALTERNATIVE ACCOMMODATION AT THE EXTENDED GREETING AREA WHERE A NEW INFORMATION COUNTER MANNED BY CIVIL AVIATION DEPARTMENT STAFF IS ALSO LOCATED.

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TOWN HALL BOOKINGS BEGIN

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APPLICATIONS FOR THE BOOKING OF THE VARIOUS FACILITIES WITHIN THE NEW TSUEN WAN TOWN HALL ARE BEING ACCEPTED NOW.

IN ORDER TO ALLOW TIME FOR PROCESSING AND THE ALLOCATION OF DATES, APPLICATION FORMS FOR THE AUDITORIUM, CULTURAL ACTIVITIES HALL AND EXHIBITION GALLERY SHOULD PREFERABLY BE SUBMITTED SEVEN MONTHS IN ADVANCE.

THE BOOKING PERIOD FOR THE LECTURE ROOM AND CONFERENCE ROOM IS NORMALLY THREE MONTHS PRIOR TO THE DATE ON WHICH THE VENUE IS REQUIRED.

WHERE THERE IS MORE THAN ONE APPLICATION FOR THE SAME DATE, THE ALLOCATION WILL BE DECIDED BY THE TOWN HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE WHO WILL ENDEAVOUR TO GIVE PRIORITY TO FUNCTIONS WHICH HAVE HIGH INTRINSIC MERIT AS WELL AS WIDE PUBLIC APPEAL.

THE MAIN AUDITORIUM, WHICH SEATS 1 500, IS SUITABLE FOR ALL TYPES OF LIVE PERFORMANCES.

THE STAGE CAN ACCOMMODATE UP TO 100 MUSICIANS AND 60 SINGERS. IN ADDITION, THERE IS AN ORCHESTRA PIT WITH ROOM FOR 50 PLAYERS.

THE CULTURAL ACTIVITIES HALL ON THE SECOND FLOOR OF THE BUILDING HAS AN AREA OF OVER 372 SQUARE METRES AND CAN BE USED FOR CONFERENCES, EXHIBITIONS, MUSIC RECITALS AND COCKTAIL PARTIES.

THE EXHIBITION GALLERY IS ONLY SLIGHTLY SMALLER IN AREA AND IS EQUIPPED WITH ALL THE NECESSARY LIGHT FITTINGS AND SCREENS FOR STAGING DISPLAYS.

THE LECTURE ROOM HAS A SEATING CAPACITY OF 60 AND THE CONFERENCE ROOM 40. IN ADDITION TO LECTURES AND MEETINGS, BOTH ROOMS CAN BE USED FOR REHEARSALS.

ALL THE VENUES ARE AIR-CONDITIONED AND THE SERVICES PROVIDED INCLUDE HIGHLY SOPHISTICATED SOUND AND LIGHTING SYSTEMS, SLIDE AND FILM PROJECTORS AND CERTAIN MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS.

A SPOKESMAN FOR THE TOWN HALL MANAGEMENT SAID TODAY (SUNDAY) HIRERS MAY FIND SEVERAL ADVANTAGES IN MAKING USE OF THE FACILITIES AT THE NEW CULTURAL COMPLEX.

WITH THE GENERAL DEVELOPMENT OF SERVICES IN TSUEN WAN, THE TOWN HALL IS EASILY ACCESSIBLE TODAY BY ALL MODES OF TRANSPORT.

THE TERMINUS FOR BUSES ON A TOTAL OF 15 ROUTES IS LOCATED JUST ONE BLOCK AWAY. THE PIER FOR FERRY SERVICES FROM CENTRAL IS ALSO NEARBY AND IS ITSELF SERVICED BY ANOTHER TWO BUS ROUTES WHICH PASS THE TOWN HALL.

ACCESSIBILITY WILL BE MADE EVEN EASIER WITH THE EVENTUAL OPENING OF THE TSUEN WAN EXTENSION OF THE MASS TRANSIT RAILWAY.

PRESSURE ON BOOKINGS AT THE TOWN HALL WILL BE LESS HEAVY AT THE BEGINNING THAN IS THE CASE AT PRESENT WITH OTHER SIMILAR VENUES ELSEWHERE IN HONG KONG AND HIRERS MAY HAVE A BETTER CHANCE OF SECURING THE DATES REQUESTED.

THE SCALE OF FEES IS 20 PER CENT LOWER THAN THE NEW HIRE CHARGES FOR THE CITY HALL ANNOUNCED RECENTLY.

THE GOVERNMENT HAS ALSO JUST APPROVED A SCHEME WHEREBY CULTURAL AND ARTISTIC ORGANISATIONS MAY APPLY FOR A REDUCTION IN CHARGES.

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AMS ENTERING 30TH YEAR OF COMMUNITY SERVICE  
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THE AUXILIARY MEDICAL SERVICE IS ENTERING ITS 30TH YEAR OF COMMUNITY SERVICE IN THE NEW YEAR.

THE AMS, FORMED IN 1950, IS ALWAYS READY TO BACK UP REGULAR MEDICAL AND HEALTH SERVICES IN HANDLING ANY EMERGENCY SITUATION, AND IN PROVIDING MEDICAL AND NURSING SERVICES TO THE COMMUNITY.

THE AMS MEDICAL DEFENCE STAFF OFFICER, MR. K.C. TONG, SAID AMS MEMBERS HAVE BEEN CALLED OUT TO PROVIDE FIRST AID AND MEDICAL SERVICE IN FIRES, FLOODS, TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS, LANDSLIDES AND HOUSE COLLAPSES.

THEY HAVE ALSO SPENT THOUSANDS OF HOURS IN CARING FOR THE VIETNAMESE REFUGEES.

APART FROM EMERGENCY DUTIES, MR. TONG SAID, AMS MEMBERS ALSO PROVIDED SERVICES TO THE COMMUNITY ON A REGULAR BASIS, USUALLY ON WEEKENDS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

THESE SERVICES INCLUDE NURSING THE SICK IN HOSPITALS, MANNING AMBULANCE DEPOTS AND SICK BAYS, ACTING AS LIFEGUARDS AT PUBLIC BEACHES AND SWIMMING POOLS, ADMINISTERING METHADONE AT DETOXIFICATION CENTRES, AS WELL AS PROVIDING FIRST AID SERVICE AT MAJOR PUBLIC FUNCTIONS.

PERMANENT STAFF AT THE AMS HEADQUARTERS ALSO CONDUCT FIRST AID TRAINING COURSES FOR CIVIL SERVANTS THROUGHOUT THE YEAR.

MR. TONG POINTED OUT THAT THERE ARE NOW ALMOST 6 000 AMS MEMBERS. THEY COME FROM ALL WALKS OF LIFE AND ABOUT ONE SIXTH OF THEM ARE DOCTORS, NURSES, DISPENSERS, RADIOGRAPHERS AND PARAMEDICAL PERSONNEL WHILE THE REST ARE LAYMEN TRAINED IN THE MEDICAL AND HEALTH FIELD.

THESE LAYMEN ARE REQUIRED TO UNDERGO 40 HOURS OF BASIC FIRST AID TRAINING BEFORE BEING ACCEPTED AS A FULL MEMBER. PRIOR TO BEING CALLED OUT FOR DUTY THEY WILL HAVE TO RECEIVE OTHER TYPES OF TRAINING.

AMS MEMBERS ALSO CONTINUOUSLY RECEIVE OTHER APPROPRIATE TRAINING ON CASUALTY EVACUATION, LIFE-SAVING AND AMBULANCE DRIVING.

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TRAFFIC ARRANGEMENTS IN TAI KOK TSUI

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NEW TRAFFIC ARRANGEMENTS WILL BE IMPLEMENTED IN TAI KOK TSUI FROM 10 AM ON WEDNESDAY TO IMPROVE TRAFFIC FLOW.

UNDER THE ARRANGEMENTS, NORTHBOUND TRAFFIC ON TONG MEI ROAD WILL BE PROHIBITED FROM TURNING LEFT ONTO ANCHOR STREET.

WESTBOUND TRAFFIC ON MONG KOK ROAD WILL BE PROHIBITED FROM TURNING LEFT ONTO TONG MEI ROAD.

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NEW YEAR HONOURS LIST 1980

KBE (Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire)

The Honourable Charles Philip HADDON-CAVE, CMG, JP

Mr. Haddon-Cave has a long and distinguished career in the public service. He joined the public service in East Africa in 1952 where he reached the rank of Under-Secretary to the Treasury in Kenya in 1959. Following a year as Treasurer and Secretary for Finance in Seychelles he returned to Kenya to become Deputy Secretary in the Ministry of Agriculture. He was transferred to Hong Kong in 1962. He then served as Assistant Director and Deputy Director of the Commerce and Industry Department, until he moved to the Government Secretariat as Deputy Economic Secretary in 1967.

He was subsequently appointed Deputy Financial Secretary in 1968 and Financial Secretary in July 1971.

The prosperity of Hong Kong and the ability of its Government to promote its policies of social improvements, depend upon sound fiscal and economic policies and direction. In this, the role of the Financial Secretary is crucial and Mr. Haddon-Cave has steered Hong Kong's economy with skill and sagacity for eight years, which included a period of severe recession.

He enjoys a high reputation not only in Hong Kong but in international financial circles, where much of the credit for Hong Kong's continuing economic success in recent years is rightly attributed to him.

CBE (Commander Order of the British Empire)

Dr. the Honourable Harry FANG Sin-yang, OBE, JP

Dr. Fang is a practitioner in orthopaedic surgery, an honorary lecturer in surgery at Hong Kong University and the holder of several senior appointments in surgery and medical administration in Hong Kong.

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Despite a full professional life, he has an impressive record of public and voluntary service. He is Chairman of the Medical Development Advisory Committee, a member of the Social Welfare Advisory Committee, and has served on the Medical Council and the Medical Advisory Board. His extensive voluntary service includes past presidency of the Hong Kong Medical Association and the British Medical Association Hong Kong Branch, and he is presently Chairman of the Hong Kong Society for Rehabilitation, President of the Federation of Medical Societies in Hong Kong, and on the international stage, Vice President of Rehabilitation International. He was appointed to the Legislative Council in 1974 and to Executive Council in 1978 and continues to serve ably on both.

CBE (Commander Order of the British Empire)

Mr. Richard HUGHES

Mr. Richard Hughes, the 'doyen' of the journalist corps in Hong Kong, has been, for many years, the Far East correspondent of the Times and Sunday Times and a contributor to the Economist and other publications. A journalist and foreign correspondent with a most distinguished career spanning almost 50 years, he has served in Shanghai, Moscow, Tokyo and Hong Kong. His knowledge of Hong Kong, its history and its life today is extensive. He is the author of "Hong Kong : Borrowed Place Borrowed Time" in which he presents a lucid survey of its past, its economic and social life and its prospects for the future. First published in 1968, it has been revised and reissued and continues to give pleasure and to command respect.

Mr. Richard Hughes' style, his informal approach and his remarkable ability to enlighten and inform without wasting words, have done much to publicise Hong Kong accurately in the English speaking world.

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OBE (Officer Order of the British Empire)

Mr. Peter Kenneth CAVAYE

Mr. Cavaye joined the British Council in 1965 and has served twice in Nigeria and in Thailand and is now Representative in Hong Kong. In addition to a normal British Council programme here he has undertaken the expansion of the important English Teaching Centre to a point where for the last two years the whole Council operation in Hong Kong has become self-financing. The administrative and financial management of the Centre, which has 7 000 students and over 60 staff is itself a complex operation, but in addition he has created a number of new English courses, many of them in the public sector, as a direct agent of the Hong Kong Government, and has energetically maintained the cultural and educational programme at its previous level.

OBE (Officer Order of the British Empire)

Mr. CHENG Chik-chi

Mr. Cheng is a philanthropist and a highly respected senior member of the local community. For many years he has personally involved himself in a variety of projects aimed at helping New Territories people. He privately sponsored under-privileged children from Ho Chung in Sai Kung District seeking secondary education, and he is an annual donor to the Wah Kiu Yat Pao's children's school fund. One of his companies, Chiap Hua Manufactory, situated at Junk Bay, has given financial and material assistance to the nearby village of Tseung Kwun O. He donated an ambulance to the local branch of the Auxiliary Service. More recently he has given over one million dollars towards the Sai Kung Hang Hau Secondary School project.

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CBE (Officer Order of the British Empire)

Mr. Geoffrey Douglas EDEN, JP

Mr. Eden joined the Hong Kong Government in 1961 as a Treasury Accountant. He was promoted to Senior Treasury Accountant in 1966 and Principal Treasury Accountant in 1972, and served with the Kowloon Canton Railway and the Education Department as well as in the Treasury. He was appointed Director of Accounting Services in 1978, and as such is responsible for the management and supervision of the accounting operations of the Government. Mr. Eden is well-known in Hong Kong also for his contribution over the years, as both actor and producer, to the development of amateur theatre.

OBE (Officer Order of the British Empire)

Dr. Edward Hamilton PATERSON, JP

Dr. Paterson has served continuously in Hong Kong since 1951 at first through the London Missionary Society, and later as a worker supported by the Council for World Mission in which the Hong Kong Synod of the Church of Christ in China is fully participating.

His work was at first with the Nethersole Hospital, of which he became Medical Superintendent, and he then developed the major project at Kwun Tong to create a large hospital and health centre for that area. By his skills and perseverance the churches in Hong Kong were able to come together, with international and local backing, to open the United Christian Hospital at Kwun Tong. To this he added a new vision of community health care. Dr. Paterson continues to lead the work of these two major hospitals with great insight and devotion.

OBE (Officer Order of the British Empire)

Mr. John George STEAN, JP

Since joining the Buildings Ordinance Office in 1958, as a Building Surveyor, Mr. Stean has shown himself a leader in his professional field and an officer of wide administrative ability. During the disastrous rainstorms in 1972, he demonstrated his ability to organise an emergency operations centre and marshalled his staff and resources with calm efficiency. The subsequent Commission of Enquiry into the effects of the rain-storms was indebted to him for his comprehensive and clear reporting which greatly aided the deliberations and findings.

In 1974 he was appointed Director of Building Development, with responsibilities including the Architectural Office and the Buildings Ordinance Office. Mr. Stean serves on a number of important boards and committees, including the Council of the Polytechnic, the Hong Kong Housing Authority and the Town Planning Board. The building programmes in both the public and private sectors in recent years have placed an increased burden on his Department and throughout he has shown outstanding qualities in leadership, energy and total dedication.

OBE (Officer Order of the British Empire)

Mr. Frederick Morphet WATSON, QFSM, JP

Mr. Watson has had a long and distinguished career in the Fire Service. After eight years with British Fire Service he joined the Hong Kong Fire Service in 1955 as a Station Officer. He progressed through the ranks to become Deputy Director of Fire Services in 1970 and Director in 1975. Under his dedicated leadership the Service has continued to expand to cope with Hong Kong's phenomenal building growth and has attained an enviable record in both fire fighting and fire prevention.

ISO (Imperial Service Order)

Mr. Royson Vaughan Lindsay HATTON

Mr. Hatton has completed nearly 29 years service for the Hong Kong Government, mostly with the Commerce and Industry (now Trade, Industry and Customs) Department. He was appointed Assistant Commissioner of the Customs and Excise Service in 1972.

In this role he is the day-to-day operational commander of the Service. He has implemented the Hong Kong Government's continuing policy of intensive enforcement activity against narcotics and more latterly against copyright offences which had become a problem for Hong Kong. In both fields the Service has achieved notable results. In spite of the difficulties of the period in which he has been Assistant Commissioner, the Service has achieved outstanding success and an international reputation of high standing. This is very much as a result of Mr. Hatton's personal qualities.

ISO (Imperial Service Order)

Mr. John Dudley ROMER, MBE

Since his arrival in Hong Kong in 1946 with the British Military Administration and his appointment in 1947 as Rodent Control Officer, he has served in the Urban Services Department. He has been Senior Pest Control Officer since 1971. He is Honorary Curator of Mammals, Zoological and Botanical Gardens, where his personal interest in his charges is pronounced. An authority on mammals and reptiles, he has played a leading part in the Natural History Society and in promoting a knowledge and love of wild animals in Hong Kong; his research in his particular field has brought him many contacts throughout the world. He was awarded an MBE in 1971.

ISO (Imperial Service Order)

Mr. Alan Harley WILKINS, JP

Mr. Wilkins was first appointed a pupil engineer in 1951 and became an Engineer in 1953. He was promoted Principal Government Engineer in 1973 and appointed Director of Mass Transit Studies the same year. As Mass Transit Adviser, he has responsibility for resumption and clearance of land for the MTR Scheme, monitoring progress of construction, advising on proposals for extending the system, and for related administrative and technical policies and programmes.

Mr. Wilkins' exemplary service as the main co-ordinator of the Government's input to the project is held in high regard by all concerned.

MBE (Member Order of the British Empire)

Mr. Howard Robert Acheson CHAMBERLAIN

Mr. Chamberlain was first appointed in 1954 and promoted to Chief Engineer in September 1968.

His knowledge and professional experience in marine engineering and port works, including land reclamation and the design, construction and maintenance of piers, sea-walls, breakwaters and other associated structures, has been of great value to the Public Works Department.

Mr. Chamberlain has made a significant contribution in the context of marine engineering work connected with the continuing development of Hong Kong. He will be retiring in 1980.

Mr. CHAO Shao-an

Mr. Chao came to Hong Kong in 1937 and has worked since then as an artist and teacher of painting. Among the leading senior artists in Hong Kong, he is the most prominent living painter of the Lingna<sup>m</sup> school

which had the greatest impact on the development of Chinese painting in South China of the early 20th century. His works have been widely exhibited in Hong Kong and in many capitals throughout the world, including Brussels, Moscow, Paris, Berlin, Peking, Lisbon, Tokyo, London, Rome and Washington DC. Today he is internationally renowned for his paintings of birds, animals, flowers and landscapes. He is also the founder of the "Lingnam Art Studio" which has been a training centre for many noted painters of birds, flowers and animals in the Lingnam style.

Mr. CHIU Shing

Mr. Chiu first joined the Government service as a Coolie in the Medical and Health Department in 1947 and was appointed Area Officer in the Resettlement Department in 1952. He was promoted through the Resettlement Officer ranks and regraded as Senior Housing Manager in 1973.

Throughout his long years of service he has proved himself invaluable in the fields of Squatter Control and Clearance. He has planned and executed numerous large scale clearance operations, demonstrating leadership, tact of a high order and great confidence in difficult circumstances. The implementation of the Government's development programme over the last few years without serious confrontation owes much to his efforts.

Mr. Horace Raymond KNIGHT, JP

Mr. Knight joined the Labour Department in 1969 as Senior Training Officer (Apprenticeship) and in 1971 became head of the newly created Industrial Training Division. In 1973 he was promoted to Assistant Commissioner (Industrial Training) and as such has contributed very significantly to the successful expansion of the Industrial Training Division. Mr. CHAN Piu joined the Prison Service in 1948. He attended a course on silk-screening in 1970 and the department was then able to set up a silk-screening workshop which has grown in size and now manufactures many items including all road traffic signs. The introduction of this trade into prison industries has resulted in savings to Government amounting to millions of dollars.

Mr. Chan was awarded the Colonial Prison Service Medal in May 1966, First Clasp to the Medal in May 1973 and Second Clasp to the Medal in May 1978. He is due to retire from the service in January 1980.

Mr. Chung was first appointed as a Coolie in 1936. He was promoted to the office of Laboratory Attendant grade in 1949, regraded as Office Attendant in 1958 and as Office Assistant in 1976. Mr. Fung is easily the most prominent individual in the field of work with the deaf, and acknowledged as such by the deaf community itself. He has organised and personally conducted an impressive number of sign language courses, and makes himself available at all times to solve the problems of deaf persons and their families. For over ten years, he has undertaken handsign interpretation for the courts and other institutions and he advises, and is consulted by, all groups formed by deaf persons themselves. Mr. Fung's record of public service is remarkable. His selfless devotion to the deaf goes far beyond the call of duty both as a Government officer and a member of the community at large.
