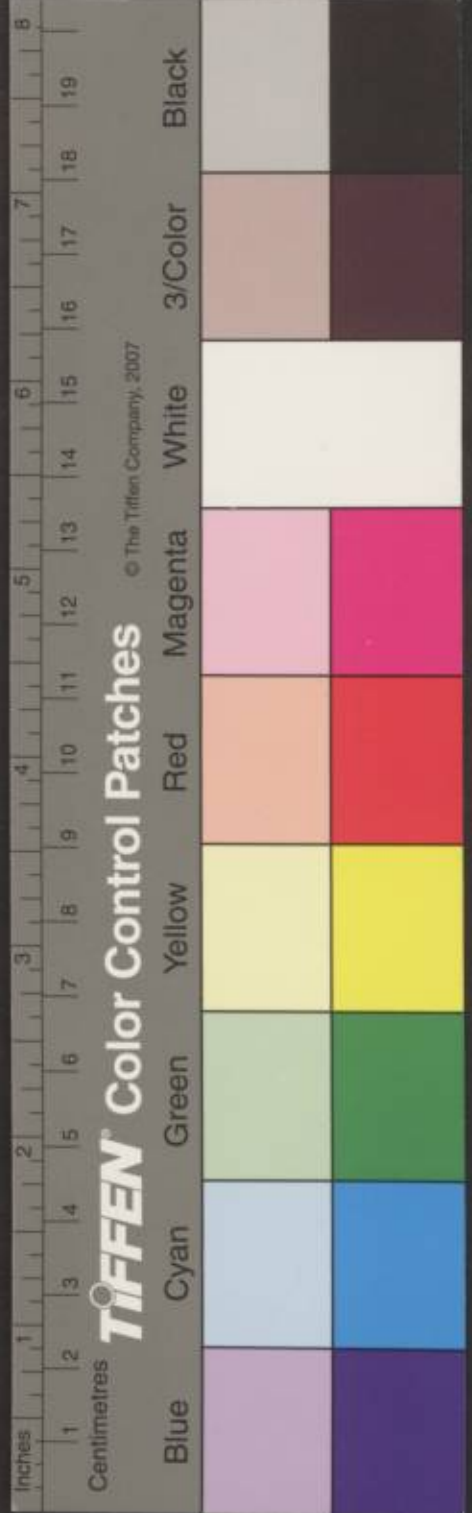

Whereas by section 189 of the Army Act it is enacted that where the Governor of a Colony in which any of His Majesty's forces are serving declares at any time or times that by reason of the imminence of active service or of the recent existence of active service it is necessary for the public service that the forces in the Colony should be temporarily subject to the said Act as if they were on active service then on the publication in general orders of any such declaration the forces to which the declaration applies shall be deemed to be on active service for the period mentioned in the declaration so that the period mentioned in any one declaration do not exceed three months from the date thereof :

And Whereas by declaration made on the 5th day of August 1914 it was declared by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette Extraordinary* dated the 5th day of August 1914 to be necessary for the public service that His Majesty's forces in the Colony be subject to the said Act for the period of three months from the date thereof as if they were on active service :

And Whereas by Proclamations made on the 4th day of November, 1914, 3rd February, 30th April, 30th July, and 29th October, 1915, 2nd February, 2nd May, 28th July, and 27th October, 1916, 2nd February, 2nd May, 2nd August, and 2nd November, 1917, and 3rd February, 26th April, and 26th July, 1918, the said declaration was renewed for a period of three months from time to time :

And Whereas by a Proclamation made on the 25th day of October 1918 the said declaration was renewed for a period of three months from the 3rd day of November 1918 :

And Whereas the said period of three months will expire on the 3rd day of February 1919 Now therefore I, CLAUD SEVERN, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, the Officer Administering the Government of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies, being of opinion that the necessity of His Majesty's forces in the Colony being subject to the said Act continues do hereby declare that by reason of the imminence of active service it is necessary for the public service that His Majesty's forces in this Colony be subject to the said Act for the further period of three months from and after the 3rd day of February 1919.





By His Excellency CLAUD SEVERN, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Officer Administering the Government of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies :

Whereas by the Military Stores (Exportation) Ordinance, 1862, it is enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council by Proclamation to prohibit, for such period as should be mentioned in such Proclamation, either to be exported from the Colony of Hongkong, or to be carried coastwise within the said Colony (amongst other things) Arms, Ammunition, Gunpowder, and Military and Naval Stores, and any articles which the Governor may judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of Military or Naval Stores, or any or either of such Arms, Ammunition, Gunpowder, Stores, Goods or Articles respectively, subject to any permission that may be obtained under Section 3 of the Ordinance :

And whereas, by various Proclamations issued from time to time, such exportation and carriage coastwise were prohibited, and remain prohibited until the 27th day of May, 1919, and it is expedient to continue such prohibition :

Now, therefore, I, CLAUD SEVERN, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Officer Administering the Government of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of this Colony, do, by this Proclamation, prohibit for a further period of one year from and including the 28th day of May, 1919, either to be exported from the Colony of Hongkong, or to be carried coastwise within the said Colony, Arms, Ammunition, Gunpowder, Military and Naval Stores, Sulphur and Saltpetre, the last two being articles which I judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of Military or Naval Stores, or any or either of such Arms, Ammunition, Gunpowder, Stores, Goods or Articles respectively, unless this Proclamation shall, in the meantime, be revoked, or unless permission shall have been obtained under Section 4 of the Ordinance above mentioned.

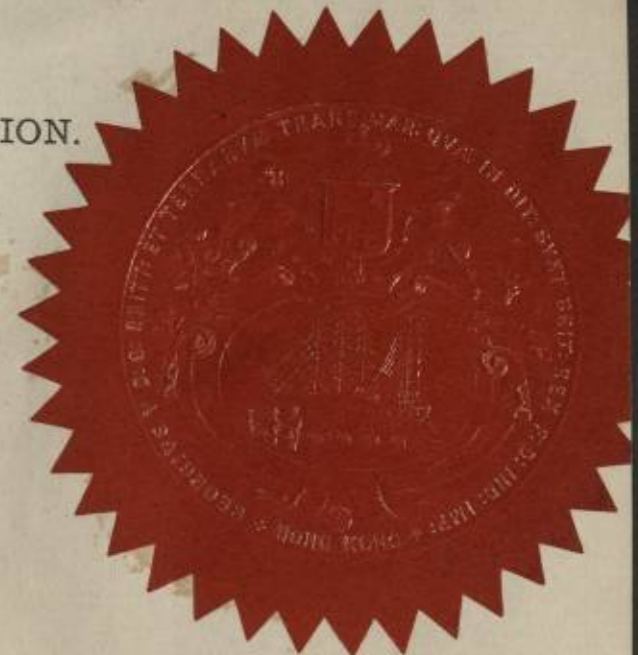

NOTE.—The Macao Extradition Ordinance, 1881, was evidently intended as a temporary measure pending the conclusion of the treaty between Great Britain and Portugal which was then under negotiation, and it seems probable that the unusual power of repeal given to the Governor in Council by section 19 of the Ordinance was intended to be used upon the conclusion of the treaty. This appears to have been overlooked when the treaty was concluded and brought into force in 1894. It is inconvenient to have a special set of rules for the single case of extradition to Macao, and the procedure of the Ordinance is also inferior in certain respects to the procedure of the general extradition law which will apply when the Ordinance is repealed. For example, there is no provision for the issue of any warrant of arrest before the receipt of a formal requisition. The Ordinance has therefore been repealed.

By His Excellency Sir REGINALD EDWARD STUBBS Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same.

Whereas by virtue of the provisions of the Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation Ordinances 1866 and 1914 the Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation (hereinafter called "the Corporation") is authorized from time to time to extend or increase its capital for the time being by the creation and sale of new shares so as the same is made with the consent of a General (Extraordinary) Meeting of the shareholders of the Corporation to be specially called for that purpose and with the consent previously obtained of the Governor and under such conditions and provisions as he may think fit, such consent being evidenced by a notification or proclamation to that effect under the hand of the Governor and published in the *Gazette*, and so as the total amount of the capital of the Corporation shall not exceed the sum of twenty millions of dollars: Provided that whenever and so often as any further capital is raised then a notification or proclamation to that effect under the hand of the Governor shall be published in the *Gazette* and the already existing capital together with such further capital shall thenceforth be taken to be the fixed capital of the Corporation, but with power nevertheless further to increase such capital from time to time as in such Ordinances is provided:

And whereas with the consent of the Officer then Administering the Government of Hongkong and its Dependencies dated the 15th June 1907 and published in the *Gazette* the capital of the Corporation was increased to the sum of fifteen millions of Dollars and a notification or proclamation to that effect under the hand of the said Officer then administering the Government dated the 20th June 1907 was duly published in the *Gazette*:

And whereas it having been duly intimated to me that the desire of the Shareholders of the Corporation was to increase further the capital of the Corporation to the total amount of twenty millions of dollars by the creation and sale of new shares in accordance with the Deed of Settlement of the Corporation and subject to the provisions of the Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation Ordinances 1866 and 1914 and to have the previous consent of the Governor thereto I on the 27th day of May 1921 in writing did signify my consent to the proposed creation of additional capital of the Corporation subject to the provisions of the said Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation Ordinances 1866 and 1914 to the extent of Five millions of dollars:

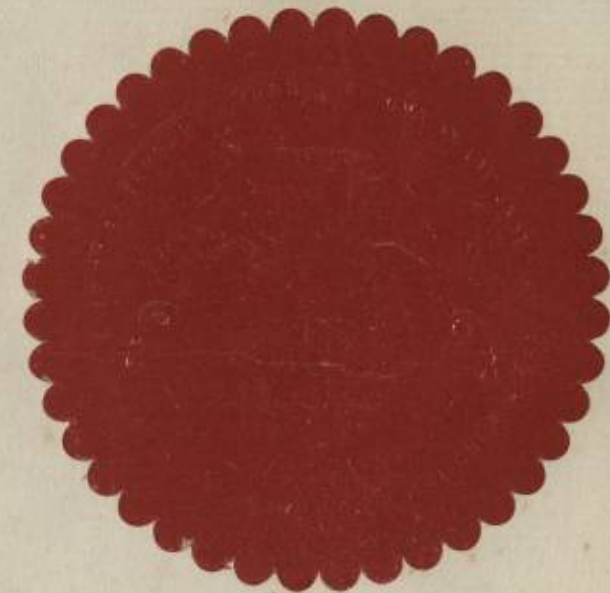
