PROVISIONAL TRADE FIGURES FOR NOVEMBER

\* \* \* \* \*

THE VALUE OF HONG KONG'S TOTAL EXPORTS FOR NOVEMBER WAS \$7 339 MILLION, MADE UP OF DOMESTIC EXPORTS OF \$5 337 MILLION AND RE-EXPORTS OF \$2 002 MILLION, ACCORDING TO PROVISIONAL EXTERNAL MERCHANDISE TRADE FIGURES FOR NOVEMBER RELEASED BY THE CENSUS AND STATISTICS DEPARTMENT TODAY (FRIDAY).

WITH IMPORTS AT \$8 232 MILLION, THE VISIBLE TRADE DEFICIT FOR NOVEMBER WAS \$893 MILLION.

FOR THE FIRST 11 MONTHS OF THIS YEAR, TOTAL EXPORTS WERE VALUED AT \$68 465 MILLION MADE UP OF DOMESTIC EXPORTS OF \$50 332 MILLION AND RE-EXPORTS OF \$18 133 MILLION AND IMPORTS AT \$77 540 MILLION, GIVING A TOTAL VISIBLE TRADE DEFICIT OF \$9 075 MILLION.

COMMENTING ON THESE FIGURES, A GOVERNMENT SPOKESMAN SAID THAT THE VISIBLE TRADE ACCOUNT HAD CONTINUED TO IMPROVE.

FIRST, TOTAL EXPORTS CONTINUED TO GROW FASTER THAN IMPORTS. FOR THE FIRST 11 MONTHS OF THE YEAR, THE VALUE OF TOTAL EXPORTS WAS 42 PER CENT HIGHER THAN IN THE CORRESPONDING PERIOD IN 1978, COMPARED WITH 38 PER CENT FOR THE VALUE OF IMPORTS.

THE VALUE OF DOMESTIC EXPORTS WAS 38 PER CENT HIGHER AND THE VALUE OF RE-EXPORTS 52 PER CENT HIGHER.

FOR NOVEMBER 1979, THE VALUE OF TOTAL EXPORTS WAS 42 PER CENT HIGHER THAN IN NOVEMBER 1978, COMPARED WITH ONLY 28 PER CENT FOR THE VALUE OF IMPORTS. THE VALUE OF DOMESTIC EXPORTS WAS 41 PER CENT HIGHER AND THE VALUE OF RE-EXPORTS 45 PER CENT HIGHER.

SECONDLY, THE SPOKESMAN SAID, ALTHOUGH THE VISIBLE TRADE DEFICIT FOR THE FIRST 11 MONTHS OF THIS YEAR, AT \$9 075 MILLION, WAS \$1 228 MILLION LARGER THAN FOR THE CORRESPONDING PERIOD OF LAST YEAR, THE VISIBLE TRADE GAP, THAT IS THE EXTENT TO WHICH IMPORTS WERE NOT PAID FOR BY EXPORTS, WAS ON A NARROWING TREND. THE GAP NARROWED FROM 14 PER CENT IN THE FIRST 11 MONTHS OF 1978 TO LESS THAN 12 PER CENT IN THE SAME PERIOD THIS YEAR. FOR NOVEMBER 1979, THE VISIBLE TRADE DEFICIT, AT \$893 MILLION, WAS ACTUALLY \$347 MILLION LESS THAN IN NOVEMBER 1978.

THIRDLY, ALTHOUGH DETAILED FIGURES FOR NOVEMBER WERE NOT YET AVAILABLE, THOSE UP TO OCTOBER, WHICH WERE RELEASED ON DECEMBER 16, INDICATED THAT THE RECENT GROWTH IN IMPORTS WAS ATTRIBUTABLE MAINLY TO RAPID INCREASES IN IMPORTS OF RAW MATERIALS, SEMI-MANUFACTURES AND CAPITAL GOODS, RATHER THAN OF CONSUMER GOODS. THE DETAILED FIGURES FOR NOVEMBER WILL BE ANALYSED JUST AS SOON AS THEY ARE READY, IN ABOUT THREE WEEKS' TIME.

/THE GOVERNMENT .....

THE GOVERNMENT SPOKESMAN SAID THAT THESE DEVELOPMENTS INDICATED THAT THE ECONOMY APPEARED TO BE ON A SATISFACTORY COURSE, WITH DOMESTIC DEMAND SLOWING DOWN, THUS ALLOWING MORE RESOURCES TO BE MADE AVAILABLE FOR THE EXPORT SECTOR.

**BILL TO PROTECT MARINE FISH CULTURE FARMERS GAZETTED  
\* \* \* \* \***

MARINE FISH CULTURE FARMERS MAY SOON HAVE THEIR INDUSTRY LEGALLY PROTECTED IF A NEW BILL IS PASSED THROUGH THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL NEXT MONTH.

THE GOVERNMENT GAZETTE TODAY (FRIDAY) CONTAINS DETAILS OF THE PROPOSED MARINE FISH CULTURE BILL 1980 WHICH WILL BE PRESENTED TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ON WEDNESDAY (JANUARY 2) FOR ITS SECOND READING BY THE DIRECTOR OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES, MR. TED NICHOLS.

THE MAIN OBJECT OF THE BILL IS TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION AND PROTECTION OF THE CULTURE OF MARINE FISH MAINTAINED IN CAPTIVITY IN LOCAL WATERS.

MARINE FISH CULTURE -- MORE COMMONLY KNOWN AS MARICULTURE -- IS THE FEEDING OF FISH FRY IN IMPOUNDMENTS BY ENCLOSING PORTIONS OF THE SEA BY ARTIFICIAL BARRIERS OR IN CAGES SUSPENDED FROM RAFTS UNTIL THEY REACH MATURITY FOR SALE. AT PRESENT THERE ARE 62 MARICULTURE AREAS IN HONG KONG.

ENACTMENT OF THE BILL WILL MEAN DESIGNATING CERTAIN ZONES WHERE MARICULTURE MAY BE ENGAGED AND IT WILL ALSO ENSURE THAT MARICULTURISTS REQUIRE A LICENCE TO TAKE PART IN THE INDUSTRY.

PROVISIONS OF THE BILL WILL MAKE IT AN OFFENCE TO DEPOSIT ANY INJURIOUS SUBSTANCE IN OR NEAR FISH CULTURE ZONES- TO INTERFERE WITH RAFTS OR IMPOUNDMENTS- AND TO UNLAWFULLY ENTER ANY VESSEL OR UNLAWFULLY KEEP ANY RAFTS IN THE DESIGNATED ZONES.

A SPOKESMAN FOR THE AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES DEPARTMENT SAID THE PROPOSALS PRESERVED THE APPLICATION OF THE SHIPPING AND PORT CONTROL ORDINANCE.

AND HE ADDED THAT IMPLEMENTATION OF THE BILL WOULD REQUIRE ADDITIONAL STAFF AND EQUIPMENT AT A CAPITAL COST OF ABOUT \$3.5 MILLION AND ANNUAL RECURRENT EXPENDITURE WOULD BE ABOUT \$1 MILLION. ANNUAL REVENUE DERIVED FROM THE ISSUE OF LICENCES WOULD BE ABOUT \$400 000.

HK NO STRANGER TO PROBLEMS SAYS SNT

THE SECRETARY FOR THE NEW TERRITORIES, MR. DAVID AKERS-JONES, SAID TODAY (FRIDAY) THAT EACH OF THE LAST 30 YEARS HAD CARRIED ITS OWN PROBLEMS, AND, AS WE LOOKED INTO THE YEARS AHEAD, WE COULD SEE MUCH DOUBT AND UNCERTAINTY.

HE SAID: +THE EIGHTIES WILL CERTAINLY PRESENT A PERIOD OF CHANGE AND ADJUSTMENT, BUT WE IN HONG KONG ARE NO STRANGER TO PROBLEMS.

+LOOKING BACKWARD AT ALL THE OBSTACLES THAT HAVE BEEN SURMOUNTED, WE CAN BE REASSURED THAT WE HAVE THE STRENGTH AND ABILITY, THE RESILIENCE AND THE FLEXIBILITY TO FACE THE FUTURE WITH CONFIDENCE.+

MR. AKERS-JONES SAID THIS WHEN HE SPOKE TO LEADING LOCAL INDUSTRIALISTS AND BUSINESSMEN AT A RECEPTION MARKING THE 30TH ANNIVERSARY OF CHINA DYEING WORKS LIMITED.

+WHO WOULD HAVE CARED TO GUARANTEE THAT, WHEN WE BEGAN FILLING IN THE BAY OF TSUEN WAN IN 1958, IT WOULD HAVE GROWN TODAY TO BE A TOWN OF HALF A MILLION PEOPLE?+ MR. AKERS-JONES ASKED.

+WHO WOULD HAVE PLACED A BET ON THE ABILITY OF OUR TEXTILE INDUSTRY TO SURVIVE THE PRESSURES OF 20 YEARS OF COMPETITION AND RESTRICTION?+

AND YET, HE SAID, WE HAD SUCCEEDED. TSUEN WAN HAD GROWN INTO A BUSTLING, THRIVING INDUSTRIAL TOWN, AND OUR TEXTILE INDUSTRY HAD SURVIVED AND PROSPERED BEYOND ALL BELIEF.

CHINA DYEING WORKS FIRST STARTED AS A SMALL FACTORY IN TSUEN WAN 30 YEARS AGO AND, THROUGH RESEARCH, EXPERIMENT, DIVERSIFICATION AND STEADY PERSEVERANCE, HAS DEVELOPED INTO ONE OF THE TOP DYEING PLANTS IN HONG KONG. MR. AKERS-JONES DESCRIBED THE COMPANY'S ACHIEVEMENTS AS +SYMBOLIC OF THE GROWTH OF HONG KONG OVER THIS PERIOD.+

HE NOTED THAT THE COMPANY'S CHAIRMAN, MR. CHA CHI-MING, WAS ONE OF THE FIVE FOUNDERS OF THE YAN CHAI HOSPITAL IN 1959.

THEREFORE, HE SAID, THIS ANNIVERSARY WAS IMPORTANT FOR MANY REASONS.

+FOR THE COMPANY IT MARKS 30 YEARS OF REMARKABLE ACHIEVEMENT- IT DEMONSTRATES THE ABILITY OF OUR INDUSTRY TO ADAPT AND INNOVATE- IT EMPHASISES THE PRAGMATISM AND ENERGY OF OUR PEOPLE- AND IT REMINDS US, IN A SOCIETY WHERE WE HAVE TO CONCENTRATE SO MUCH ON MATERIAL PROBLEMS, OF THE NEED TO SHOW CARE AND CONCERN FOR THE SICK, THE HANDICAPPED AND THE ELDERLY,+ MR. AKERS-JONES SAID.

#### PRELIMINARY 1980 EXPORT QUOTAS ISSUED

THE DIRECTOR OF TRADE, MR. PETER TSAO, SAID TODAY (FRIDAY) THAT THE PRELIMINARY 1980 QUOTAS HAVE BEEN ISSUED FOR THE USA, EEC AND CANADA TO COMPANIES WHICH QUALIFIED FOR THEM UNDER THE USUAL RULES.

MR. TSAO CONFIRMED THAT FINAL QUOTAS WILL BE ISSUED AS SOON AS SHIPMENTS MADE IN 1979 ARE VERIFIED. THIS IS EXPECTED TO TAKE PLACE NEXT MARCH OR APRIL.

FOLLOWING THE FINAL ALLOCATIONS OF QUOTAS, THE TRADE, INDUSTRY AND CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT WILL IMPLEMENT THE USUAL FREE QUOTAS SCHEMES TO DISPOSE OF THE UNALLOCATED BALANCE.

THIS BALANCE, MR. TSAO EXPLAINED, WILL BE CALCULATED ON THE BASIS OF THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE 1980 QUOTAS AS SET OUT IN THE TEXTILE AGREEMENTS, AND THE QUOTAS ISSUED UP TO THE TIME OF THE FINAL ALLOCATION.

THE TRADE, INDUSTRY AND CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT REMINDS IMPORTERS AND EXPORTERS THAT A NUMBER OF AMENDMENTS HAVE BEEN MADE TO THE CLASSIFICATIONS OF COUNTRIES/TERRITORIES AND COMMODITIES CONTAINED IN THE HONG KONG IMPORTS AND EXPORTS CLASSIFICATION LIST, REVISED EDITION, JANUARY 1978.

THESE AMENDMENTS WERE CONTAINED IN SPECIAL SUPPLEMENT NO. 4 OF THE GOVERNMENT GAZETTE PUBLISHED TODAY (FRIDAY) AND WILL COME INTO FORCE ON JANUARY 1, 1980.

COPIES OF THE AMENDMENT NOTICE MAY BE OBTAINED ON REQUEST, FREE OF CHARGE, FROM THE GOVERNMENT PUBLICATION CENTRE ON THE GROUND FLOOR OF THE GENERAL POST OFFICE BUILDING, CONNAUGHT PLACE.

MORE CARGO HANDLING FACILITIES IN TSUEN WAN

THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT IS TO PROVIDE MORE CARGO-HANDLING FACILITIES IN THE RAMBLER CHANNEL TYPHOON SHELTER IN TSUEN WAN.

THE WORK, TENDERS FOR WHICH WERE INVITED TODAY, FORMS THE SECOND STAGE OF THE PROJECT TO TRANSFORM THE ENTIRE EASTERN SHORELINE OF THE TYPHOON SHELTER INTO A CARGO HANDLING AREA.

A PWD SPOKESMAN SAID THAT WORK ON STAGE ONE OF THE PROJECT, WHICH WAS COMPLETED RECENTLY, INCLUDED THE CONSTRUCTION OF A 530-METRE SEAWALL AND THE RECLAMATION OF ABOUT 1.5 HECTARES OF LAND BEHIND IT.

HE ADDED THAT WORK ON THE SECOND STAGE WOULD INVOLVE THE EXTENSION OF THIS SEAWALL BY 380 METRES, BRINGING THE TOTAL LENGTH OF THE SEAWALL TO 910 METRES.

THE AREA BEHIND THE EXTENSION OF THE SEAWALL WOULD ALSO BE RECLAIMED.

WORK ON THE CONTRACT WILL START IN MARCH NEXT YEAR AND WILL TAKE ABOUT 21 MONTHS TO COMPLETE.

THE WORK HAS BEEN DESIGNED AND CONSTRUCTION WILL BE SUPERVISED BY THE PORT WORKS DIVISION OF THE CIVIL ENGINEERING OFFICE ON BEHALF OF THE PWD'S TSUEN WAN NEW TOWN DEVELOPMENT OFFICE.
