



DIPLOMATIC PRIVILEGES ORDINANCE.

(Chapter 190).

NOTIFICATION UNDER SECTION 2.

WHEREAS by section 2 of the Diplomatic Privileges Ordinance (hereinafter referred to as the principal Ordinance) it is enacted :

THAT the Governor may, by notification in the *Gazette*, declare that the Ordinance shall apply to any Organization declared by Her Majesty by Order in Council made under the International Organizations (Immunities and Privileges) Acts, 1950, to be an organization of which Her Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom and the Government or Governments of one or more foreign sovereign Powers are members :

THAT the Governor may, by notification in the *Gazette*, provide that any organization to which this section applies shall, to such extent as may be specified in the notification, have the immunities and privileges set out in Part I of the Schedule to the Ordinance, and shall also have the legal capacities of a body corporate :

THAT the Governor may, by notification in the *Gazette*, confer on the representatives (whether of Governments or not) on any organ of the Organization and upon officers and servants of the Organization, the immunities and privileges set forth in Parts II and III of the said Schedule to the extent specified in the notification : and

THAT Part IV of the Schedule to the Ordinance shall have effect for the purpose of extending to the staffs or representatives and to the families of officers of the Organization any immunities and privileges conferred on the representatives or officers, except in so far as the operation of the said Part IV is excluded by the notification conferring the privileges and immunities :

AND WHEREAS the Universal Postal Union on the 5th day of April, 1949, deposited with the Secretary-General of the United Nations a notification that it accepted the standard clauses of the Convention on Privileges and Immunities for the Specialized Agencies of the United Nations and the said Convention thereupon became applicable to the Organization :

AND WHEREAS Her Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom applied the provisions of the said Convention to the Universal Postal Union by Order in Council made on the 4th day of November, 1954, under the International Organizations (Immunities and Privileges) Act, 1950, by which said Order it was declared that the Universal Postal Union is an Organization of which Her Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom and the governments of foreign sovereign Powers are members :

(Cap. 190). NOW, THEREFORE, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 2 of the Diplomatic Privileges Ordinance His Excellency the Governor hereby declares and provides as follows :—

A. THE ORGANIZATION.

(Cap. 190). 1. The Universal Postal Union (hereinafter referred to as the Organization) is an organization to which the Diplomatic Privileges Ordinance applies.

2. The Organization shall have the legal capacities of a body corporate and, except in so far as in any particular case it has expressly waived its immunity, immunity from suit and legal process. No waiver of immunity shall be deemed to extend to any measure of execution.

3. The Organization shall have the like inviolability of official archives and premises occupied as offices as is accorded in respect of official archives and premises of an envoy of a foreign sovereign Power accredited to Her Majesty.

4. The Organization shall have the like exemption or relief from taxes and rates, other than taxes on the importation of goods, as is accorded to a foreign sovereign Power.

5. The Organization shall have exemption from taxes on the importation of goods directly imported by the Organization for its official use in Hong Kong or for exportation, or on the importation of any publications of the Organization directly imported by it, such exemption to be subject to compliance with such conditions as the Director of Commerce and Industry may prescribe for the protection of the Revenue.

6. The Organization shall have exemption from prohibitions and restrictions on importation or exportation in the case of goods directly imported or exported by the Organization for its official use and in the case of any publications of the Organization directly imported or exported by it.

7. The Organization shall have the right to avail itself, for telegraphic communications sent by it and containing only matter intended for publication by the press or for broadcasting (including communications addressed to or despatched from places outside Hong Kong), of any reduced rates applicable for the corresponding service in the case of press telegrams.

B. REPRESENTATIVES, OTHER THAN REPRESENTATIVES OF HER MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT IN THE COLONY, ON ORGANS OR COMMITTEES OF THE ORGANIZATION.

8. (1) Except in so far as in any particular case any privilege or immunity is waived by the Governments whom they represent, representatives of members at the World Meteorological Congress, on the Executive Committee, at regional associations, on technical commissions, or on any committee of any of these bodies shall enjoy :—

(a) While exercising their functions as such and during their journeys to and from the place of meeting, immunity from personal arrest or detention and from seizure of their personal baggage and inviolability for all papers and documents.

(b) Immunity from legal process of every kind in respect of words spoken or written and things done or omitted to be done by them in their capacity as representatives.

(2) Where the incidence of any form of taxation depends upon residence, representatives shall not be deemed to be resident in Hong Kong during any period when they are present in Hong Kong for the discharge of their duties.

(3) For the purposes of the application of this Article the expression "representatives" shall be deemed to include, in addition to the representatives, the following members of their official staffs accompanying them as such representatives :—

Alternate representatives,

Advisers,

Technical experts,

Secretaries of Delegations,

and Part IV of the Schedule to the Ordinance shall not operate so as to confer privileges or immunities on the staffs of representatives other than on those persons falling within the above-mentioned descriptions.

(4) The provisions of the preceding paragraphs of this Article shall not confer any immunity or privilege on any person as the representative of Her Majesty's Government in Hong Kong or as a member of the staff of such representative or on any person who is a citizen of the United Kingdom and Colonies.

C. HIGH OFFICIALS OF THE ORGANIZATION.


9. Except in so far as in any particular case any privilege or immunity is waived by the Organization, any officer of the Organization holding the office of Secretary-General (including any officer acting for him during his absence from duty) shall be accorded in respect of himself, his spouse and his children under the age of twenty-one, the like immunity from suit and legal process, the like inviolability of residence and the like exemption or relief from taxes, other than income tax, as is accorded to an envoy of a foreign sovereign Power accredited to Her Majesty, his spouse and children, and exemption from income tax in respect of emoluments received by him as an officer of the Organization.

D. OTHER OFFICIALS OF THE ORGANIZATION.

10. Except in so far as in any particular case any privilege or immunity is waived by the Organization, officials of the Organization of any category specified by it shall enjoy:—

- (a) immunity from suit and legal process in respect of words spoken or written and things done or omitted to be done by them in the course of the performance of their official duties;
- (b) exemption from income tax in respect of emoluments received by them as officers or servants of the Organization.

Explanatory Note.

This Notification follows the Order in Council cited in the preamble and provides the immunities and privileges required by the International Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the Specialized Agencies of the United Nations to be accorded in connexion with the Universal Postal Union.

DIPLOMATIC PRIVILEGES ORDINANCE.
(Chapter 190).

NOTIFICATION UNDER SECTION 2.

WHEREAS under section 2 of the Diplomatic Privileges Ordinance it was declared and provided in G.N.A. 102 of 1950:

THAT the International Civil Aviation Organization had been declared to be an organization of which His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom and the Governments of Foreign Sovereign Powers were members:

AND that the said International Civil Aviation Organization was an organization to which the Diplomatic Privileges Ordinance (Cap. 190) should apply:

AND that certain privileges and immunities should be enjoyed by representatives of member Governments to the Council of the Organization:

AND WHEREAS by Order in Council dated 4th November, 1954, Her Majesty in Council has ordered that paragraph (1) of Article 8 of the Diplomatic Privileges (International Civil Aviation Organization) Order in Council, 1949 (published for information as G.N.A. 101 of 1950,) be amended.

NOW THEREFORE in exercise of the powers conferred by section 2 of the Diplomatic Privileges Ordinance His Excellency the Governor hereby provides that the privileges and immunities extended to representatives of member Governments to the Council of the International Civil Aviation Organization by paragraph 8 of the Notification published as G.N.A. 102 of 1950, shall hereafter be enjoyed by representatives of member Governments to the Assembly or to the Council of the Organization, to any Commission (however named) provided for in the constitution of the Organization, or to any Committee of such Assembly, Council or Commission. Explanatory Note.

This Notification extends the class of persons granted privileges and immunities as representatives of member Governments to the Council of the International Civil Aviation Organization by including in that class Assemblies and Commissions of the Organization, with their Committees.

EMERGENCY REGULATIONS ORDINANCE.

(Chapter 241).

EMERGENCY (SQUATTER CLEARANCE) (AMENDMENT)

REGULATIONS, 1955.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 2 of the Emergency Regulations Ordinance, the Governor in Council has made the following regulations—

1. These regulations may be cited as the Emergency Citation. (Squatter Clearance) (Amendment) Regulations, 1955.

2. Regulation 2 of the Emergency (Squatter Clearance) Regulations, 1953, (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations) is amended by the addition before the definition of "building authority" of the following—

Amendment of regulation 2. (G.N.A. 184/53).

“ “building” has the meaning assigned by section 2 of the Buildings Ordinance;”

3. The principal regulations are amended by the addition after regulation 6B of the following new regulation—

Addition of new regulation 6C.

“6C. (1) If it comes to the notice of a competent authority that any building which he has reason to believe may be an unlawful structure is in course of erection or has been erected, he may serve notice requiring the owner of such building and the owner of the land upon which such building is being erected or has been erected to furnish to him within forty-eight hours of the service of such notice proof to his satisfaction that such building is in accordance with the terms of the Crown lease or permit under which such land is held.

(2) A notice under this regulation need not be addressed to the owner of a building or the owner of land by name.

(3) Service of such notice may be effected by handing a copy thereof to any adult person engaged in the building works and by affixing a copy of such notice to such building, or by any other method which the competent authority shall deem to be sufficient.

(4) The owner of the building and the owner of the land upon which the building is being erected or has been erected shall furnish to the competent authority within forty-eight hours of the service of the notice such proof as is referred to in sub-regulation (1).

(5) If no proof has been furnished to the competent authority within forty-eight hours from the service of the notice or if the competent authority is not satisfied from the examination of such proof as has been furnished to him that the building is not an unlawful structure the building shall thereupon be deemed to be an unlawful structure and, notwithstanding the provisions of regulations 5 and 6, the competent authority may thereupon enter upon the land and in respect of the building exercise thereon the powers provided by paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of sub-regulation (1) of regulation 5."

Explanatory Note.

The Competent Authority sometimes has difficulty in establishing quickly whether or not a new structure is illegal. This difficulty arises particularly in relation to private agricultural land. The purpose of these regulations is to enable the Competent Authority, when such circumstances arise, to place on the owner or builder the onus of proving that the structure is not unlawful.

JUVENILE OFFENDERS ORDINANCE.

(Chapter 226).

REMAND HOME RULES, 1955.

In exercise of the powers conferred by subsection (3) of section 20 of the Juvenile Offenders Ordinance, the Governor has made the following rules—

- 1. These rules may be cited as the Remand Home Rules, 1955, and shall apply to such Remand Homes as the Governor may direct. Citation and application.
- 2. In these rules, save where the context otherwise requires— Interpretation.
 "Remand Home" means a place of detention appointed under section 19 of the Juvenile Offenders Ordinance; (Cap. 226).
 "juvenile" means a person who is, in the opinion of the court having cognizance of any case in relation to such person, under the age of sixteen years.
- 3. (1) A Remand Home shall be administered by a Superintendent approved by the Social Welfare Officer. Administration of Remand Home.
 (2) The Superintendent shall keep a daily register in which shall be recorded all admissions and discharges, all events of importance and all punishment given under paragraph (2) of rule 12.
- 4. On admission to a Remand Home every juvenile shall be bathed, weighed and photographed. Procedure on admission.
- 5. Separate beds shall be provided for each juvenile, and the sleeping accommodation for boys shall be separate from that for girls. Sleeping accommodation.
- 6. Juveniles shall wear their own clothing: Clothing.

Provided that where the Superintendent considers it desirable on sanitary or other grounds, suitable clothing and shoes may be supplied.

Food. **7.** (1) Every juvenile shall be supplied with food in accordance with the scales of diet approved by the Social Welfare Officer.

(2) No juvenile shall receive or have in his possession any food other than that authorized under paragraph (1) except with the authority of the Superintendent.

Segregation. **8.** (1) A juvenile who, in the opinion of the Superintendent, is likely to exercise a bad influence, shall, so far as is practical, be separated from the other juveniles.

(2) Boys shall, so far as is practicable, be separated from girls except while they are under supervision.

Occupation. **9.** (1) Suitable schoolroom instruction and practical work on the premises shall be provided for the juveniles. Such work may consist within reasonable limits of the work of the Remand Home.

(2) Recreation and exercise shall be provided for the juveniles for two hours in each day, of which one hour shall be spent in exercise in the open air except in bad weather.

Visits and letters. **10.** Every juvenile shall be permitted, so far as the Superintendent considers practicable, to receive visits from his relatives and friends and to send and receive letters.

Property. **11.** (1) On admission to a Remand Home every juvenile shall surrender his property to the Superintendent, who shall make and sign a list of such property.

(2) On discharge the juvenile shall be entitled, upon signing a receipt therefor, to the property comprised in the list made under paragraph (1).

Discipline. **12.** (1) The Superintendent, or in his absence the officer-in-charge, but no other person, may deprive a juvenile of his recreation and other privileges for any minor misconduct. Serious misconduct, or repeated minor misconduct, shall be reported to the Social Welfare Officer.

(2) Punishment awarded under paragraph (1) shall be recorded in the daily register kept by the Superintendent.

13. The Superintendent shall at once report the death or serious illness of any juvenile to the Social Welfare Officer, the Police, the Medical Department and the parent or guardian of the juvenile. Death or serious illness to be reported.

14. (1) Where, in the opinion of the Superintendent or of any Government medical officer, it becomes necessary to remove a juvenile to a hospital or other place for medical treatment or examination, the Superintendent shall apply to the Social Welfare Officer for a transfer order by the Governor under subsection (5) of section 19 of the Juvenile Offenders Ordinance. Removal to hospital.

(Cap. 226).

(2) No surgical treatment shall be carried out on a juvenile without the prior consent of his parent or guardian, unless the medical officer certifies in writing that the delay necessary in obtaining such consent would cause the juvenile unnecessary suffering or endanger his health.

PREVENTION OF THE SPREAD OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES
REGULATIONS, 1955.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 8 of the Quarantine and Prevention of Disease Ordinance, the Governor in Council has made the following regulations—

PART I.

General.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Prevention of the Spread of Infectious Diseases Regulations, 1955. Citation.

2. In these regulations the following words and expressions shall, except where the context otherwise requires, have the meanings hereby respectively assigned to them— Interpretation.

“carrier” means any person in whose body is carried the germs of an infectious disease;

“contact” means any person who has been exposed to the risk of infection of an infectious disease whether from humans or animals or birds;

“conveyance” includes all vessels, and all conveyances used wholly or in part for the carriage of freight;

“infectious” means capable of transmitting an infectious disease;

“infectious disease” means any of the following diseases, namely, plague, cholera, smallpox, yellow fever, typhus, cerebrospinal meningitis, measles, chickenpox, diphtheria, puerperal fever, scarlet fever, rabies, enteric, dysentery, tuberculosis, relapsing fever, whooping cough, acute poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis) and malaria, and any other disease which the Governor in Council shall by notification in the *Gazette* declare to be included within the said expression;

“sick person” means a person suffering from an infectious disease.

Exercise of health officer's powers.

3. Where, under these regulations, a power is given to a health officer to do any act or thing the same may be done by any person acting under his direction.

PART II.

Notification.

Medical practitioners to report infectious diseases.

4. (1) Where any medical practitioner or medical officer has reason to suspect the existence of a case of an infectious disease or, in the case of death, that an infectious disease existed, he shall forthwith notify the Director of Medical and Health Services.

Schedule.

(2) (a) Notification required by paragraph (1) shall be made on the prescribed form and shall be signed by the medical practitioner.

(b) The Director of Medical and Health Services shall supply free copies of the prescribed form upon request to medical practitioners and officers in charge of police stations.

(3) A medical practitioner on making application to the Director of Medical and Health Services within one month of any notification made under paragraph (1) shall be entitled to receive in respect thereof the sum of two dollars :

Provided that—

(a) Government medical officers shall not be entitled to receive such fees; and

(b) only one fee shall be payable in respect of each case of an infectious disease.

(4) Where a medical practitioner confirms or disproves the existence of any infectious disease, concerning which he had notified the Director of Medical and Health Services, he shall forthwith report the said confirmation or disproof to the Director of Medical and Health Services.

5. (1) Where any person, not under the care of a medical practitioner is known to be suffering or to have died from any infectious disease a report thereof shall forthwith be made to—

Other persons to report infectious disease.

(a) a health officer; or

(b) a police officer on duty at the nearest police station or the medical officer in charge of the nearest public dispensary or to any health inspector, who in turn shall inform the health officer.

(2) Such report shall be made by—

(a) in the case of an inmate of any premises—

(i) the occupier or keeper of such premises; or

(ii) the nearest adult relative living on such premises; or

(iii) any person in charge of or in attendance on the sick person or dead body; or

(b) any person having knowledge of the case of an infectious disease.

6. Where any sick person is in any hotel, boarding house or common lodging-house the keeper of such institution shall forthwith make a report to any of the persons mentioned in paragraph (1) of regulation 5.

Sick persons in hotels, boarding houses or common lodging houses.

7. (1) Any person who—

Offences.

(a) being required by these regulations to make a report concerning any infectious disease, or any death therefrom, neglects without reasonable excuse to make such report with the least practicable delay; or

(b) knowingly furnishes any information which is false concerning any such disease or death,

shall be liable to a fine of five hundred dollars.

(2) Any person charged with an offence under this regulation shall be presumed to have known of the existence of the infectious disease, unless he shows to the satisfaction of the court that he had no such knowledge and could not with reasonable diligence have obtained such knowledge.

PART III.

Sick and Infected Persons.

Power of entry and examination.

8. A health officer authorized in writing in that behalf by the Director of Medical and Health Services and any person authorized by such health officer may enter and where necessary, in the presence of a police officer, break into any premises for the purpose of—

- (a) ascertaining whether there is therein any sick person or any contact or carrier; or
- (b) examining any dead body where the health officer has reason to believe that the cause of death has not been certified by a medical practitioner, or has doubt as to the diagnosis certified;

and may cause any such person or dead body to be examined.

Examination of persons and dead bodies.

9. A health officer may—

- (a) carry out a medical examination on, and for that purpose detain, any person whom he has reason to believe is a sick person, contact or carrier; and
- (b) carry out a post-mortem examination on, and for that purpose remove to a mortuary or other suitable place, any dead body where he has reason to believe that infectious disease existed therein at the time of death.

Removal of sick persons, contacts and carriers.

10. A health officer may remove any sick person, contact or carrier to an infectious diseases hospital or such other place as he may appoint.

Treatment of persons elsewhere.

11. (1) A health officer may permit in writing a sick person, contact or carrier to be treated elsewhere than in an infectious diseases hospital.

(2) The health officer may endorse on such permit such conditions as he deems necessary, and such conditions shall be complied with by all persons having charge of the sick person, contact or carrier.

Detention of persons removed.

12. Any person removed to an infectious diseases hospital or other place under regulation 10 may be detained there until, in the opinion of the medical officer in charge of such infectious diseases hospital or other place, such person is no longer infectious.

13. No person shall enter an infectious diseases hospital or other place appointed by a health officer under regulation 10 without the permission of such health officer or the medical officer in charge of such infectious diseases hospital or other place.

Entry to infectious diseases hospitals.

PART IV.

Restrictions on exposure or transport of sick persons and of disposal of infected dead bodies.

14. (1) No person knowing he is a sick person shall, and no person having the care of any person whom he has reason to believe is a sick person shall permit that person to—

Person not to expose others to infection or enter public conveyances.

- (a) expose other persons to the risk of infection by his presence or conduct in any street, public place, place of entertainment or assembly, club, or hotel, or by carrying on any trade, business or occupation;
- (b) enter any public conveyance used for the carriage of passengers at separate fares except with the permission in writing of a health officer and subject to such conditions as he may specify;
- (c) enter any other kind of public conveyance without first informing the owner, driver, or conductor of the fact that he is a person so suffering.

(2) No person knowing he is suffering from plague, small-pox, cholera, louse-borne typhus or louse-borne relapsing fever shall travel in any conveyance other than an ambulance except with the permission in writing of a health officer and subject to such conditions as he may specify.

(3) Except as herein provided no owner or conductor of a public conveyance used for the carriage of passengers at separate fares shall convey therein any person whom he has reason to believe is a sick person.

15. Any owner or driver of any conveyance who carries any person whom he has reason to believe is a sick person shall forthwith report the matter to a health officer, or other person specified in paragraph (1) of regulation 5.

Owners of conveyances to make reports.

Disposal of infected clothing, etc.

16. No person shall, except with the consent and under the direction of a health officer knowingly give, lend, sell, pawn, transmit, remove or expose any bedding, clothing or other article which he has reason to believe has become infectious.

Disposal of infected dead bodies.

17. (1) Every dead body in which there existed an infectious disease at the time of death shall be buried or cremated at the burial or cremation ground set apart therefor, or at such other place as the health officer may direct.

(2) Persons carrying out such disposal privately shall comply with the directions of the health officer in relation to disinfection, and the time, route and method of removing the dead body to the burial or cremation ground.

(3) Where no person undertakes the private disposal of such a dead body, the health officer shall cause it to be disposed of.

No infected dead body to be dealt with otherwise.

18. No person shall deposit or cause to be deposited in any place other than in a burial or cremation ground in which it may be lawfully buried or cremated as the case may be, any dead body in which there existed an infectious disease at the time of death.

PART V.

Disinfection and Cleansing.

Disinfection of building.

19. (1) Where it appears to a health officer that any infectious disease exists or has existed in any building he may with the approval of the Director of Medical and Health Services—

(a) by an order in writing served on the owners of such building require the same to be disinfected, disinfected and deratted to his satisfaction within the time specified in such order;

(b) for such purpose close the building; and

(c) remove any person under the powers conferred by regulation 10.

(2) No person shall occupy any building which has been closed under this regulation.

20. Where in the opinion of a health officer it is necessary as a prevention of the introduction or spread of any infectious disease he may with the approval of the Director of Medical and Health Services by order in writing served on the owners of any well, require the same to be filled up, cleansed or disinfected to his satisfaction within the time specified in such order.

Wells.

21. Where an order made under regulation 19 or 20 is not complied with within the time specified therein, the health officer and any person authorized by him may enter and where necessary, in the presence of a police officer, break into any premises for the purpose of carrying out the requirements of such order. The cost of such work may be recovered from the owner of the building as if it were a debt due to the Crown.

Enforcement of orders.

22. Where it appears to a health officer that any conveyance is, or may have become infectious in respect of plague, cholera, smallpox, yellow fever, typhus or relapsing fever, he may disinfect, disinfest and derat such conveyance.

Disinfection of conveyances.

23. Where it appears to a health officer that any clothing, bedding or personal effects are, or may have become infectious he may—

Disinfection and destruction of personal effects.

(a) disinfect and disinfest the same; or

(b) with the approval of the Director of Medical and Health Services destroy the same.

PART VI.

Miscellaneous.

24. No person shall resist or obstruct in the execution of his duties any health officer or person acting under his directions.

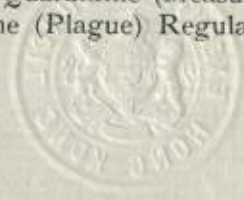
Persons not to resist or obstruct health officer.

25. Any person who contravenes, or fails to comply with the provisions of regulation 11, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 or 24 shall be liable to a fine of one thousand dollars.

Offences.

26. The Quarantine (Measures on Arrival) Regulations and the Quarantine (Plague) Regulations are hereby repealed.

Explanatory Note.

(This Note is not part of the regulations but is intended to indicate their general purport).

These regulations re-enact in a different form the majority of the provisions of Part III of the Quarantine and Prevention of Disease Ordinance, Cap. 141, which Part is repealed by the Quarantine and Prevention of Disease (Amendment) Ordinance, 1955.

2. The former section 106 which dealt with limitation of liability is to be re-enacted in Part I of the Ordinance as section 15C; while regulation 24 which prohibits persons obstructing health officers, reproduces for these regulations a like provision contained in section 9 of the Ordinance. The right of the Director of Medical and Health Services to award compensation where clothing has been destroyed under the provisions of regulation 23 is preserved in a new section 18B which is to be added to the Ordinance.

3. There are some changes in the manner of exercising certain powers. The right of entry and search of premises was formerly exercisable only on a magistrate's order where admission had been refused (section 75). In such circumstances health officers are now empowered to break into premises where necessary, in the presence of a police officer; but this power is given only to health officers authorized for this purpose by the Director of Medical and Health Services (regulation 8). Similarly the power of health officers to require buildings and wells to be cleansed, and in some cases closed, (sections 99, 101 and 103) is now to be exercised only with the approval of the Director of Medical and Health Services. 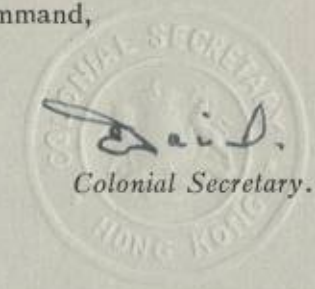

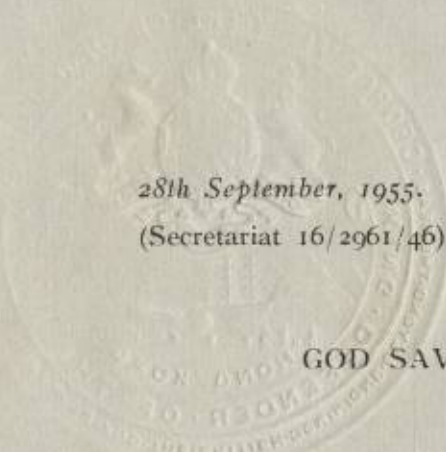

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Factories and Industrial Undertakings Ordinance, 1955, the Commissioner of Labour has made the following regulations—

PART I.

PRELIMINARY.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Factories and Industrial Undertakings Regulations, 1955.

2. In these regulations—

“building authority” means the building authority as defined in the Buildings Ordinance;

Interpretation.
(Cap. 123).

“dangerous occurrence” means any occurrence specified in the Schedule to these regulations;

“fire-resisting material” means a building material certified by the building authority to be fire-resisting;

“mill-gearing” includes every shaft, wheel, drum and pulley and every other appliance by which motion or power is communicated to any machine;

“securely fenced” means securely fenced to the satisfaction of the Commissioner;

“tenement factory” means a factory in any part of a building occupied or intended to be occupied by more than one person.

PART II.

EMPLOYMENT OF WOMEN, YOUNG PERSONS AND CHILDREN.

3. No person shall employ any child in any industrial undertaking or dangerous trade.

Employment of children.

Employment of women and young persons in underground work.

4. No person shall employ any woman or young person on underground work in any mine.

Employment of women and young persons under sixteen in dangerous trades.

5. Except with the written permission of the Commissioner, no person shall employ any female person of whatever age or any male young person under sixteen years of age in any dangerous trade.

Conditions of employment of young persons under sixteen.

6. No person shall employ any young person under sixteen years of age in any industrial undertaking—

- (a) between the hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m.; nor
- (b) for more than nine hours in any period of twenty-four hours; nor
- (c) for more than five hours continuously; nor
- (d) unless after every spell of five hours continuous work and before his next spell of work there is an interval for relaxation of not less than one hour, or after a spell of less than five hours, such interval as may be reasonable in all the circumstances; nor
- (e) unless in every seven days he is allowed one day's rest.

Carrying of weights by women and young persons.

7. No woman or young person employed in any industrial undertaking shall be permitted to carry any load which is unreasonably heavy having regard to the age and physical development of such woman or young person :

Provided that, in the case of a young person under the age of sixteen years, such load shall not exceed thirty cattles in weight.

Employment of women and young persons over sixteen

8. (1) No person shall employ any woman or young person of or over the age of sixteen years in any industrial undertaking between the hours of 8 p.m. and 7 a.m., except where such employment is authorized in writing by the Commissioner under paragraph (2).

(2) The Commissioner may in respect of any specific industrial undertaking authorize in writing the employment of any woman or young person of or over the age of sixteen years—

between 8 p.m. and 7 a.m.

- (a) for not more than sixty days in any year, between the hours of 8 p.m. and 9 p.m.; and
- (b) for the purpose of employment on shift work, between the hours of 6 a.m. and 7 a.m., and 8 p.m. and 10 p.m.

9. Where any woman or young person of or over the age of sixteen years is employed in any industrial undertaking between the hours of 6 a.m. and 7 a.m., or 8 p.m. and 10 p.m. for the purpose of employment on shift work—

Conditions of employment of women and young persons over sixteen on shift work.

- (a) such woman or young person shall be employed only in a building approved in writing by the Commissioner;
- (b) there shall be provided and maintained for the use of all such women and young persons, whose work is done standing, suitable facilities for sitting sufficient to enable them to take advantage of any opportunities for resting which may occur in the course of their employment;
- (c) a suitable room in which no industrial process shall be carried on shall be provided and equipped for use as a dining and rest room;
- (d) the work of all such women and young persons shall be organized in shifts not exceeding eight hours working time in any period of twenty-four hours;
- (e) no such woman or young person shall work for more than eight hours in any period of twenty-four hours. Any scheme or arrangement for alternating shifts shall provide that the total of eight hours working time is not exceeded; and such scheme or arrangement shall, before coming into operation, be approved in writing by the Commissioner;
- (f) no such woman or young person shall work for more than four and a half hours without an interval of at least half an hour for rest during which such woman or young person shall not be permitted to remain in any room in which work is then being carried on;

- (g) a register containing the name, serial number and photograph of every such woman shall be maintained and kept up to date at the place of employment; and
- (h) a current record containing the name and serial number of every such woman and young person employed in each shift shall be kept at the place of employment.

Register of young persons.

10. In every industrial undertaking a register, in such form as shall be approved by the Commissioner of Labour and published by him in the *Gazette*, of the young persons employed in such undertaking, shall be maintained and kept up to date at the place of employment.

PART III.

GENERAL.

Reports of accidents resulting in death or disablement.

11. (1) Every accident which occurs in an industrial undertaking and results in the death of any person shall be reported within twenty-four hours of such death to an inspector and to the police station nearest to such industrial undertaking.

(2) Every accident which occurs in an industrial undertaking and results in the disablement of any person employed in such industrial undertaking so as to cause him to be incapable of performing his ordinary work for one day or more shall be reported within forty-eight hours of its occurrence to an inspector.

(3) If any accident causing disablement is reported under paragraph (2) and the person disabled subsequently dies as a result of the accident, notice in writing of the death shall be given within twenty-four hours thereof to an inspector and to the police station nearest to the industrial undertaking wherein the accident occurred.

(4) Every report made under this regulation shall state the names of every person suffering death or disablement, the nature and extent of the injuries to every such person, and the circumstances in which the accident occurred, and may be made by telephone, orally or in writing.

Reports of dangerous occurrences.

12. (1) Every dangerous occurrence which occurs in an industrial undertaking, whether any personal injury has been caused or not, shall be reported within twenty-four hours of its occurrence to an inspector.

(2) Every report made under this regulation shall be in writing, and in addition to any report required under regulation 11, and shall include particulars of the time of the occurrence of the accident, any damage to the building in which the accident occurred or to the machinery or plant therein, and the circumstances in which the accident occurred.

13. The provisions of regulations 11 and 12 shall not be applicable in the case of any accident which is required to be reported under the provisions of section 49 of the Mining Ordinance, 1954, but the reports required under the said regulations shall be in addition to any reports which may be required under the provisions of any other enactment.

Application of regulations 11 and 12. (33 of 1954).

14. (1) Where an inspector considers any industrial undertaking or any matter, thing or practice in or connected with an industrial undertaking to be dangerous or defective so as, in his opinion, to threaten or tend to the bodily injury of any person, he may give notice in writing thereof to the proprietor and shall state in such notice the particulars in which he considers such industrial undertaking, matter, thing or practice to be dangerous or defective, and shall require the same to be remedied, either forthwith or within such time as he may specify, and may by such notice order work to be suspended until the danger or defect is removed to his satisfaction :

Obligation to remedy any dangerous practice etc.

Provided that no such order suspending work shall be made except with the approval of the Superintendent of Labour or a labour officer signified in writing on the notice.

(2) On receipt of a notice issued under paragraph (1), the proprietor shall comply therewith, or, if he intends to object thereto, he shall cease to use the industrial undertaking, or part thereof or matter or thing or practice, as to which notice has been given, and shall forthwith withdraw all persons employed from the danger indicated in such notice until such time as the matter is finally determined :

Provided that if, in the opinion of the inspector who gave such notice, there is no immediate danger, he may allow work to proceed during such period under such restrictions and upon such conditions as he may specify in writing in order to ensure the safety of the workmen.

(3) (a) When the proprietor is aggrieved by the provisions of any notice given under paragraphs (1) and (2), he may, within ten days after the receipt thereof, state his objection in writing to the Superintendent of Labour and thereupon the matter shall be determined by the Superintendent of Labour or by such officer as the Superintendent of Labour may appoint on that behalf.

(b) The Superintendent of Labour or such officer may take into consideration any reports bearing on the industrial undertaking, matter, thing or practice considered defective or dangerous and the degree of skill of those employed in the industrial undertaking.

(4) Any proprietor aggrieved by a decision made under the provisions of paragraph (3) may, within thirty days of the notification to him of that decision, appeal to the Commissioner of Labour.

(5) The provisions of this regulation shall not be applicable in the case of any industrial undertaking in respect of which a mines officer may suspend work under the provisions of section 46 of the Mining Ordinance, 1954.

15. (1) An inspector may at any time after informing the proprietor or, if the proprietor is not readily available, a foreman or other responsible person in the industrial undertaking, take for analysis sufficient samples of any material in use or mixed for use in a dangerous trade or scheduled trade, or of any substance used or intended to be used in an industrial undertaking being a substance which he thinks may prove on analysis to be likely to cause bodily injury to the person employed.

(2) The proprietor or the foreman or other responsible person aforesaid may, at the time when a sample is taken under this regulation, and on providing the necessary appliances, require the inspector to divide the sample into three parts, to mark and seal or fasten up each part in such manner as its nature permits, and—

- (a) to deliver one part to the proprietor, or the foreman or other responsible person aforesaid;
- (b) to retain one part for future comparison; and
- (c) to submit one part to the Government Chemist for analysis.

(33 of 1954).

Power to take samples.

(3) A certificate purporting to be a certificate by the Government Chemist as to the result of an analysis of a sample under this regulation shall in any proceedings under the Ordinance be admissible as evidence of the matters stated therein, but either party may require the person by whom the analysis was made to be called as a witness.

(4) No person shall, except in so far as is necessary for the purposes of a prosecution for an offence under the Ordinance, publish or disclose to any person the results of an analysis made under this regulation.

16. (1) No person employed in an industrial undertaking shall wilfully interfere with or misuse any means, appliance, convenience or other thing provided in pursuance of the Ordinance for securing the health, safety or welfare of the persons employed in the industrial undertaking, and where any means or appliance for securing health or safety is provided for the use of any such person under the Ordinance, he shall use the means or appliance.

Duties of persons employed.

(2) No person employed in an industrial undertaking shall wilfully and without reasonable cause do anything likely to endanger himself or others.

PART IV.

REGISTRABLE WORKPLACES.

Registration.

17. Every application for registration under the provisions of section 7 of the Ordinance shall be made in such form as shall be approved by the Commissioner of Labour and published by him in the *Gazette*.

Form of application for registration.

Prevention of Accidents.

18. In every registrable workplace—

Fencing of machinery.

- (a) all dangerous parts of the machinery and every part of the mill-gearing shall be securely fenced, or in such position or of such construction as to be as safe to every person in the workplace as if such machinery or mill-gearing were securely fenced;

- (b) every fly wheel, pulley and exposed wheel shall be securely fenced, and every set screw and bolt shall be cut off or countersunk;
- (c) every driving belt passing through a floor shall be securely fenced to a height of six and a half feet from such floor;
- (d) every driving belt used for main driving or counter driving and within six and a half feet from the floor or other place to which workers have access shall be securely fenced;
- (e) every part, under which persons are likely to pass, of every overhead driving belt more than four inches wide, shall be adequately protected by wood or metal guards;
- (f) all shafting which runs at a height of less than six and a half feet from a floor or other place to which workers have access shall be securely fenced;
- (g) such moving parts of any machine as are adjacent to any place to which workers have access shall be securely fenced; and
- (h) all fencing must be constantly maintained in an efficient state while the parts required to be fenced are in motion or use, except where they are under repair or examination in connexion with repair or are necessarily exposed for the purpose of cleaning or lubricating or for altering the gearing or arrangements of the parts of the machine.

Fencing of dangerous platforms, liquids etc.

19. In every registrable workplace—

- (a) all platforms, pits and openings in floors and every other place liable to be dangerous to persons; and
- (b) all vessels containing any scalding, corrosive or poisonous liquid,

shall be securely fenced to a height of not less than three feet or otherwise protected to the satisfaction of the Commissioner.

Cleaning of dangerous machinery by women and young persons.

20. (1) No woman or young person shall be permitted to clean any dangerous part of the machinery in a registrable workplace while the machinery is in motion by the aid of any mechanical power. For the purpose of this paragraph such parts of the machinery shall be presumed to be dangerous as are notified by an inspector to the proprietor of the registrable workplace.

(2) No woman or young person shall be permitted to clean any mill-gearing while such mill-gearing is in motion for the purpose of propelling any part of the machinery in a registrable workplace.

Prevention of and Escape from Fire.

21. Every door leading out of a registrable workplace and every door therein giving access to a stairway shall be of fire-resisting material. Fire-resisting doors.

22. Every door leading out of a registrable workplace and the doors of every room therein in which more than ten persons are employed shall, except in the case of sliding doors, be constructed to open outwards. Doors to open outwards.

23. While any person employed in a registrable workplace is within the workplace, whether such person is working or not, the doors leading out of the workplace and the doors of every room therein in which any such person is, shall not be locked or fastened in such a manner that they cannot be easily and immediately opened from the inside. Doors to be kept unlocked.

24. In every registrable workplace adequate means shall be provided to the satisfaction of the Commissioner for closing in case of fire every opening in every floor through which a shaft or driving belt may pass. Provision of means for closing openings.

25. (1) Where, in any registrable workplace, any inflammable liquid or any mixture containing any such liquid or any substance or thing which in the opinion of the Commissioner involves danger from fire, is used or intended to be used, the Commissioner may by order in writing prohibit smoking and the use of naked lights in such workplace. Power to prohibit smoking.

(2) The proprietor of any registrable workplace in which smoking or the use of naked lights is prohibited in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (1) shall take such steps to enforce the prohibition as the Commissioner may by notice in writing direct.

26. (1) The proprietor of any registrable workplace shall maintain in good condition and free from obstruction all the means of escape in case of fire and all fire-fighting appliances provided in such registrable workplace. Maintenance of fire-escapes and fire-fighting appliances.

(2) No person shall wilfully alter, damage, obstruct or otherwise impair any such means of escape, or fire-fighting appliance.

Registrable workplace above dangerous goods store. (1 of 1873).

27. No registrable workplace shall be situated in any building any part of which is licensed for the storage of any dangerous goods as defined in the Dangerous Goods Ordinance, 1873, unless the dangerous goods are housed in a structure effectively cut off, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner and the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade, by a structure of fire-resisting material from direct communication with the registrable workplace.

Power to require safety precautions etc.

28. (1) The Commissioner may by notice in writing, require—

- (a) that any building or part thereof in a registrable workplace being a building the cubic content of which is greater than two hundred and fifty thousand cubic feet shall be divided by walls or floors of fire-resisting material into compartments none of which shall exceed two hundred and fifty thousand cubic feet in capacity, to the satisfaction of the building authority;
- (b) that any opening in a dividing wall or floor required under sub-paragraph (a) shall be fitted with doors of fire-resisting material constructed to the satisfaction of the building authority;
- (c) that—
 - (i) any building exceeding sixty feet in height; and
 - (ii) any building in which more than twenty persons are employed,
 which is or forms part of a registrable workplace shall be provided with such means of escape therefrom in case of fire as may be specified in the notice;
- (d) that in any registrable workplace such precautions against fire shall be taken and fire-fighting appliances provided as may be specified in the notice;
- (e) that in any registrable workplace illuminated notices bearing the words "FIRE EXIT" in English and Chinese shall be provided and maintained in good condition at any exit from the workplace; and

(f) that in any tenement factory—

(i) an enclosed concrete stairway with self-closing doors of fire-resisting material on each landing shall be provided;

(ii) any stairway required under this sub-paragraph shall be carried in concrete to the top floor of the building and continued either in concrete or in iron to the roof; and

(iii) a protected route to neighbouring buildings, or such other means of escape in case of fire as may be specified in the notice shall be provided.

(2) Every notice given under this regulation shall specify in detail the requirements of the Commissioner, including the time within which the requirements are to be complied with.

(3) The proprietor of the registrable workplace concerned shall, on receipt of any such notice, execute and do all such works and things as may be necessary in order to comply with every requirement so specified, including the submission of plans to the building authority.

Hygiene.

29. Every registrable workplace shall be kept in a clean state, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, sanitary convenience or nuisance, and, without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing provisions— Cleanliness.

(a) accumulations of dirt and refuse shall be removed daily by a suitable method from the floor and benches of workrooms and from the staircases and passages;

(b) the floor of every workroom shall be cleaned at least once in every week by washing or, if it is effective and suitable, by sweeping or other method; and

(c) all inside walls and partitions, and all ceilings or tops of rooms shall be limewashed at least once in every year or, if they have been oil-painted or varnished, they shall be washed with hot water and soap at least once in every period of fourteen months.

Ventilation.

30. (1) In every registrable workplace, effective and suitable provision shall be made for securing and maintaining by the circulation of fresh air in each workroom or, in the case of a mine, in each shaft, the adequate ventilation of the room or shaft, and for rendering harmless, so far as practicable, all fumes, dust and other impurities that may be injurious to health generated in the course of any process or work carried on in the registrable workplace.

(2) Without prejudice to the generality of paragraph (1), in every registrable workplace in which, in connexion with any process or work carried on, there is given off any dust or fume or other impurity of such a character and to such extent as to be likely to be injurious or offensive to the persons employed, or any substantial quantity of dust of any kind, all practicable measures shall be taken to protect the persons employed against inhalation of the dust or fume or other impurity and to prevent its accumulating in any workroom, and in particular, where the nature of the process makes it practicable, exhaust appliances shall be provided and maintained, as near as possible to the point of origin of the dust or fume or other impurity, so as to prevent it entering the air of any workroom.

Lighting.

31. (1) Effective provision shall be made for securing and maintaining sufficient and suitable lighting, whether natural or artificial, in every part of a registrable workplace in which persons are working or passing.

(2) All glazed windows and skylights used for the lighting of workrooms in any registrable workplace shall, so far as is practicable, be kept clean on both the inner and outer surfaces and free from obstruction :

Provided that any such window or skylight may be white-washed or shaded for the purpose of mitigating heat or glare.

Drainage of floors.

32. (1) Where, in any registrable workplace, any process or work is carried on which renders the floor liable to be wet to such an extent that the moisture is capable of being removed by drainage, effective means shall be provided and maintained for draining off the moisture.

(2) Any means for draining which does not comply with the provisions of the Buildings Ordinance shall be deemed not to be effective for the purpose of this regulation. (Cap. 123).

33. (1) A registrable workplace shall not, while work is carried on, be so overcrowded as to cause risk of injury to the health of the persons employed therein. Over-crowding.

(2) Without prejudice to the generality of paragraph (1), a registrable workplace shall be deemed to be so overcrowded as aforesaid, if the number of persons employed at a time in any workroom is such that the amount of cubic space allowed for every person employed in the room is less than two hundred and fifty cubic feet.

(3) In every room in every registrable workplace a notice shall be posted specifying the number of persons who, having regard to the provisions of this regulation, may be employed in the room.

34. (1) Every registrable workplace shall be provided with sufficient and suitable latrine and washing conveniences on the premises and, where persons of both sexes are or are intended to be employed such conveniences shall afford proper separate accommodation for persons of each sex. Sanitary conveniences etc.

(2) Any latrine or washing convenience which does not comply with the provisions of the Buildings Ordinance shall be deemed not to be sufficient and suitable for the purpose of this regulation. (Cap. 123).

35. In every registrable workplace an adequate supply of drinking water either from a public main or from a source approved in writing by a health officer shall be provided and maintained at suitable points conveniently accessible to all persons employed. Supply of drinking water.

36. In every registrable workplace an adequate supply of first aid equipment on a scale commensurate with the number of workers employed in the workplace together with simple instructions for the use of such equipment shall be provided and maintained. First aid equipment.

PART V.

OFFENCES AND PENALTIES.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 3, 4, 5, 6 or 8(1).

37. Any person who contravenes the provisions of regulation 3, 4, 5, 6 or 8(1) shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of five thousand dollars.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 15(4), 16 or 26(2) or an order made under regulation 25(1).

38. Any person who—
(a) contravenes the provisions of regulation 15(4), 16 or 26(2); or
(b) contravenes the provisions of any order made under regulation 25(1), shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of one thousand dollars.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 14(2), 18, 19, 20, 22, 23, 25(2), 26(1), 28(3), 28(3), 30 or 33(1).

39. The proprietor of any industrial undertaking—
(a) who contravenes the provisions of regulation 14(2), 25(2), 26(1) or 28(3);
(b) in which any person is permitted to do anything in contravention of the provisions of regulation 20; or
(c) in respect of which the provisions of regulation 18, 19, 22, 23, 30 or 33(1) are contravened, shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of five thousand dollars.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 9, 10, 21, 27, 31, 34(1), 35 or 36.

40. The proprietor of any industrial undertaking—
(a) who contravenes the provisions of regulation 10; or
(b) in respect of which the provisions of regulation 9, 21, 27, 31, 34(1), 35 or 36 are contravened, shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of two thousand dollars.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 7, 11, 12, 24, 29, 32(1) or 33(3).

41. The proprietor of any industrial undertaking—
(a) in which any person is permitted to do anything in contravention of the provisions of regulation 7;
(b) in respect of which the provisions of regulation 24, 29, 32(1) or 33(3) are contravened; or

(c) in which an accident or dangerous occurrence occurs and is not reported or notice in writing of the death of any person resulting from such accident is not given in contravention of the provisions of regulation 11 or 12, shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of one thousand dollars.

42. Notwithstanding anything contained in section 10 of the Ordinance, the proprietor of an industrial undertaking in or in respect of which an offence against regulation 15(4) or 16 is committed shall not be guilty of a like offence. Liability of proprietors.


SCHEDULE.

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
Dangerous Occurrences.

1. Bursting of a revolving vessel, wheel, grindstone or grinding wheel moved by mechanical power.
2. Collapse or failure of a crane, derrick, winch, hoist or other appliance used in raising or lowering persons or goods or any part thereof (except the breakage of chain or rope slings), or the overturning of a crane.
3. Explosion or fire causing damage to the structure of any room or place in which persons are employed, or to any machine or plant contained therein and resulting in the complete suspension of ordinary work in such room or place.
4. Electrical short circuit or failure of electrical machinery, plant or apparatus, attended by explosion or fire or causing structural damage thereto, and involving its stoppage or disuse.
5. Explosion of a receiver or container used for the storage at a pressure greater than atmospheric pressure of any gas or gases (including air) or any liquid or solid resulting from the compression of gas.
6. Collapse in whole or part from any cause whatsoever of any roof, wall, floor, structure or foundation forming part of the premises of an industrial undertaking in which persons are employed.

Explanatory Note.

(This Note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general purport.)

These regulations are made under the recently enacted Factories and Industrial Undertakings Ordinance, 1955, and replace the existing Factories and Workshops Regulations. In effect, all the provisions of the existing regulations are retained although, in certain instances, varied or amplified. In addition, these regulations contain certain new provisions which are inserted either to meet Hong Kong's obligations under the International Labour Code, 1951, or because they are considered desirable in view of increased industrial activity. A comparative table is set out in the Appendix, and the more important departures from the present regulations are mentioned below.

2. Regulation 11 provides a greater measure of supervision over accidents. A report is required in respect of accidents in respect of all industrial undertakings and not only of factories and workshops, and the time within which a report must be made is reduced from seven days to twenty-four hours in the case of a death, and to forty-eight hours in the case of a disablement. Under regulation 12 a report is required of a dangerous occurrence (specified in the Schedule) whether or not an injury has been caused.

3. Regulation 14 empowers inspectors to require dangers and defects in industrial undertakings to be remedied, and for this purpose subject to the approval of the Superintendent of Labour or a labour officer to order suspension of work. Provision is made for appeal from any exercise of this power to the Commissioner. This power, although new as regards inspectors, is very similar to that already given to mines officers in respect of mines under the Mining Ordinance, 1954, and complies with Article 890 of the International Labour Code, 1951.

4. A number of new provisions have been added providing for the taking of samples (regulation 15) and the duties of persons employed in industrial undertakings (regulation 16), and certain requirements concerning hygiene in registrable workplaces (regulations 29 to 36). These provisions are based on similar provisions in the Factories Act, 1937. Regulation 15 complies with Article 889, paragraph 1(c) (iv) of the International Labour Code, 1951.

5. Regulations 17 to 36 concern registrable workplaces in general, which include factories, mines and any premises or place in which a dangerous or scheduled trade is carried on. The provisions relating to prevention of accidents (regulations 18 to 20) and prevention of or escape from fire (regulations 21 to 28) are therefore applicable to all such places and not as at present only to factories and workshops.

The Emergency (Agricultural Poisons) Regulations, 1955, (G.N.A. 71/55) (the principal regulations) which came into operation on 15th July, 1955, banned as from that date the acquisition, importation and all use of certain insecticides and further prohibited possession without licence of them from 15th August, 1955.

2. The principal regulations are amended by these regulations in the following respects—

- (a) the Director of Commerce and Industry is appointed a competent authority under the regulations in addition to the Director of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry;
- (b) a competent authority is authorized to issue permits to import, export, use and deal with the insecticides governed by the regulations—this will enable for example permission to be granted for insecticides to be shipped in transit through the Colony and to be imported and used for research and experimental purposes;
- (c) "authorized officers" under the Importation and Exportation Ordinance (Chapter 50) are appointed inspectors for the purposes of these regulations and the powers of inspectors are clarified.





Duty to wear clean clothing. 6. Every licensee shall whilst plying his trade wear clean clothing of washable material.

Hours of trade. 7. Every licensee shall trade only between the hours of 6 a.m. and 10 p.m."






