IMPORTANT TO FIND OVERALL SOLUTION TO VBP PROBLEM: GOVERNOR  
\* \* \* \* \*

IT REMAINS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT THAT WE SHOULD FIND AN OVERALL SATISFACTORY SOLUTION TO THE VIETNAMESE BOAT PEOPLE PROBLEM, ALTHOUGH IT HAS BEEN EASIER TO HANDLE THIS YEAR BECAUSE THE NUMBERS COMING IN HAVE BEEN MUCH LESS, THE GOVERNOR, SIR DAVID WILSON, SAID TODAY (FRIDAY).

SPEAKING TO REPORTERS AFTER PRESIDING AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE ST JOHN'S AMBULANCE ASSOCIATION AND BRIGADE, SIR DAVID SAID THE MINISTER OF STATE FOR FOREIGN AND COMMONWEALTH AFFAIRS, MR FRANCIS MAUDE, WAS CURRENTLY IN WASHINGTON TO DISCUSS A NUMBER OF ISSUES WITH THE AMERICAN GOVERNMENT AND ONE OF THEM WAS THE QUESTION OF VIETNAMESE BOAT PEOPLE.

"I THINK IT IS VERY IMPORTANT THAT WE SHOULD CONTINUE TO PUT ACROSS, AT A HIGH LEVEL, TO PEOPLE IN THE UNITED STATES, THE IMPORTANCE OF FINDING AN OVERALL SOLUTION BECAUSE UP TO NOW ONE OF THE BLOCKS ON AN OVERALL SOLUTION HAS BEEN THE UNITED STATES. THE OTHER BLOCK HAS BEEN VIETNAM," HE SAID.

"IT'S NO GOOD SIMPLY DEALING WITH RESETTLEMENT OF REFUGEES WHO ARE REFUGEES. YOU'VE GOT TO FIND SOME WAY OF DEALING WITH THE PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT REFUGEES.

"NOW THAT DOES MEAN, AT THE END OF THE DAY, THAT THEY GO HOME TO VIETNAM, WHICH IS WHERE THEY HAVE COME FROM," HE SAID.

"THE PROPOSAL HAS BEEN PUT TO THE UNITED STATES BEFORE, THAT THEY SHOULD ESTABLISH A HOLDING CENTRE ON ONE OF THEIR PIECES OF TERRITORY IN THE PACIFIC. SO I IMAGINE HE'S BEEN PURSUING THAT," THE GOVERNOR SAID.

ASKED IF HONG KONG WOULD ABOLISH THE FIRST PORT OF ASYLUM POLICY, THE GOVERNOR SAID: "WHAT WE'VE SAID FOR A LONG TIME, IT WAS A POINT WHICH I MADE IN GENEVA LAST YEAR AT THE MAJOR CONFERENCE ON THE WHOLE PROBLEM OF VIETNAMESE BOAT PEOPLE, WAS THAT UNLESS THERE IS A SATISFACTORY OVERALL SOLUTION TO THE PROBLEM AT SOME STAGE IT WILL BECOME IMPOSSIBLE FOR HONGKONG TO GO ON PLAYING IT'S RIGHTFUL ROLE IN PROVIDING FIRST ASYLUM."

"IT IS A POINT THAT WE'VE PUT ACROSS FOR A VERY LONG TIME TO THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY," HE SAID.

ASKED TO COMMENT ON THE VISIT OF THE MAYOR OF SHANGHAI, SIR DAVID SAID HE VERY MUCH WELCOMED THE VISIT HERE BY MAYOR ZHU RONGJI, AND ADDED: "THE IDEA OF COMING TO HONG KONG AND EXPLAINING PERSONALLY WHAT HIS DEVELOPMENT PLANS ARE, WAS, I THINK, A VERY GOOD IDEA AND IT WILL HELP TO BUILD UP THE ECONOMIC RELATIONS WHICH WE HAVE WITH SHANGHAI AND WHICH WE'VE HAD FOR A VERY LONG TIME."

"I ALSO VERY MUCH ENJOYED AND BENEFITTED FROM MEETING THE MAYOR MYSELF," THE GOVERNOR SAID.

GOVERNOR TO VISIT LONDON

\* \* \* \* \*

THE GOVERNOR, SIR DAVID WILSON, WILL VISIT LONDON FROM JUNE 27 TO JULY 1. THE MAIN PURPOSE WILL BE TO BRIEF THE FOREIGN SECRETARY, MR DOUGLAS HURD, ON THE CURRENT SITUATION IN HONG KONG, A GOVERNMENT SPOKESMAN SAID TODAY (FRIDAY).

THE GOVERNOR WILL ALSO MEET THE MINISTER OF STATE WITH RESPONSIBILITY FOR HONG KONG, MR FRANCIS MAUDE, AND HOLD DISCUSSIONS WITH OFFICIALS IN THE FOREIGN AND COMMONWEALTH OFFICE.

THE GOVERNOR AND LADY WILSON WILL TRAVEL TO EDINBURGH ON JULY 1 WHERE SIR DAVID WILL ATTEND A SEMINAR GIVEN BY SCOTTISH FINANCIAL ENTERPRISE AND MEET MEMBERS OF THE HONG KONG COMMUNITY IN EDINBURGH.

THE GOVERNOR WILL THEN GO ON TO ABERDEEN WHERE HE WILL RECEIVE AN HONORARY DEGREE AS A DOCTOR OF LAW FROM ABERDEEN UNIVERSITY.

THE GOVERNOR WILL LEAVE HONG KONG ON JUNE 26 AND RETURN ON JULY 7.

NO INTENTION TO OVER-REGULATE MARKETS: SMA

THE GOVERNMENT HAS NO INTENTION TO LET THE FINANCIAL MARKETS IN HONG KONG BE STIFLED BY "OVER-REGULATION", BUT THERE IS NEED TO INTRODUCE NEW LEGISLATION TO BRING HONG KONG IN LINE WITH INTERNATIONAL REGULATORY STANDARDS, THE SECRETARY FOR MONETARY AFFAIRS, MR DAVID NENDICK, SAID.

WHILE HONG KONG WAS MOVING WHERE IT COULD TOWARDS MORE SELF-REGULATION AS MARKETS MATURED, THE GOVERNMENT WAS CONSCIOUS OF THE NEED TO BALANCE THE INTERESTS OF LOCAL AND INTERNATIONAL, BIG AND SMALL MARKET PLAYERS AND KEEP THE REGULATORY COSTS REASONABLE AND REGULATORY FRAMEWORK SIMPLE, HE SAID.

SPEAKING AT A SEMINAR ORGANISED BY THE WORLD BANK IN MASSACHUSETTS, USA, YESTERDAY (THURSDAY), MR NENDICK POINTED OUT THAT THERE WAS WIDESPREAD PERCEPTION IN HONG KONG THAT THE MARKETS WERE IN DANGER OF BEING OVER-REGULATED.

HE NOTED THAT THE REASONS WHICH LED TO SUCH PERCEPTION WERE MANIFOLD; AMONG THEM WERE A LOW LEVEL OF MARKET TURNOVER BY LOCAL INVESTORS SINCE THE CRASH IN OCTOBER 1987 AND UNCERTAINTIES GENERATED BY THE EVENTS IN CHINA IN JUNE 1989.

OTHER REASONS INCLUDED MISPLACED FEARS THAT THE GOVERNMENT WAS INTENT ON MODELLING MARKET SUPERVISION TOO CLOSELY ON THAT APPLIED IN THE UNITED KINGDOM; EROSION OF THE ROLE AND PROFITABILITY OF THE SMALLER BROKERS; AND THE CUMULATIVE IMPACT OF INTRODUCING MANY REFORMS WITHIN A SHORT PERIOD OF TIME.

HE ADDED THAT THE GOVERNMENT, IN ALLAYING CONCERN ABOUT OVER-REGULATION, HAD BEEN ENCOURAGING THE SECURITIES AND FUTURES COMMISSION (SFC) AND THE EXCHANGES TO BUILD BRIDGES AND DEVELOP MUTUAL TRUST.

MR NENDICK TOLD PARTICIPANTS IN THE SEMINAR ON THE FINANCIAL SECTOR LIBERALISATION AND REGULATION THAT THE SECURITIES REVIEW COMMITTEE (SRC), WHICH DELIVERED ITS REPORT IN JUNE 1988, FOUND THAT THE CONCEPT OF SELF-REGULATION AND MARKET SELF-DISCIPLINE HAD FAILED TO DEVELOP IN HONG KONG.

THE SUPERVISORY BODIES THEN CHARGED WITH OVERSEEING THE MARKETS HAD LOST EFFECTIVE CONTROL, HE SAID.

FURTHERMORE, THE SETTLEMENT SYSTEM HAD PROVED INADEQUATE TO COPE WITH THE VERY HIGH LEVELS OF TURNOVER EXPERIENCED, HE SAID.

THE SRC RECOMMENDED A SERIES OF CHANGES WHICH INCLUDED CONSTITUTIONAL REFORM OF THE STOCK AND FUTURES EXCHANGES TO ENSURE BROAD CROSS-SECTION OF REPRESENTATION ON THE GOVERNING BODIES; THE DEVELOPMENT OF INDEPENDENT AND PROFESSIONAL STAFF TO ADMINISTER THE EXCHANGES; EXTENSION OF T+1 SECURITIES SETTLEMENT PERIOD TO T+3 AND EARLY IMPLEMENTATION OF A CENTRAL CLEARING SYSTEM.

THE COMMITTEE ADVOCATED ALSO STRENGTHENING OF RISK MANAGEMENT ON THE FUTURES EXCHANGE AND REPLACING THE REGULATORY BODIES WITH A SINGLE INDEPENDENT STATUTORY BODY OUTSIDE THE CIVIL SERVICE TO BE HEADED AND STAFFED BY FULL-TIME REGULATORS, MR NENDICK SAID.

THE SRC REPORT WAS WELL-RECEIVED BY LOCAL AND OVERSEAS FINANCIAL SECTORS AND THE GOVERNMENT ACCEPTED THE GENERAL THURST OF ITS RECOMMENDATIONS AND COMMITTED ITSELF TO THEIR EARLY IMPLEMENTATION, HE NOTED.

MR NENDICK ADDED THAT THE GOVERNMENT WAS DETERMINED TO REFORM THE REGULATORY SYSTEM FOR THE SECURITIES INDUSTRY TO BRING HONG KONG IN LINE WITH THE REGULATORY STANDARDS OF INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL CENTRES.

THE ULTIMATE AIM OF THESE REFORMS WAS TO DEVELOP HONG KONG INTO A PRE-EMINENT CAPITAL MARKET IN THE SOUTH EAST ASIAN REGION, MR NENDICK STRESSED.

HE NOTED THAT MAJOR REFORMS WERE ALL IMPLEMENTED WITHIN 20 MONTHS OF THE CRASH IN OCTOBER 1987.

REVIEWING THE SECURITIES MARKETS TODAY, MR NENDICK SAID THAT THE STOCK EXCHANGE, ON ITS OWN INITIATIVE, HAD SUCCESSFULLY RECONSTITUTED ITSELF BY JULY 1988 AND A COUNCIL WITH A BROADLY-BASED MEMBERSHIP AND REPRESENTATIVE OF THE MARKET AND AN INDEPENDENT CHAIRMAN WAS ELECTED IN OCTOBER 1988.

THE DAY-TO-DAY MANAGEMENT OF THE STOCK EXCHANGE WAS UNDERTAKEN BY PROFESSIONAL STAFF OF ABOUT 300 IN FIVE DIVISIONS AND IMPROVEMENT TO THE LISTING RULES WAS COMPLETED IN DECEMBER 1989, MR NENDICK SAID, ADDING THAT INTERIM IMPROVEMENTS WERE MADE TO THE SETTLEMENT SYSTEM.

FOLLOWING LENGTHY PUBLIC DEBATES AND DISCUSSIONS IN AND OUTSIDE THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, THE SECURITIES AND FUTURES COMMISSION ORDINANCE WAS ENACTED IN APRIL 1989, ESTABLISHING THE SFC FROM MAY 1 THAT YEAR, HE SAID.

EARLY IN JUNE 1989, A MORE BROADLY-BASED AND REPRESENTATIVE BOARD TOOK OFFICE AT THE FUTURES EXCHANGE, FOLLOWING A WHOLESALE REVISION OF ITS CONSTITUTION, MR NENDICK SAID.

LOOKING INTO THE DAYS AHEAD, MR NENDICK SAID: "THE AIM IS FOR THE SFC AND THE EXCHANGES TO WORK TOGETHER IN DEVELOPING NEW PRODUCTS WHICH WILL ENHANCE ATTRACTION OF HONG KONG AS AN INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL CENTRE.

"WE ARE RECOVERING FROM THE SHOCK OF LAST YEAR'S EVENTS IN CHINA WHICH PROVED THE VALUE OF THE REFORMS WE HAD INTRODUCED - AND I AM CONFIDENT THAT WE SHALL CONTINUE TO PROSPER."

GOVT'S AIM TO MAKE HK AN ATTRACTIVE PLACE TO STAY

\* \* \* \* \*

THE GOVERNMENT'S AIM FOR THE LONG TERM IS TO MAKE HONG KONG A PLACE WHERE PEOPLE WILL WANT TO STAY, THE SECRETARY FOR TRADE AND INDUSTRY, MR JOHN CHAN, SAID YESTERDAY (THURSDAY).

SPEAKING AT A LUNCH MEETING OF THE SWEDEN-HONG KONG SOCIETY IN STOCKHOLM, MR CHAN SAID THE GOVERNMENT'S STRATEGY WAS TO MAINTAIN THOSE ASPECTS OF HONG KONG LIFE THAT WERE MOST ATTRACTIVE, SUCH AS A DYNAMIC ECONOMY, FULL EMPLOYMENT AND LOW TAX RATES, AND TO IMPROVE FURTHER THE QUALITY OF LIFE IN HONG KONG IN TERMS OF, FOR EXAMPLE, A CLEANER ENVIRONMENT, BETTER HOUSING AND HIGHER STANDARDS OF SOCIAL SERVICES.

ON MAINTAINING A STRONG ECONOMY, MR CHAN SAID THE GOVERNOR ANNOUNCED LAST OCTOBER A COMPREHENSIVE STRATEGY FOR A MASSIVE EXPANSION OF HONG KONG'S PORT, AIRPORT AND ASSOCIATED FACILITIES TO COPE WITH ITS RAPIDLY GROWING ROLE AS AN ENTREPOT AND REGIONAL HUB.

"THIS HAS ATTRACTED WIDESPREAD INTERNATIONAL ATTENTION AND INTEREST. WE ARE PUSHING AHEAD WITH DETAILED PLANNING OF THE VARIOUS PROJECTS IN THE PACKAGE," HE SAID.

MR CHAN SAID THE GOVERNMENT WAS ALSO TAKING STEPS TO SUPPORT THE FURTHER DEVELOPMENT OF HONG KONG'S MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES.

ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT ASPECTS OF THIS SUPPORT WAS THE PROVISION OF ADEQUATE INDUSTRIAL LAND, PARTICULARLY LAND FOR HIGHER-TECHNOLOGY INDUSTRIES WHICH COULD NOT OPERATE EFFICIENTLY IN CONVENTIONAL MULTI-STOREY FACTORY BUILDINGS.

"WE HAVE SET UP TWO INDUSTRIAL ESTATES FOR THIS PURPOSE, AND STARTED TO DEVELOP A THIRD," HE SAID.

HE SAID AN IMPORTANT AREA WAS THE SUPPLY OF HIGHLY-SKILLED AND WELL-TRAINED MANPOWER FOR INDUSTRY.

THE GOVERNMENT HAD PLANS TO EXPAND HIGHER EDUCATION, INCLUDING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A HONG KONG UNIVERSITY OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY WHICH WAS SCHEDULED TO OPEN IN OCTOBER 1991, AND STRENGTHENED VOCATIONAL TRAINING TO IMPROVE THE EXPERTISE OF TECHNICIANS.

THE GOVERNMENT WAS ALSO ENCOURAGING DEVELOPMENT OF MORE KNOWLEDGE AND TECHNOLOGY-INTENSIVE INDUSTRIES, HE SAID.

"WE HAVE DECIDED TO ESTABLISH A TECHNOLOGY CENTRE TO PROVIDE FACILITIES AND SERVICES FOR NEW AND SMALL-SCALE HIGH-TECHNOLOGY COMPANIES UNTIL THEY CAN STAND ON THEIR OWN FEET.

"MEANWHILE, A SERIES OF SERVICES SUCH AS PRODUCTIVITY ENHANCEMENT, QUALITY IMPROVEMENT AND PRODUCT DESIGN WILL CONTINUE TO BE PROVIDED BY BOTH THE GOVERNMENT AND OTHERS TO SHARPEN THE COMPETITIVE EDGE OF OUR MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES," HE SAID.

MR CHAN SAID ALL THESE ACTIONS DEMONSTRATED THE GOVERNMENT'S STRONG COMMITMENT TO THE FUTURE.

"I AM CONFIDENT THAT THEY WILL ENABLE HONG KONG TO CONTINUE AS ONE OF THE MOST DYNAMIC INDUSTRIAL AND TRADING ECONOMIES IN THE ASIA PACIFIC REGION WELL INTO THE 21ST CENTURY," HE SAID.

"AS WE ENGAGE IN BUILDING A BETTER FUTURE, THERE WILL BE PLENTY OF BUSINESS AND INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR FOREIGN AND LOCAL COMPANIES ALIKE. WE WELCOME COMPANIES FROM SWEDEN TO JOIN US IN OUR GREAT UNDERTAKING," HE SAID.

MR CHAN SAID ECONOMIC AND TRADE RELATIONS BETWEEN SWEDEN AND HONG KONG WERE LONG ESTABLISHED, BUT THEY HAD DEVELOPED WITH PARTICULAR VIGOUR IN RECENT YEARS.

TOTAL TWO-WAY TRADE AMOUNTED TO \$5,587 MILLION IN 1989, 15 PER CENT HIGHER THAN THE 1988 FIGURE AND NEARLY DOUBLE THAT FOR 1986.

WITHIN EUROPE, SWEDEN WAS NOW THE SIXTH LARGEST MARKET FOR HONG KONG'S DOMESTIC EXPORTS AND THE EIGHTH LARGEST SUPPLIER OF HONG KONG'S IMPORTS.

FIVE YEARS AGO THERE WERE ABOUT 40 SWEDISH COMPANIES OPERATING IN HONG KONG; TODAY THE NUMBER STOOD AT 126 AND WAS STILL GROWING, MR CHAN SAID.

THE GOVERNOR HAS APPOINTED, AS MEMBERS OF THE PROVISIONAL AIRPORT AUTHORITY, MR HO SAI-CHU, MR JACK TANG, MR DAVID GLEDHILL, MR JOHN BOND, MR ANTONY LEUNG, MR VINCENT LO, THE SECRETARY FOR TRANSPORT, THE SECRETARY FOR ECONOMIC SERVICES, THE SECRETARY FOR MONETARY AFFAIRS, THE SECRETARY FOR WORKS AND THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL AVIATION, A GOVERNMENT SPOKESMAN SAID TODAY (FRIDAY).

"THE MEMBERS OF THE PROVISIONAL AIRPORT AUTHORITY WILL BRING TOGETHER A WIDE AND VALUABLE RANGE OF BUSINESS, CONSTRUCTION, FINANCIAL AND AVIATION EXPERIENCE," HE SAID.

MR HO SAI-CHU IS A MEMBER OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL AND A DIRECTOR AND MANAGER OF THE FOOK LEE CONSTRUCTION COMPANY.

MR JACK TANG IS CHAIRMAN OF THE SOUTH SEA TEXTILE MANUFACTURING COMPANY LIMITED.

MR DAVID GLEDHILL IS THE CHAIRMAN OF SWIRE PACIFIC IN HONG KONG.

MR JOHN BOND IS THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BANKING OF THE HONGKONG AND SHANGHAI BANKING CORPORATION.

MR ANTONY LEUNG IS A SENIOR EXECUTIVE OF CITIBANK, NA.

MR VINCENT LO IS THE CHAIRMAN OF THE SHUI ON GROUP.

"CHAired BY THE FINANCIAL SECRETARY, THE PROVISIONAL AIRPORT AUTHORITY WILL NOW ASSUME OVERALL RESPONSIBILITY FOR TAKING FORWARD THE PLANNING OF THE NEW AIRPORT AT CHEK LAP KOK," THE SPOKESMAN SAID.

"THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER WHEN APPOINTED WILL ALSO BE A MEMBER OF THE PROVISIONAL AIRPORT AUTHORITY," HE ADDED.

PROVISIONAL AIRPORT AUTHORITY MEETS FOR FIRST TIME

THE PROVISIONAL AIRPORT AUTHORITY (PAA) HELD ITS FIRST MEETING THIS (FRIDAY) AFTERNOON AT WHICH MEMBERS WERE BRIEFED ON THE PROGRESS OF THE REPLACEMENT AIRPORT PROJECT.

WITH THE FORMAL ESTABLISHMENT OF THE PAA, RESPONSIBILITY FOR TAKING FORWARD THE PLANNING OF THE NEW AIRPORT HAS BEEN EFFECTIVELY TRANSFERRED FROM THE GOVERNMENT TO THE AUTHORITY.

/"IN THE .....

"IN THE LIGHT OF THIS DEVELOPMENT, AN EARLY MEETING OF THE AUTHORITY WAS REQUIRED TO AGREE ON TRANSITIONAL ARRANGEMENTS UNDER WHICH THE VARIOUS GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS INVOLVED CONTINUE TO TAKE FORWARD THE PLANNING EFFORT ON BEHALF OF THE AUTHORITY UNTIL THE LATTER HAS ITS OWN STAFF TO ASSUME THESE RESPONSIBILITIES," A GOVERNMENT SPOKESMAN SAID.

HE SAID PERHAPS THE MOST PRESSING ISSUE DEALT WITH WAS THE MASTER PLAN CONSULTANCY FOR THE NEW AIRPORT.

"ON THIS IT WAS AGREED THAT THIS SHOULD NOW BE CONCLUDED BETWEEN THE PAA (RATHER THAN THE GOVERNMENT) AND THE CHOSEN CONSULTANCY FIRM.

"IT WAS ALSO AGREED THAT, PENDING THE APPOINTMENT OF A CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER, THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL AVIATION SHOULD CONTINUE TO ADMINISTER, ON BEHALF OF THE AUTHORITY, THIS CONTRACT," HE SAID.

"WE HOPE TO HAVE A CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER IN PLACE BY OCTOBER AT THE LATEST," THE SPOKESMAN ADDED.

MEMBERS ALSO AGREED ON A NUMBER OF PROCEDURAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS CONCERNING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE AUTHORITY AND PROVIDING IT WITH ITS OWN ACCOMMODATION.

RECOMMENDATIONS ON DEVELOPMENT OF FAMILY, CHILD CARE SERVICES  
\* \* \* \* \*

THE WORKING PARTY ON SOCIAL WELFARE POLICIES AND SERVICES MADE A SERIES OF RECOMMENDATIONS ON FUTURE DEVELOPMENT OF FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES AT ITS MEETING TODAY (FRIDAY).

MEMBERS OF THE WORKING PARTY HAD A THOROUGH DISCUSSION ON ISSUES RELATED TO FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES AND MADE THE FOLLOWING RECOMMENDATIONS ON IMPROVEMENTS:

FAMILY WELFARE SERVICES:

IN ORDER TO PREVENT DISINTEGRATION, FAMILY AID SERVICE SHOULD BE DEVELOPED SO THAT CHILDREN MIGHT NOT HAVE TO BE PUT IN CARE OUTSIDE THE FAMILY.

HOME HELP SERVICE:

IN CALCULATING FUTURE DEMAND ON THE SERVICE, NOT ONLY THE NEEDS OF THE ELDERLY BUT ALSO THOSE OF THE DISABLED LIVING AT HOME AND CHILDREN OF SINGLE PARENTS SHOULD BE TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT.

SERVICE PROVISION SHOULD BE FLEXIBLE AND RESPONSIVE TO INDIVIDUAL NEEDS. IN THIS CONNECTION, A DIFFERENT OPERATIONAL STRATEGY MIGHT NEED TO BE CONSIDERED FOR MEETING NEEDS OF PEOPLE ON THE OUTLYING ISLANDS.

## CHILD WELFARE SERVICES:

MEMBERS AGREED IN PRINCIPLE THAT A MORE FLEXIBLE POLICY FOR THE PROVISION OF DAY CRECHE SERVICE MIGHT NOW BE NECESSARY. EFFORTS SHOULD BE MADE TO SET UP DAY CRECHES IN NEW TOWNS FOR SOCIAL NEED CASES. THESE ARE AT PRESENT NOT AVAILABLE BECAUSE OF THE DECISION TO FREEZE DAY CRECHE PLACES SINCE 1979.

WORK-BASED CHILD CARE CENTRES SHOULD BE FURTHER EXPLORED AND IMPLEMENTED. IN THE PROVISION OF CHILD CARE SERVICES FOR THE WORKFORCE, THE INVOLVEMENT OF EMPLOYERS AND INDUSTRIALISTS SHOULD BE ENCOURAGED.

THEIR INVOLVEMENT WOULD BE A SIGNIFICANT STEP FORWARD, INDICATING RECOGNITION OF SOCIAL NEEDS OF THEIR EMPLOYEES, AND THE CONTRIBUTION OF THE INDUSTRIAL AND COMMERCIAL SECTORS TO SOCIETY IN GENERAL AND TO THE WORKFORCE IN PARTICULAR.

A SOCIAL WELFARE DEPARTMENT LIAISON OFFICE SHOULD BE GIVEN A TRIAL IN THE SUPREME COURT PREMISES WITH THE OBJECTIVE OF SERVING THE FAMILY COURT.

THIS WOULD ASSIST THE JUDICIARY IN CHANNELLING ENQUIRIES ON FAMILY MATTERS, MAKE ENQUIRIES CONCERNING WELFARE SERVICES AND HANDLING PROCEDURES, AND PROVIDE IMMEDIATE SOCIAL WORK INTERVENTION.

CONSIDERATION SHOULD ALSO BE GIVEN TO MAKING REFERRALS FOR FAMILY COUNSELLING TO FAMILY SERVICE CENTRES OF VOLUNTARY AGENCIES AND OF THE SOCIAL WELFARE DEPARTMENT.

ON LEGAL PROVISIONS IN RESPECT OF CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT, MEMBERS RECOMMENDED THAT THE EXISTING PUBLICITY MEASURES SHOULD BE CONTINUED AND THAT THE GROUP WORK APPROACH BE EMPLOYED TO HELP BOTH THE ABUSED AND THE ABUSERS.

SINCE THE TENDENCY OF LEAVING CHILDREN UNATTENDED WAS APPARENTLY ON THE INCREASE, THE WORKING PARTY CONSIDERED THAT PUBLICITY AND EDUCATION AGAINST LEAVING CHILDREN UNATTENDED WERE MORE APPROPRIATE THAN LEGISLATION.

THE SOCIAL WELFARE DEPARTMENT SHOULD CONSIDER THE DESIRABILITY OF MERGING THE ADOPTION UNIT WITH THE FOSTER CARE UNIT. THE ADVANTAGE OF SUCH AN ARRANGEMENT WOULD BE EXAMINED IN THE FUTURE.

## RESIDENTIAL CHILD CARE:

THE REVISED PRINCIPLES FOR THE FUTURE DEVELOPMENT OF SUPPORT SERVICES TO THE FAMILY AND RESIDENTIAL CHILD CARE SERVICES ARE:

- THE FIRST OBJECTIVE IS TO MAKE IT POSSIBLE AND DESIRABLE FOR THE CHILD TO REMAIN WITH HIS OR HER OWN FAMILY;
- A FAMILY SETTING MEETS THE NEEDS OF A CHILD IN CARE BETTER THAN AN INSTITUTIONAL SETTING AND PARTICULARLY FOR YOUNGER CHILDREN;

- WHERE A PARTICULAR FAMILY CANNOT MEET THE NEEDS OF A CHILD BECAUSE OF SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES, A CHILD MAY BE PLACED IN RESIDENTIAL CARE, BUT THERE SHOULD BE CONTINUED INVOLVEMENT OF PARENTS IN THE SUPERVISION AND CARE OF THE CHILD;
- IN AN INSTITUTIONAL SETTING, SMALLER RESIDENTIAL UNITS ARE PREFERABLE TO LARGER ONES;
- WHILE THE CHILD IS IN RESIDENTIAL CARE, THE PERIOD OF CARE SHOULD BE ONE OF CONSTRUCTIVE EXPERIENCE TO THE CHILD; AND
- A COMPREHENSIVE PROGRAMME OF PLANNING AND REGULAR ASSESSMENT FOR THE FAMILY AND THE CHILD IS ESSENTIAL FROM PRE-PLACEMENT TO AFTERCARE.

A MAJOR STEP IN THE GOVERNMENT'S PORT AND AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY (PADS) TAKES PLACE TODAY (FRIDAY) WITH TENDERS BEING INVITED FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE YAU MA TEI REPLACEMENT TYPHOON SHELTER.

THE PROJECT IS NECESSARY IN ORDER THAT THE EXISTING TYPHOON SHELTER CAN BE REPLACED TO MAKE WAY FOR THE WEST KOWLOON RECLAMATION, WHICH FORMS AN INTEGRAL PART OF THE PADS.

AS ANNOUNCED EARLIER, THE WEST KOWLOON RECLAMATION INVOLVES THE FORMATION OF OVER 300 HECTARES OF LAND FROM THE WEST-END WATERFRONT OF MEI FOO SUN CHUEN TO THE NORTH OF THE CHINA FERRY TERMINAL, CANTON ROAD.

APART FROM FUTURE USES FOR VARIOUS DEVELOPMENTS, THE MASSIVE LAND FORMED BY THE RECLAMATION WILL ALSO PROVIDE LAND RESERVES FOR THE RELATED TRANSPORT INFRASTRUCTURES PROPOSED UNDER THE PADS.

YUEN LONG AND KAM TIN SEWERAGE MASTER PLAN STUDY

THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION DEPARTMENT (EPD) HAS COMMISSIONED A CONSULTANCY STUDY TO ASSESS THE EXTENT OF THE POLLUTION PROBLEMS RESULTING FROM THE IMPROPER DISCHARGE OF SEWAGE GENERATED WITHIN YUEN LONG, KAM TIN AND SURROUNDING RURAL AREAS INTO WATERCOURSES AND COASTAL WATERS.

AN EPD SPOKESMAN SAID TODAY (FRIDAY) THAT AS YUEN LONG NEW TOWN DEVELOPS, SEWERAGE SYSTEMS DO NOT ALWAYS KEEP PACE AND MANY OF THE OLD DEVELOPMENTS WITHIN THE NEW TOWN ARE NOT PROVIDED WITH PROPER SEWERAGE FACILITIES.

IN ADDITION, A LARGE PROPORTION OF THE RURAL AREAS OF THE CATCHMENT ARE NOT PROVIDED WITH, NOR ARE THERE ANY PLANS TO PROVIDE, SEWERAGE SYSTEMS.

THE ABSENCE OF PROPER SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE TREATMENT DISPOSAL FACILITIES HAS RESULTED IN THE DIRECT DISCHARGES OF SEWAGE AND WASTEWATER INTO THE ADJACENT WATERCOURSES.

THIS HAS CAUSED A SEVERE POLLUTION PROBLEM IN THE YUEN LONG RIVER, SHAM CHUN RIVER, NG TUNG HO AND THEIR RECEIVING WATER BODY, DEEP BAY, IN PARTICULAR INNER DEEP BAY.

THE STUDY, CALLED THE YUEN LONG AND KAM TIN SEWERAGE MASTER PLAN STUDY, WILL ASSESS THE INADEQUACIES OF THE EXISTING SEWERAGE, SEWAGE TREATMENT AND DISPOSAL SYSTEMS IN THE AREA AND IDENTIFY THE EXTENT OF THE UNSEWERED DEVELOPMENTS.

A SEWERAGE MASTER PLAN WILL BE DEVELOPED AND A PRIORITISED PROGRAMME WILL BE PREPARED WHICH WILL PROVIDE SHORT AND LONG TERM MEASURES TO REDUCE THE POLLUTION PROBLEMS IN STAGES.

"THE THEME OF THE EXHIBITION IS TO INTRODUCE TO LOCAL RESIDENTS THE WORK OF THE WORKS SECTION, INCLUDING THE CO-ORDINATION, PLANNING AND SUPERVISION OF LOCAL PUBLIC WORKS, MINOR ENVIRONMENTAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS, THE SQUATTER AREA IMPROVEMENT SCHEME AND ENVIRONMENTAL HYGIENE FACILITIES," HE SAID.

REFERRING TO LONG-TERM DEVELOPMENT, MR WAN SAID THE GOVERNMENT'S RURAL PLANNING AND IMPROVEMENT STRATEGY CONSULTATION PAPER PUBLISHED IN APRIL LAST YEAR HAD PROPOSED SPENDING \$4 BILLION IN THE NEXT 10 YEARS TO BUILD PROPER COMMUNITY FACILITIES AND INFRASTRUCTURES.

THE AIM WAS TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE IN RURAL AREAS, WITH IMPROVEMENTS FITTING IN WITH THE OVERALL DEVELOPMENT OF HONG KONG.

"AT PRESENT, GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS ARE WORKING ON VARIOUS PLANS. IT IS HOPED THAT THE PROJECTS WILL COMMENCE IN THE NEAR FUTURE," HE ADDED.

SINCE THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THESE IMPROVEMENT WORKS WOULD REQUIRE CO-OPERATION BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT AND RESIDENTS, MR WAN URGED THE LATTER TO USE EVERY AVAILABLE CHANNEL TO VOICE THEIR OPINIONS AND REFLECT LOCAL PROBLEMS TO THE GOVERNMENT.

HE ALSO URGED RESIDENTS TO REGISTER AS VOTERS IN THIS YEAR'S VOTER REGISTRATION CAMPAIGN BETWEEN AUGUST 15 AND OCTOBER 1, AND TO VOTE IN NEXT YEAR'S ELECTIONS.

THE TUEN MUN DISTRICT MINOR ENVIRONMENTAL IMPROVEMENT AND PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS EXHIBITION HAS BEEN ORGANISED BY THE TUEN MUN DISTRICT OFFICE.
