

HONG KONG TOURIST ASSOCIATION RULES, 1958.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 20 of the Hong Kong Tourist Association Ordinance, 1957, The Hong Kong Tourist Association Board has, with the approval of the Governor in Council, made the following rules—

1. These rules may be cited as the Hong Kong Tourist Association Rules, 1958. Citation.

2. (1) Application for membership of the Association, other than *ex-officio* membership, shall be made on the forms authorized by the Board. Applica-

(2) An application for membership by a recognized travel agent shall be accompanied by a certificate from an international passenger carrier to the effect that the applicant is the agent for such carrier.

3. The fees payable annually for membership of the Association shall be— Fees.

Associate Member—\$250

4. (1) Notice of each meeting of the Association shall be given to every member thereof at least seven clear days before such meeting. Accidental omission to give such notice to any member shall not affect the validity of the meeting. Notice of
Meetings.

(2) A letter containing such notice posted pre-paid to the address contained in the member's application form shall be a sufficient service of the notice.

5. At meetings of the Association the Chairman shall be the Chairman of the Board or his nominee. The Chairman shall have an original vote and also, if the votes be equal, a casting vote. Chairman
of Meetings.

6. (1) At any meeting of the Association ten Ordinary or *ex-officio* Members of the Association shall constitute a quorum. Quorum at
Meetings.

(2) In the event of there being no quorum at a meeting, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place, or to such other day, time and place as the Chairman may by notice to the members appoint. At such adjourned meeting, the Chairman and two Ordinary or *ex-officio* Members may transact the business for which the meeting was called.

- (a) undertake to further at all times the objects of the Association as set out in section 4 of the Ordinance;

- (d) inform the Board in writing of any changes in the Directors of the member company or the partners of the member partnership or the principal officers of the member association as the case may be.

FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL UNDERTAKINGS ORDINANCE, 1955.

(No. 34 of 1955).

FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL UNDERTAKINGS (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS, 1958.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Factories and Industrial Undertakings Ordinance, 1955, the Commissioner of Labour has made the following regulations—

1. These regulations may be cited as the Factories and Industrial Undertakings (Amendment) Regulations, 1958, and shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1959.

2. Regulation 2 of the Factories and Industrial Undertakings Regulations, 1955 (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations) is amended—

(a) by the insertion after the definition of the expression "mill-gearing" of the following new definition—

" "period of employment" means the period (inclusive of the time allowed for meals and rest) within which persons may be employed on any day;";

(b) by the substitution of a semicolon for the full stop at the end thereof;

(c) by the insertion after the definition of the expression "tenement factory" of the following new definitions—

" "week" means the period between midnight on Saturday night and midnight on the succeeding Saturday night;

"woman" means a woman who has attained the age of eighteen years;

"working hours" means the time during which persons employed are at the disposal of the employer, exclusive of any intervals allowed for rest and meals; and "hours worked" has a corresponding meaning."

Addition of new regulation 2A.

3. The principal regulations are amended by the insertion after regulation 2 of the following new regulation—

“Applica-
tion of

8 to 10D.

2A. (1) Regulations 8 to 10D inclusive shall not apply to women or young persons employed in any industrial undertaking in a clerical or managerial capacity or in any health or welfare service connected with such industrial undertaking.

(2) A woman or young person who is employed in any industrial undertaking either in a process or in cleaning any part of the premises used for any process, or in cleaning or oiling any part of the machinery or plant or in any other kind of work whatsoever incidental to or connected with the process, or connected with the article made or otherwise the subject of the process therein, shall, save as may otherwise be provided by these regulations, be deemed to be employed therein for the purposes of regulations 8 to 10D inclusive or of any proceedings thereunder :

Provided that any woman or young person employed—

- (a) solely in cleaning the premises or any part thereof of such industrial undertaking, otherwise than in cleaning which is incidental to or connected with any process; or
- (b) solely as a caretaker in such premises,

shall not be deemed for the purposes of regulations 8 to 10D inclusive to be employed in such undertaking.”.

Rescission and replacement of regulations 6 to 10 inclusive.

4. Regulations 6 to 10 inclusive of the principal regulations are rescinded and replaced by the following—

“Carrying of weights by women and young persons.

6. No woman or young person employed in any industrial undertaking shall be permitted to carry any load which is unreasonably heavy having regard to the age and physical development of such woman or young person; and in the case of a young person under the age of sixteen years, such load shall not in any event exceed thirty cattles in weight.

Facilities for resting.

7. In any industrial undertaking in which women or young persons are employed, the proprietor thereof shall provide (if practicable, having regard to the layout of the premises in question) and maintain for the use of all such women and young persons, whose work is done standing, suitable facilities for sitting sufficient to enable them to take advantage of any opportunities for resting which may occur in the course of their employment.

General conditions as to hours of employment of women and young persons.

8. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Part, no proprietor shall employ any woman or young person in any industrial undertaking unless the working hours, the period of employment and the intervals for meals and rest for such woman or young person conform to the following conditions, namely—

- (a) the total hours worked shall—
 - (i) in the case of any young person under the age of sixteen, neither exceed eight in any day nor exceed forty eight in any week; or
 - (ii) in any other case, neither exceed ten in any day nor exceed sixty in any week;
- (b) the period of employment shall—
 - (i) in the case of any young person under the age of sixteen, not exceed nine hours in any day and shall neither begin earlier than six o'clock in the morning nor end later than seven o'clock in the evening; and
 - (ii) in any other case, not exceed twelve hours in any day and shall neither begin earlier than six o'clock in the morning nor end later than eight o'clock in the evening;
- (c) no woman or young person shall be required or permitted to work continuously for a spell of more than five hours without thereafter an interval of not less than half an hour for a meal or rest :

Provided that in the case of any young person under the age of sixteen years such interval shall not be less than one hour;

- (d) except with the permission in writing of the Commissioner, the period of employment and the intervals allowed for meals and rest in accordance with the provisions of this regulation shall be the same for all women and young persons employed in such industrial undertaking, except in the case of young persons who have not attained the age of sixteen years;
- (e) no woman or young person shall be required or permitted to work during any such interval allowed for meals or rest.

(2) For the purposes of this regulation, employment shall be deemed to be continuous unless interrupted by an interval of at least half an hour, or, in the case of young persons under the age of sixteen, one hour.

Notice fixing hours of employment.

9. (1) No proprietor shall employ in any industrial undertaking any woman or young person unless there is conspicuously posted at a place conveniently accessible to the employees employed in such industrial undertaking a notice fixing within the limits prescribed in regulation 8 and in the case of shift work, regulation 10A—

- (a) the period of employment for each day of the week for women or young persons employed in the undertaking;
- (b) the intervals allowed for meals or rest to such women or young persons; and
- (c) the day of the week, in accordance with regulation 10C, upon which women and young persons shall not be employed; and, in cases where such day is allocated in rotation, specifying the scheme of rotation.

(2) Different periods of employment and different intervals for meals or rest may be fixed for different days of the week.

(3) No proprietor shall change, or cause or permit to be changed, any period of employment or any interval for meals or rest fixed by notice under paragraph (1) until there has been served in writing on the Commissioner and posted at the place referred to in such paragraph (1), a notice of intention to make the change, and no such change shall be made more often than once in every three months, unless for special cause allowed in writing by the Commissioner.

(4) A copy signed by the proprietor of the industrial undertaking or by his duly authorized agent of any notice posted under paragraph (1) shall be sent not later than the day of posting to the Commissioner.

Overtime employment of women and young persons over sixteen.

10. (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of this Part relating to hours of work and periods of employment, pressure of work in any industrial undertaking may be dealt with by the overtime employment of women and young persons who have attained the age of sixteen years :

Provided that the overtime for the undertaking shall not exceed in the aggregate, calculated in accordance with the provisions of sub-paragraph (c) of paragraph (10), one hundred hours in any year or six hours in any week and shall not take place in the undertaking in more than twenty five weeks in any year.

(2) The overtime employment of a woman or young person shall be subject to the following conditions—

- (a) the total hours worked by the woman or young person shall not exceed eleven in any day; and
- (b) the period of employment for the woman or young person shall not exceed thirteen hours in any day and shall not extend outside the hours specified in regulation 8 for the beginning and ending of the period of employment except that it may extend to nine o'clock in the evening.

(3) Before employing in any industrial undertaking any woman or young person in overtime on any day, the proprietor thereof shall—

- (a) cause a notice containing particulars of the hours of work and the intervals for meals or rest applicable to those women or young persons to be employed overtime to be kept conspicuously posted at a place conveniently accessible to such women or young persons in the industrial undertaking until completion of such overtime; and
- (b) if any part of the overtime to be worked will be in excess of the working hours specified in sub-paragraph (a) of paragraph (1) of regulation 8, or either earlier or later, as the case may be, than the hours prescribed for the beginning and ending of the period of employment specified in sub-paragraph (b) of that paragraph, send to the Commissioner and enter in a register to be kept by the proprietor for such purpose, particulars of such overtime employment including particulars of any interval for a meal or rest allowed under paragraph (4).

(4) Where in any industrial undertaking a proprietor allows any women or young persons who are to be employed overtime on any day an interval for a meal or rest in addition to any interval fixed for the day by a notice posted under regulation 9, he may employ during that interval any women or young persons who are not to be employed overtime on that day, but save as aforesaid the provisions of these regulations relating to continuous employment and intervals for meals or rest shall apply to overtime employment in like manner as they apply to other employment.

(5) If the Commissioner is satisfied that overtime employment in any industrial undertaking of women or young persons, in accordance with the provisions of this regulation, in any process will prejudicially affect

the health of such women or young persons, or any class of them, he may by notice in writing served upon the proprietor thereof either prohibit the overtime employment in that process of such women or young persons, or such class of them, or make such further restrictions as to the amount of such overtime employment or otherwise as he thinks fit.

(6) Where the Commissioner is satisfied that work in any class or description of industrial undertaking is subject to seasonal or other special pressure, he may by order published in the *Gazette* as respects any class or description of undertaking—

- (a) increase for women or young persons, employed in any specified process, during any period of such pressure, the hours of work and the period of employment allowed in a day under this regulation, so, however, that the increase shall only take place in such number of weeks, not exceeding eight in any year, as may be specified in the order;
- (b) increase the hours of overtime employment allowed for an industrial undertaking under this regulation in a year to an aggregate not exceeding one hundred and fifty hours.

(7) The Commissioner may authorize in writing the increase of the aggregate number of hours of overtime employment allowed for an industrial undertaking under this regulation in any week or the number of weeks in any year in which overtime can take place as respects any particular undertaking, if he is satisfied that the increase is necessary by reason of unforeseen pressure of work due to sudden orders, or by reason of a breakdown of machinery or plant or other unforeseen emergency.

(8) For the purposes of this regulation, the employment of women or young persons in different parts of any industrial undertaking or the employment of different sets of women or young persons in different processes may, with the authority in writing of the

Commissioner and subject to such conditions as he may by such authorization prescribe, be treated, for the purposes of reckoning hours of overtime employment or the number of weeks in which overtime employment can take place, as if it were employment in different undertakings.

(9) If the Commissioner is satisfied that the nature of the business carried on in any industrial undertaking involves the overtime employment of different women or young persons on different occasions to such an extent that the provisions of this regulation limiting overtime employment by reference to the industrial undertaking would be unreasonable or inappropriate, he may grant permission in writing that such undertaking may, in lieu of complying with the said provisions, comply with such provisions limiting overtime employment by reference to the individual as may be specified in such consent :

Provided that—

- (a) no woman or young person shall be employed overtime in such undertaking for more than one hundred hours in any year; and
 - (b) no woman or young person shall be employed overtime in such undertaking for more than six hours in any week or for more than twenty five weeks in any year.
- (10) For the purposes of this regulation—
- (a) the expression “overtime employment” means, in relation to any woman or young person, any period during which that woman or young person is at work in the industrial undertaking outside the period of employment fixed for the day for that woman or young person by a notice under regulation 9;
 - (b) in calculating the hours of overtime employment, any fraction of an hour less than half an hour shall be treated as half an hour and any fraction of an hour greater than half an hour shall be treated as an hour; and

- (c) in reckoning the aggregate hours of overtime employment or the number of weeks in which overtime employment can take place, account shall only be taken of any period during which any woman or young person is employed in that industrial undertaking beyond the maximum hours prescribed in sub-paragraph (a) of paragraph (1) of regulation 8 or either earlier or later, as the case may be, than the hours prescribed for the beginning and ending of the period of employment specified in sub-paragraph (b) of that paragraph.

Employment on shift work.

10A. (1) Where in any industrial undertaking women or young persons over the age of sixteen are employed on a scheme of shift work, the provisions of regulation 8 may, subject to the provisions of this regulation and to the prior approval in writing of such scheme by the Commissioner, be read as though eleven o'clock in the evening were substituted for eight o'clock in the evening.

(2) No proprietor of any industrial undertaking shall employ any woman or young person on any scheme of shift work involving work between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and eleven o'clock in the evening, unless the following conditions are complied with, namely—

- (a) such shift work is carried on only in a building approved in writing by the Commissioner;
- (b) a suitable room in which no industrial process is carried on is provided and equipped for use as a dining and rest room;
- (c) the scheme provides for rotating shifts;
- (d) no period of employment under the scheme exceeds eight hours in any period of twenty four hours for any woman or young person :
Provided that for the purpose of rotating shifts the period of employment on any day may be extended to twelve hours;
- (e) every woman or young person employed on such shift work is allocated by the employer a serial number;

(f) there is at all times maintained at the place of employment—

(i) an accurate register containing the name, serial number and photograph of every woman or young person employed for the time being on such scheme of shift work; and

(ii) an accurate register containing the name and serial number of every woman or young person employed for the time being on each shift of such scheme.

Prohibition of use of rooms during intervals.

10B. Except with the permission in writing of the Commissioner no woman or young person employed in any industrial undertaking shall be required or permitted to remain during any part of any interval required under regulation 8 to be allowed to such woman or young person for meals or rest in any room or enclosed compartment in which any industrial process is then being carried on.

Rest days.

10C. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Part, no proprietor of any industrial undertaking shall employ therein any woman or young person on more than six days in any week.

Register of women or young persons employed.

10D. The proprietor of every industrial undertaking in which women or young persons are employed shall maintain or cause to be maintained a register of all such women or young persons for the time being employed in such undertaking.

Form of notices and registers.

10E. For the purposes of regulations 9, 10, 10A and 10D, the Commissioner may prescribe by notification in the *Gazette* the form in which notices must be given or registers kept.

Transitional provisions.

10F. Until and including the 30th day of June, 1959, the Commissioner may for any industrial undertaking, on application and subject to such conditions or restrictions as he may think fit to impose, extend—

(a) the maximum working hours permitted under sub-paragraph (a)(ii) of paragraph (1) of regulation 8 to eleven hours in any day and sixty six hours in any week; and

(b) the maximum period of employment in any day permitted under sub-paragraph (b)(ii) of such paragraph (1) to thirteen hours.”.

5. Part V of the principal regulations is rescinded and the following substituted therefor—

Rescission and replacement of Part V.

“PART V.

OFFENCES AND PENALTIES.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 3, 4 or 5.

37. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of regulation 3, 4 or 5 shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of five thousand dollars.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 15(4), 16 or 26(2) or an order made under regulation 25(1).

38. Any person who—

- (a) contravenes any of the provisions of regulation 15(4), 16 or 26(2); or
- (b) contravenes any of the provisions of any order made under regulation 25(1),

shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of one thousand dollars.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 8(1), 9, 10, 10C, 14(2), 18, 19, 20, 22, 23, 25(2), 26(1), 28(3), 30 or 33(1).

39. The proprietor of any industrial undertaking—

- (a) who contravenes any of the provisions of regulation 14(2), 25(2), 26(1) or 28(3);
- (b) in which any person is permitted to do anything in contravention of any of the provisions of regulation 20; or
- (c) in respect of which any of the provisions of regulation 8(1), 9, 10, 10C, 18, 19, 22, 23, 30 or 33(1) are contravened,

shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of five thousand dollars.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 7, 10A(2), 10B, 10D, 21, 27, 31, 34(1), 35 or 36.

40. The proprietor of any industrial undertaking—

- (a) who contravenes any of the provisions of regulation 7 or 10D; or
- (b) in respect of which any of the provisions of regulation 10A(2), 10B, 21, 27, 31, 34(1), 35 or 36 are contravened,

shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of two thousand dollars.

Penalty for contravention of regulation 6, 11, 12, 24, 29, 32(1) or 33(3).

- 41. The proprietor of any industrial undertaking—
 - (a) in which any person is permitted to do anything in contravention of any of the provisions of regulation 6;
 - (b) in respect of which any of the provisions of regulation 24, 29, 32(1) or 33(3) are contravened; or
 - (c) in which an accident or dangerous occurrence occurs and is not reported or notice in writing of the death of any person resulting from such accident is not given in contravention of any of the provisions of regulation 11 or 12,

shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of one thousand dollars.

Liability of proprietors.

42. Notwithstanding anything contained in section 10 of the Ordinance, the proprietor of an industrial undertaking in or in respect of which an offence against regulation 15(4) or 16 is committed shall not be guilty of a like offence."

Explanatory Note.

(This Note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general purport).

The purpose of these regulations is to bring the Factories and Industrial Undertakings Regulations, 1955, so far as they relate to the hours of work and employment in industrial undertakings of women and young persons, more closely into line with the corresponding accepted international practice. Subject to necessary adaptation, these new regulations, where relevant, follow closely, subject to one exception which will be explained later, the corresponding provisions of the United Kingdom Factories Act, 1937, except that the permissible periods of employment and working hours prescribed are longer in the aggregate.

2. These regulations draw a distinction between the period of employment and the actual hours worked. The "period of employment" is defined as a "period (inclusive of the time allowed for meals and rest) in which persons may be employed on any day", and "working hours" is defined as "the time during which persons employed are at the disposal of the employer, exclusive of any intervals allowed for rest and meals." That distinction is important to the scheme in general.

3. Regulation 8 prescribes the general conditions as to hours of employment of women and young persons and its practical effect, excluding overtime and shift work, will be as follows: Under the old regulations the maximum legal period of employment per day was the same as the maximum legal number of hours which could be worked per day, namely, thirteen hours, because no distinction was made between the two conceptions, as the main purpose of those regulations was to prohibit night work for women and young persons. The new regulations will reduce the maximum legal period of employment per day to twelve hours and the maximum legal number of hours which may be worked per day to ten hours. Similarly, under the old regulations, the maximum legal period of employment in any week was the same as the maximum legal number of hours which could be worked in any week, namely 91, but these regulations will reduce the maximum legal period of employment in any week to 72 hours and the maximum legal number of hours which may be worked in any week to 60 hours. The reduction in the case of the maximum period of employment per week and the maximum number of hours of work per week respectively takes into account the new regulation 10C which prohibits the employment of any woman or young person for more than six days in any week. The provision requiring one rest day per week existed under the old regulation 6(c) but only in respect of young persons under the age of sixteen years.

4. As regards overtime, the old regulations made no provision to control overtime as such, except in the case of young persons under the age of sixteen who, by regulation 6(b), were not permitted to work more than nine hours a day. A woman or young person could work any period between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. and on not more than sixty days in any year, with the consent of the Commissioner, up till 9 p.m.; and, if work were done in eight hours shifts, with the consent of the Commissioner, the first shift could begin as early as 6 a.m. and the second shift end as late as 10 p.m. What was regarded as overtime work was a matter for agreement between the employer and the worker, for within the working hours stated above no limits were set. The new regulation 10 makes detailed provision relating to overtime work and draws a distinction between the overtime working of an industrial undertaking as a whole and the overtime working of the individual workers engaged therein. The new regulation 9 requires the proprietor of every industrial undertaking in which women and young persons are employed to post in the undertaking a notice stating the period of employment for each day of the week and the intervals allowed for

meals and rest and also the weekly rest day set aside under regulation 10C. Overtime employment is any time during which a woman or young person is employed in the undertaking outside the period of employment fixed for the day by that notice, but the amount of overtime employment permissible, as far as these regulations are concerned, for either the undertaking as a whole or for the individual worker is related only to such time as falls outside the limits prescribed in regulation 8 for the general condition as to hours of employment, so far as that regulation relates to women or young persons over the age of sixteen, namely, to employment in excess of ten hours a day or sixty hours a week or commencing before 6 a.m. or ending later than 8 p.m. Persons under sixteen are not permitted to work overtime at all. This method of calculating the amount of permissible overtime differs from that contained in the Factories Act, 1937, which relates the amount of permissible overtime to the period of employment posted in the factory. The reason for departing from the United Kingdom precedent in this respect is to avoid the need for a practice, existing in the United Kingdom, of posting a notice specifying the maximum legal period of employment for each day while, for the purposes of wage agreements with the workers, working a much shorter period of employment in fact. The reason for this practice is that only thereby can either the factory or the worker work overtime to the full legal limits and at the same time the worker enjoy a short week for the purpose of basic wage rates. The amount of overtime employment under these regulations, calculated in the manner prescribed therein, may not exceed, in the case of the undertaking, one hundred hours in any year or six hours in any week, nor may it take place in more than twenty five weeks in any year. The working of overtime by the undertaking is also subject to the condition that no woman or young person shall be allowed actually to work for more than a total of eleven hours in any day, *e.g.* one hour longer than the normal maximum prescribed under regulation 8, or be employed for more than thirteen hours in any day, *e.g.* one hour longer than the normal maximum period of employment prescribed by that regulation, or later than 9 p.m., *e.g.* one hour later than the normal latest time prescribed by that regulation. For the purpose of meeting seasonal or exceptional pressure of work the Commissioner is empowered by regulation 10(6) to authorize undertakings engaged in particular trades to work overtime up to one hundred and fifty hours a year, and, complementary to this permitted extension, individual workers engaged in those undertakings may exceed the maximum prescribed working hours per day and per week provided that the extra overtime does not take place in more than eight weeks in any year. Even these limits may be extended by the Commissioner in the case of breakdown of machinery or unforeseen emergency arising in any particular undertaking. The working of overtime by reference to the individual worker is subject to the permission of the Commissioner and is alternative to the working of overtime by the undertaking as a whole. In other words the undertaking, according to the nature of the business carried on, must elect either to work against the overtime account of the undertaking or to work against the overtime account of the individual workers employed. Overtime, calculated in the manner prescribed, may be worked by reference to the individual up to a maximum of one hundred hours in any year subject to the conditions that the overtime employment shall not exceed six hours in a week or take place in more than twenty five weeks in a year, *e.g.* shall not exceed a sixty six hour week at all or a sixty hour week for more than twenty five weeks in a year, nor exceed eleven hours of work or thirteen hours of employment in any day. Where an undertaking elects to work overtime by reference to the individual, the Commissioner has no discretion to increase the overtime beyond the limits prescribed. For the purpose of control, whenever any undertaking intends to work overtime accountable under these regulations against either the undertaking as a whole or accountable by reference to the individual worker, regulation 10(3) requires the proprietor to send notice in advance to the Commissioner.

5. For the purpose of shift work, regulation 10A allows women and young persons, subject to the prior approval by the Commissioner of the shift scheme to be worked, to work up till 11 p.m. instead of 8 p.m. as prescribed by regulation 8, but on the other hand no period of employment for shift workers may exceed eight hours in twenty four hours except for the purpose of rotating the shifts, when one shift may be extended to twelve hours. Under the old regulation 9 shift work might continue only until 10 p.m. and no provision was made to facilitate rotation of shifts.

6. For transitional purposes, until 30th June, 1959, regulation 10F allows the Commissioner in particular cases to increase, exclusive of overtime, the maximum working hours permitted from ten to eleven hours a day and sixty six hours in any week and the maximum period of employment in any day from twelve to thirteen hours.

7. Under the old regulation 6, young persons under the age of sixteen were entitled to an interval of one hour for a meal or rest after five hours' continuous work, and, under the old regulation 9, women and young persons over the age of sixteen engaged for the purpose of shift work between the hours of 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. or 8 p.m. and 10 p.m. were entitled to an interval of half an hour after every four and a half hours' continuous work, but no provision was made for any interval at all in other cases. Under the new regulation 8, all women and young persons, irrespective of how they are engaged, must be allowed not less than half an hour's interval for a meal or rest after every five hours' employment and in the case of young persons under the age of sixteen the interval must not be less than one hour.

8. The new regulations 7 and 10B repeat the provisions contained in the old regulation 9 relating to the provision of suitable facilities for sitting sufficient to enable women and young persons to take advantage of opportunities for resting during work and also those requiring that during intervals for rest and meals women and young persons shall not be permitted to remain in rooms in which work is in progress. But whereas the old regulation 9 applied only to those women and young persons employed for the purposes of shift work between the hours of 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. or 8 p.m. and 10 p.m., the new regulations apply where women or young persons are employed without regard to the nature or hours of employment.

9. The new regulation 6 repeats without material alteration the provisions of the old regulation 7 restricting the carrying of heavy weights by women and young persons.

10. The new regulations 10D and 10E relate to registers and forms and are designed to facilitate inspection. Regulation 10D repeats the previous requirement for the keeping of a register of young persons but extends it to include women. Regulation 10E is new and enables the Commissioner to prescribe forms to be used for the purposes of regulations 9, 10, 10A and 10D.

11. Finally Part V of the principal regulations, which prescribes penalties for infringements generally, is rescinded and replaced. This has been done to facilitate the insertion of penalties covering infringement of the new regulations. The scale of penalties remains unchanged.

IMMIGRATION (CONTROL AND OFFENCES) REGULATIONS, 1958.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 42 of the Immigration (Control and Offences) Ordinance, 1958, the Governor in Council has made the following regulations—

1. These regulations may be cited as the Immigration Citation. (Control and Offences) Regulations, 1958.
2. The immigration examination signal shall—
 - (a) by day, be signal flags: H.N.N.; and
 - (b) by night, be four lights coloured WHITE, RED, WHITE, RED, in a vertical line one over the other equally spaced (not less than three feet apart) and visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

3. The places mentioned in Part I and Part II of the First Schedule shall be places where detention for the purposes of the Ordinance may be effected and shall—
 - (a) in the case of the places specified in Part I, be under the control of the Commissioner of Prisons; and

 - (b) an alien shall supply two photographs of himself of the dimensions commonly used for passports and of a quality that the Registrar of Aliens shall approve:

Provided that an alien staying in the Colony for less than forty-eight hours is exempted from the provisions of this paragraph.

- 8.** The fees in the Fourth Schedule are hereby prescribed for the respective documents therein enumerated:

Provided that in the case of visas granted to nationals of states which grant to citizens of the United Kingdom and Colonies visas at rates not equivalent to the rates hereinbefore prescribed, the fees shall be those applicable in the United Kingdom and shall be converted to Hong Kong currency at the rate of eighty cents to one English shilling.

Power to issue documents.

- 9.** The Immigration Officer may, upon payment of the prescribed fees, issue to any person, for the purposes of travel in respect of any proposed journey to or from the Colony and for his identification upon such journey, a certificate of identity or an emergency certificate.

Power to issue entry permits.

- 10.** (1) The Immigration Officer may issue to any person an entry permit and, in any case in which he decides so to do, such permit shall be issued free of charge to persons in transit through the Colony and to others on payment of the prescribed fee.

- (2) The issue of an entry permit may be effected by stamping a travel document and by inserting therein the period during which such permit shall be valid and any condition which the Immigration Officer may lawfully impose.

- 11.** The Immigration Officer may, upon payment of the prescribed fee, issue a certificate of identity to alien residents to enable them to prove their identity within the Colony.

Power to issue certificates of residence.

- 12.** The Immigration Officer may, upon payment of the prescribed fee, issue to any person a frontier pass which shall be sufficient authority within the Colony for such person to cross and re-cross the land frontier of the Colony and the limits of its territorial waters as may be specified in such pass.

Power to issue frontier passes.

- 13.** (1) The Immigration Officer may, upon payment of the prescribed fee, issue to any person a re-entry permit as in the form in the Fifth Schedule which shall be valid for such period not exceeding twelve months as may be specified thereon.

Power to issue re-entry permits.

- (2) Such re-entry permit shall be sufficient authority within the Colony for the person described therein to re-enter the Colony on any number of occasions during the period of the validity of such permit.

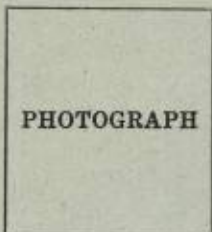

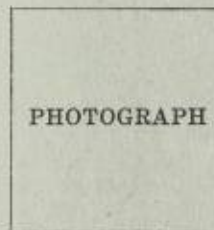

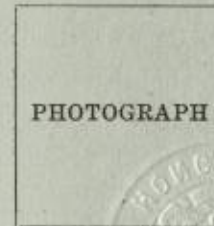

**FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL UNDERTAKINGS (AMENDMENT) (No. 2)
REGULATIONS, 1958.**

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Factories and Industrial Undertakings Ordinance, 1955, the Commissioner of Labour has made the following regulations—

1. These regulations may be cited as the Factories and Industrial Undertakings (Amendment) (No. 2) Regulations, 1958, and shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1959. Citation and commencement.
2. Regulation 9 of the Factories and Industrial Undertakings Regulations, 1955 (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations) is amended by the deletion therefrom of paragraph (3) and the substitution therefor of the following— Amendment of regulation 9. (G.N.A. 103/55).

“(3) No proprietor shall change, or cause or permit to be changed, any period of employment or interval for meals or rest fixed by notice posted under paragraph (1), or fixed by a notice deemed, by virtue of the provisions of this paragraph, to have been posted under paragraph (1), unless, not less than forty eight hours before any change of any such period of employment or any such interval for meals or rest is to come into operation, he has served on the Commissioner a notice in writing of intention to make such change and has posted, in the manner prescribed by paragraph (1), a notice in the form prescribed for the purposes of that paragraph, which shall, in addition to specifying the new period of employment or new interval for meals or rest, or both, as the case may be, and the other matters required by paragraph (1), specify the date on which such change is to commence, and, upon the coming into operation of such change, the notice posted in accordance with this paragraph shall be deemed to have been posted under paragraph (1):

Provided that no such change shall, in any event, be made more often than once in every three months, unless for special cause allowed in writing by the Commissioner.”.

Explanatory Note.

(This Note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general purport).

The necessity for the amendments, all of which are of a purely technical nature, made by these regulations to the Factories and Industrial Undertakings Regulations, 1955 (the principal regulations) has come to light in the course of preparation of the forms to be prescribed under the provisions of regulation 10E of the principal regulations.

2. Paragraph (3) of regulation 9 of the principal regulations requires, *inter alia*, that, when the proprietor of an industrial undertaking intends to change the period of employment or the interval for meals or rest fixed by notice under paragraph (1) of that regulation, he shall give notice of his intention to make such change to the Commissioner and to his employees. It is now considered that a mere notice of intention to make such change is not of any real assistance to the employees. It is desired, therefore, to provide that the proprietor shall, in lieu of giving such notice of intention to the employees, post a notice in the form prescribed for the purposes of paragraph (1) of regulation 9, which shall specify the new period of employment or the new interval for meals or rest and the other matters required by paragraph (1) to be specified, and shall, in addition, specify the day on which such change is to come into operation. It is also desired that the notice to the Commissioner of intention to make any such change shall be sent, and the notice now required to be posted in the industrial undertaking shall be posted, not less than forty eight hours before such change is to come into operation. Regulation 2 of these regulations makes the necessary provisions, and also provides that a notice posted in accordance with paragraph (3) of regulation 9 shall, upon the coming into operation of such change, be deemed to have been posted under paragraph (1) thereof. This will obviate the necessity for the employer to post a further notice in order to comply with paragraph (1) of regulation 9.

3. The object of the amendment made by regulation 3 of these regulations to regulation 10 of the principal regulations is to make it clear that more than one form and more than one register may be prescribed for the purposes of sub-paragraph (b) of paragraph (3) of regulation 10. Thus, for example, if, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph (9) of regulation 10, the Commissioner permits overtime to be calculated by reference to the individual, it will, for obvious reasons, be necessary to prescribe a form of register different from that which will be prescribed if overtime is to be calculated by reference to the undertaking. It is considered that this is not entirely clear as the regulation stands and this amendment seeks to remove any doubt in the matter.

4. The amendments made by regulation 4 to the principal regulations are twofold. Firstly, to correct a minor drafting error. As paragraph (1) of regulation 10A stands, it does not apply to young persons of sixteen years of age. It was always intended that it should so apply and the regulation has been amended accordingly.

The second amendment made to regulation 10A of the principal regulations by regulation 4 of these regulations is part and parcel of the amendment made by regulation 5 thereof to regulation 10D of the principal regulations. In preparing the form of the register to be prescribed for the purposes of regulation 10D, it has been decided that, if the register is to be of any real practical assistance, it must contain, *inter alia*, a photograph and the serial number of each woman and young person employed in the undertaking. The object of the amendment made by regulation 5 is to expand the provisions of regulation 10D in order to make clear the matters which may be prescribed under regulation 10E. Since the register to be kept pursuant to the provisions of regulation 10D will be in this form, it is considered that it is unnecessary for an employer to keep the separate registers, required by sub-paragraph (f) of paragraph (2) of regulation 10A, of women and young persons employed on a scheme of shift work. That sub-paragraph has, accordingly, been deleted.

POST OFFICE (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS, 1958.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 3 of the Post Office Ordinance, the Governor in Council has made the following regulations—

1. These regulations may be cited as the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, 1958, and shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1959. Citation and commencement.

2. Regulation 15 of the Post Office Regulations is rescinded and replaced by the following— Rescission and replacement of regulation 15.

"15. (1) Subject to the provisions of this regulation, the Postmaster General may let private boxes or provide private bag services to any person applying therefor on payment in advance of the following annual fees in respect of each such box or bag service— (Vol. IX, p. 133).

(2) Every private box shall be let or bag service provided for an initial period of not less than twelve months with effect from the first day of the month in which the box is supplied or the service provided, and such letting or service shall thereafter be renewable at the discretion of the Postmaster General for further periods of—

- (a) twelve months at a time upon payment of the annual rent prescribed in paragraph (1) seven days before the date of expiry of the current period; or
- (b) three months at a time upon payment of one quarter of the rent prescribed in paragraph (1) seven days before the date of expiry of the current period.

(3) With the consent of the Postmaster General any private box service may be let jointly to two or more persons, and in every such case the fee for such service shall be seventy-five per cent of the fee prescribed by paragraphs (1) and (2) and shall be payable by each such person.

(4) (a) The Postmaster General shall supply free of charge to every lessee of a private box one key thereto and, on application and payment of a fee of five dollars for each key, such additional keys as may be required, and no key other than those supplied by the Postmaster General shall be used with any such box.


(b) The applicant for every private bag service shall supply to the Postmaster General for use in such service two bags each bag to be fitted with a lock, one key to which shall be delivered to the Postmaster General for retention by him during the continuance of such service.

(5) Every key supplied for use with any private box shall remain the property of the Postmaster General and shall be returnable to him on termination of the rental of the box in question; and every key supplied to the Postmaster General for use with any private bag service shall remain the property of the supplier thereof and shall be returnable by the Postmaster General on request by the supplier or on termination of the service.

(6) Where during the currency of any rental period any lessee of a private box requires that the lock thereof be changed, the Postmaster General—

- (a) upon application in writing; and
- (b) upon payment of the sum of fifteen dollars; and
- (c) upon return of every key supplied for use therewith, or payment of the sum of five dollars in lieu for each such key not returned,

shall cause such lock to be changed for another lock and shall supply therewith, free of charge, one key to each lessee of such box.".

The purpose of these regulations is to amend regulation 15 of the Post Office Regulations which deals with the letting of private boxes and to introduce provision for private bag services.

2. The effect of these regulations will be to increase the annual fees payable for boxes and prescribe an annual fee of thirty six dollars for bag services. Provision is also made for the supply of boxes and bags and the keys therefor. These regulations will abolish monthly hirings of boxes and will provide that all hirings shall be for not less than one year in the first instance renewable thereafter at the discretion of the Postmaster General, either annually or three monthly. Similar provision is made in the case of bag services. Provision is also made for the sharing of boxes by different addressees if desired.

VEHICLE AND ROAD TRAFFIC (PARKING AND WAITING)
REGULATIONS, 1958.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 5 of the Road Traffic Ordinance, 1957, the Governor in Council has made the following regulations—

PART I.

Citation and interpretation.

Citation. 1. These regulations may be cited as the Vehicle and Road Traffic (Parking and Waiting) Regulations, 1958.

Interpretation. 2. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—

“attendant” means a person appointed to be an attendant at a car park in accordance with the provisions of regulation 22;

“car park” means a place designated by the Commissioner as a car park in accordance with the provisions of regulation 19;

“cleaner’s permit” means a permit issued by the Commissioner in accordance with the provisions of regulation 16;

“Council” means the Urban Council;

“Director” means the Director of Urban Services;

“monthly pass” means a pass issued in accordance with the provisions of regulation 23;

“parking meter” means an apparatus constructed and designed to receive and indicate payment for the use of a space in a parking place for the purpose of parking a motor vehicle, and such apparatus shall be of such design and construction as shall have been approved by the Commissioner and shall be maintained to his satisfaction;

“parking place” means a place designated by the Commissioner in accordance with the provisions of regulation 4 as a place where vehicles may wait or be parked;

“register” means a register in such form as shall be prescribed in the case of a Council car park by the Council and in the case of a non-Council car park by the Commissioner, in which an attendant shall enter the registration mark of motor vehicles in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (3) of regulation 24;

“ticket” means a ticket issued to the driver of a motor vehicle in accordance with the provisions of regulation 25;

“warning instrument” means any instrument fitted to or carried on or in a vehicle for audibly signalling its approach or presence.

PART II.

Restriction of parking and waiting in roads.

3. (1) No person shall park any vehicle or cause or permit any vehicle to wait in any place on any road or length of road on which there is a parking place and a system of street lighting furnished by means of lamps not more than two hundred yards apart other than in a parking place or in a car park. Restriction on parking and waiting.

(2) No person shall park any vehicle or cause or permit any vehicle to wait on any road within fifty feet of a place set aside under any enactment as an omnibus or bus stop, if such stop is on the same side of the road on which such vehicle is parked.

(3) The provisions of paragraph (1) are in addition to and not in derogation of the provisions of any other enactment.

4. (1) The Commissioner may designate any place on any road as a place where vehicles may wait or be parked and may appropriate the use of such parking place for any particular period or to any particular class or type of vehicle, and may revoke or amend or temporarily suspend the operation of any such designation. Designation of parking places.

(2) The Commissioner may indicate the designation of a parking place by the delineation of a continuous or intermittent white line or by the placing of studs in the road so as to enclose the parking place on all sides by which access may be lawfully obtained for a vehicle.

(3) A parking place may be divided into spaces, each to accommodate one vehicle of the class or type to which use of the parking place is limited, by white lines or by studs.

First Schedule, diagram Number 1.

(4) The Commissioner may cause to be erected at the end of the parking place nearest to the oncoming traffic a sign in accordance with diagram Number 1 in the First Schedule, and if the use of the parking place is limited in any way including limitations as to the use of such parking place by vehicles of a particular class or type there shall be attached to the post on which the sign is mounted a notice showing the type of vehicle permitted to use the parking place and containing conditions relating to the use of the parking place.

(5) Any place which at the date of coming into force of these regulations has been set aside as a place where vehicles may be parked or may wait in accordance with the provisions of any enactment then in force shall be deemed to have been designated in accordance with the provisions of this regulation so long as it is delineated in accordance with the provisions of such enactment.

(6) The exercise by the Commissioner of his functions under this regulation shall not render him subject to any liability in respect of the loss or damage to any vehicle in a parking place or to the contents of any such vehicle.

Parking of fire brigade vehicles, etc.

5. (1) The Commissioner may designate by the delineation of appropriate lines and the erection of appropriate signs any place on any road for the exclusive use of vehicles used for any particular purpose including fire brigade vehicles, vehicles used solely for the conveyance of public mail, vehicles used solely by the armed forces of the Crown or ambulances.

(2) No person shall park any vehicle or cause or permit any vehicle to wait in any place which has been designated in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (1) unless such vehicle is of the kind for which such place was designated.

Offences in relation to parking places.

6. (1) No person shall park any vehicle or cause or permit a vehicle to wait in any parking place in contravention of any sign or signal lawfully erected at or near such parking place for the direction of vehicles in the parking place or for the designation of the type or class of vehicle which may be parked in the parking place.

(2) No person shall park any vehicle or cause or permit a vehicle to wait in a parking place in such a manner that the vehicle unnecessarily projects over any line which divides the space in which the vehicle is parked from any other space.

(3) No person shall park any taxi or cause or permit any taxi to wait in any place other than a place set aside as a place in which taxis may wait or be parked.

7. (1) If the Commissioner temporarily suspends the designation of a parking place in accordance with the provisions of regulation 4, he shall indicate such suspension by the erection at the parking place of appropriate signs.

Removal of vehicles from suspended parking places.

(2) No person shall park any vehicle or cause or permit any vehicle to wait or remain in any parking place the operation of which is suspended in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (1) of regulation 4.

(3) Any police officer in uniform of the rank of sub-inspector or above may take away or cause to be taken away any vehicle found in any such parking place during any such suspension to a place of safety, there to be detained until released by order of the Commissioner or by an order of a court or magistrate in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (4).

(4) Where a vehicle is detained in accordance with the provisions of this regulation and proceedings have been taken in respect of a contravention of paragraph (2) the court or magistrate in such proceedings may order that the vehicle be released and in any such order may require that such sum as the court or magistrate considers to be sufficient to repay the reasonable expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of paragraph (3) shall be paid to the Commissioner as directed by the court or magistrate before the vehicle is released.

(5) Where a vehicle is detained in accordance with the provisions of this regulation, and no order has been made under paragraph (4) the Commissioner may detain the vehicle until the reasonable expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of paragraph (3) have been repaid to him.

(6) When a vehicle is detained in accordance with the provisions of this regulation the Commissioner with all reasonable despatch shall give notice in writing to the owner, if the name and address of such owner is known to him, of the seizure

and if such vehicle is not claimed by the owner within three months of the date of its detention the Commissioner thereafter may sell by public auction or otherwise dispose of such vehicle and may apply the proceeds, if any, from the sale or disposal of the vehicle—

- (a) in payment of any vehicle licence fees which may be due in respect of the vehicle;
- (b) in payment of any charges incurred in carrying out the provisions of these regulations;
- (c) in payment of any damage caused to any property of Government by the unlawful use of such vehicle,

and any surplus remaining thereof shall be transferred to the general revenue of the Colony at the expiry of twelve months from the date of such sale or disposal if not previously claimed by the owner of the vehicle.

Erection of signs. First Schedule, diagrams Numbers 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 or 8.

8. (1) The Commissioner by the erection of signs in accordance with diagrams Numbers 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 or 8 in the First Schedule may restrict the use of any road or part of any road.

(2) When any such signs are erected, they shall be placed in such manner that the signs in accordance with diagrams Numbers 2, 3, 5, 6 and 7 in the First Schedule shall face the traffic entering the road or part of a road to be restricted by such signs, and the sign in accordance with diagram Number 8 in the First Schedule may be attached to any of the signs in accordance with diagrams Numbers 2, 3, 5, 6 and 7 to indicate the extent and direction in which waiting is restricted or prohibited.

(3) Where the circumstances require, the times, wording and the direction of any arrow on the sign shown in diagrams Numbers 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 may be varied to accord with the restrictions imposed.

(4) Where, on a road, any of the signs in accordance with the diagrams in the First Schedule imposes a prohibition or restriction over a length of road greater than two hundred and fifty yards, the Commissioner shall erect at intervals not greater than one hundred and fifty yards, appropriate signs in accordance with such diagrams further to indicate the restriction or prohibition imposed on that road.

(5) Every sign in accordance with the diagrams in the First Schedule shall be mounted on or attached to—

- (a) a post specially provided for the purpose, and every such post shall be painted in alternate black and yellow horizontal bands each band being twelve inches in width; or
- (b) a lamp or other standard which in either case may be painted with one or more yellow bands each band being not less than twelve inches in width.

9. (1) Where signs in accordance with diagrams Numbers 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6 in the First Schedule are erected in a road, no person shall park any vehicle or cause or permit any vehicle to wait on the side of the road on which the sign is erected, during such days and hours as are prescribed in the notice or, if none are prescribed, at any time:

Significance of signs. First Schedule, diagrams Numbers 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6.

Provided that this paragraph shall not apply if the driver of the vehicle is prevented from proceeding by circumstances beyond his control.

(2) Where a sign in accordance with diagram Number 7 in the First Schedule is erected in a road, no person shall park any vehicle or cause or permit any vehicle to wait on that road—

First Schedule, diagram Number 7.

- (a) except on the side of the road on which such sign indicates that waiting is permitted and in any case for not longer than such time as is indicated in the sign; or
- (b) if a period of less than forty minutes has elapsed since the termination of the last period of waiting, if any, of the vehicle on the road or part of a road the use of which is so restricted.

10. Nothing in regulation 9 shall apply—

Exemption from restrictions.

- (a) so as to restrict the use of any vehicle in connexion with any building operation, demolition, or excavation, the removal of any obstruction to traffic, the maintenance, improvement or reconstruction of any road or the erection, alteration or repair in or near to any road of any sewer or any main, pipe or apparatus for the supply of gas, water, or electricity, or of any telephone or rediffusion

wires, cables, posts or supports if the motor vehicle cannot be conveniently put to such use outside the period of restriction;

- (b) to fire brigade vehicles, ambulances, police vehicles, vehicles used for the conveyance of public mail, or vehicles used by the armed forces of the Crown when any such vehicles are being used as a matter of urgent necessity in any road so restricted;
- (c) to any public omnibus while waiting at an authorized stopping place or at a turning or terminal point;
- (d) to any vehicle parked in a parking place;
- (e) to any taxi waiting in a part of a road set aside for taxis; or
- (f) to anything done with the permission of a police officer in uniform.

PART III.

Control of parking places.

Erection of parking meters.

11. (1) On any Crown land set aside by the Governor for parking or at any parking place, the Commissioner may cause to be erected parking meters for the purpose of charging for the parking of motor vehicles between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. on any Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and between the hours of 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. on any Saturday, not being in either case a public holiday.

(2) In any proceedings under this Part of these regulations, every parking meter so erected shall be deemed at the relevant time, to have been of such design and construction as shall have been approved by the Commissioner and to have been maintained to his satisfaction until the contrary is proved.

Conduct of drivers at parking meters.

12. (1) When the driver of a motor vehicle wishes to park his motor vehicle in a space in a parking place in respect of which there is erected a parking meter, he shall drive his vehicle into such space and, as soon as is practicable thereafter he shall insert or cause to be inserted in such parking meter a coin of the denomination stipulated in the Second Schedule and on the parking meter (hereinafter referred to as an appropriate coin) and shall comply with such directions as are exhibited on such parking meter.

Second Schedule.

(2) The insertion of the appropriate coin in a parking meter shall be payment for the use of such space for the motor vehicle then in it for the period, from the time of such insertion, set forth in the Second Schedule :

Provided that nothing in these regulations shall entitle a person to park or to permit to remain any vehicle in a space in a parking place at which there is a parking meter whilst the designation of such parking place is temporarily suspended by the Commissioner in accordance with the provisions of regulation 4.

(3) All monies collected from parking meters shall be paid into the general revenue of the Colony.

13. (1) No person shall park or cause or permit to be parked or to remain any vehicle during the hours prescribed in paragraph (1) of regulation 11 in a space in a parking place in respect of which there is a parking meter unless the parking meter in respect of such space is exhibiting a sign indicating that payment has been made for the use of such space in the parking place :

Parking without payment.

Provided that this paragraph shall not apply to a vehicle while it is being driven into the parking place and for such period thereafter as shall be necessary to enable the driver of the vehicle to comply with the provisions of paragraph (1) of regulation 12.

(2) On any contravention of the provisions of this regulation the owner of the vehicle and the person who left the vehicle in the parking place shall be guilty of an offence :

Provided that it shall be a good defence to any charge under this regulation to prove that an appropriate coin was inserted in the parking meter and, if the parking meter had been working satisfactorily the indication referred to in paragraph (1) would have been displayed but that owing to a defect in the parking meter, no such indication was displayed.

14. (1) No person shall unlawfully interfere with any parking meter or operate or attempt to operate a parking meter by the insertion of any object other than an appropriate coin.

Offences in relation to parking meters.

(2) No person without lawful authority shall remove or attempt to remove any money from a parking meter.

No repairs in parking places and car parks.

15. No person shall carry out on a vehicle in a parking place or car park any maintenance or repair or be in a parking place or car park for the purpose of carrying out any such maintenance or repair:

Provided that it shall be a good defence to any proceedings under this regulation to prove that such maintenance or repairs were necessary to enable the vehicle to be removed from the parking place or car park.

Cleaning of motor vehicles.

16. (1) No person other than the owner thereof or a full time employee of the owner shall clean a vehicle in a parking place or car park or be in a parking place or car park for the purpose of cleaning the vehicle unless he is in possession of a cleaner's permit issued by the Commissioner.

(2) A person wishing to obtain the issue or renewal of a cleaner's permit shall deliver to the Commissioner an application therefor in such form as shall be prescribed by the Commissioner, duly completed and signed by the applicant, together with, in the case of an application for the issue of a cleaner's permit and, if required by the Commissioner, in the case of an application for renewal of a cleaner's permit, two copies of his photograph of a reasonable likeness to the satisfaction of the Commissioner and of a size not greater than 2" x 2" and not less than 1½" x 1½".

(3) On receipt of such application and of a fee of five dollars the Commissioner may issue or renew a cleaner's permit permitting the applicant to clean vehicles in a parking place or car park valid for a period of one year from the date of issue thereof or, in his absolute discretion, may refuse to grant such permit.

(4) The Commissioner may require an applicant for a cleaner's permit to permit an impression of his fingers to be taken in such manner as the Commissioner shall direct.

Conditions of cleaner's permit.

17. (1) A cleaner's permit shall be in such form as shall be prescribed by the Commissioner and shall be issued subject to the following conditions—

- (a) the holder shall duly comply with all directions and orders given to him by any police officer;
- (b) the holder is permitted to be within a parking place or car park only for the purpose of cleaning such vehicles as he shall have been authorized to clean by the owners thereof;

- (c) the holder shall not loiter in a parking place or car park;
- (d) the holder shall not without the permission of the driver or of the owner of a vehicle ride in or upon the vehicle or interfere with a vehicle;
- (e) the holder shall not obstruct or attempt to obstruct the driver of a vehicle;
- (f) the holder shall carry his cleaner's permit at all times and shall when called upon so to do produce it for inspection to any police officer.

(2) Any holder of a cleaner's permit who contravenes any of the above conditions or any other conditions upon which it was issued to him shall be guilty of an offence.

(3) The Commissioner, in his absolute discretion, may revoke the cleaner's permit issued to any person.

18. If for any reason a vehicle has remained in a parking place for more than two days, the Commissioner may cause the vehicle to be removed from the parking place and any vehicle so removed shall be deemed to have been removed in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (3) of regulation 7 and paragraphs (5) and (6) of that regulation shall apply to any vehicle so removed.

Removal of vehicles from parking places after two days.

PART IV.

Car Parks.

19. (1) The Commissioner may by notification published in the *Gazette* designate any place, not on a carriageway, as a car park and in such notification may limit the use of such car park to any particular class or type of motor vehicle, and by notification published in the *Gazette* may revoke or amend any such designation.

Designation of car parks.

(2) The provisions of paragraphs (2) and (6) of regulation 4 shall apply to any place designated as a car park in the same manner as those paragraphs apply to places designated as parking places.

(3) Any place designated in accordance with the provisions of this regulation shall be deemed to be a road for the purpose of the application thereto of the Road Traffic Ordinance, 1957, and of any regulation made thereunder.

(39 of 1957).

Signs at
car parks.

20. (1) The Commissioner shall cause to be erected at, in and outside every car park such signs as he shall deem necessary for the regulation of parking therein and in particular signs indicating the place where motor vehicles may enter the car park and the type or class of motor vehicle which is permitted to be parked in the car park.

(2) The Commissioner shall cause the car park to be divided up in such manner as he shall consider necessary into spaces for the accommodation of vehicles.

Allocation
of car
parks.

21. (1) On the designation of a car park in accordance with the provisions of regulation 19, the Governor may direct that either—

- (a) the management of the car park shall be vested in the Council who shall be responsible, by the employment of such members of the Urban Services Department as shall be made available for that purpose, for the collection of all fees payable for the use of the car park and all such fees shall be paid into the general revenue of the Colony; or
- (b) the management of the car park shall be put up for public tender and vested in such person as the Colonial Secretary shall decide in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (2); or
- (c) the management of the car park shall be vested in such other person as the Governor may direct.

(2) If in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (1) the Governor directs that the management of a car park shall be put up for public tender the Colonial Secretary may vest the management of the car park in any person tendering for such upon such terms and conditions as the Colonial Secretary shall consider appropriate.

Attendants.

22. (1) In the case of a car park (hereinafter referred to as a Council car park) the management of which has been vested in the Council in accordance with the provisions of sub-paragraph (a) of paragraph (1) of regulation 21 every attendant shall—

- (a) be appointed by the Director;
- (b) wear such uniform and display such badge as may be prescribed;

(c) carry such evidence, under the hand of the Secretary of the Council, of his appointment as an attendant as shall be prescribed by the Director.

(2) In the case of a car park (hereinafter referred to as a non-Council car park) the management of which has been vested in a person other than the Council in accordance with the provisions of sub-paragraph (b) or (c) of paragraph (1) of regulation 21 every attendant shall—

- (a) be appointed by the successful tenderer or other person subject to the approval of the Commissioner;
- (b) wear such uniform as shall be approved by the Commissioner; and
- (c) carry such evidence under the hand of the successful tenderer or other person, of his appointment as an attendant as shall be prescribed by the Commissioner.

(3) Every attendant in a car park shall produce to any person in a car park having reasonable grounds for asking for the same, such evidence of his appointment as is hereinbefore referred to.

23. (1) The driver of every motor vehicle using a car park shall pay, for the use of the car park, the appropriate fee set forth in the Third Schedule unless he is in possession of a valid monthly pass in respect of that motor vehicle, issued in accordance with the provisions of this regulation.

Payment
for use of a
car park.
Third
Schedule.

(2) On demand by any person and on payment of the appropriate fee set forth in the Third Schedule, the person in whom the right to operate a car park is vested in accordance with the provisions of regulation 21 may issue to such person a monthly pass in such form as, in the case of a Council car park, shall be prescribed by the Council or, in the case of a non-Council car park, shall be approved in writing by the Commissioner.

(3) A monthly pass shall entitle the driver of such motor vehicle as is prescribed in the monthly pass to park that motor vehicle, subject to the provisions of paragraph (5) of regulation 25, at any time during the currency of the monthly pass, in such car parks as are set forth in the monthly pass if space is available in any such car park for the due parking of the motor vehicle.

(4) The issue of a monthly pass shall not provide any guarantee that parking space for the motor vehicle shall be available in any of the car parks set forth in the monthly pass or in any particular car park.

(5) A monthly pass shall be valid for a period not exceeding one calendar month, expiring on the last day of a month.

(6) The driver of a motor vehicle shall cause to be displayed on the motor vehicle the monthly pass in respect thereof in the same manner as a vehicle licence is required to be displayed by regulation 21 of the Vehicle and Road Traffic (Registration and Licensing of Vehicles) Regulations, 1956, at all times when the motor vehicle is in a car park by virtue of such monthly pass.

Conduct and
duties of
attendants.

24. (1) No attendant shall permit a motor vehicle to enter a car park until a ticket has been issued in respect of the motor vehicle in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (1) of regulation 25 or unless a valid monthly pass is exhibited in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (6) of regulation 23.

(2) No attendant shall permit a motor vehicle other than a motor vehicle which is being removed in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (5) of regulation 25 to leave a car park until the lower half of a ticket or of a replacement ticket in respect of the motor vehicle has been surrendered in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (3) of regulation 25 unless a valid monthly pass is exhibited on the motor vehicle in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (6) of regulation 23.

(3) At 8 o'clock each morning an attendant on duty in a car park shall enter in a register, the registration mark of every motor vehicle in the car park at such time and, in the case of a motor vehicle exhibiting a valid monthly pass, that fact, and shall date and sign such register and such register shall be retained at the car park for not less than two months from the date thereof and, in the calculation of any fees payable under these regulations, such register completed and signed by an attendant shall be *prima facie* evidence that the motor vehicles whose registration marks are recorded in the register were in the car park at the date and time set forth on the register.

Conduct at
car parks.

25. (1) When the driver of a motor vehicle wishes to park his motor vehicle in a car park he shall drive the motor vehicle to the entrance of the car park and if his motor vehicle can be accommodated in such car park the attendant may issue to him a ticket on which shall be marked the number of his motor vehicle and the time at which the motor vehicle entered the car park :

Provided that no ticket shall be necessary for a motor vehicle on which is exhibited a valid monthly pass in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (6) of regulation 23.

(2) The driver, to whom a ticket has been issued in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (1) shall retain the ticket referred to in paragraph (1) and on the return to the car park of the driver, or any person who produces such ticket, to remove the motor vehicle, such person shall present the ticket at such place as shall be provided in the car park, at which place the ticket shall be marked with the time of presentation and the fee incurred between that time and the time of entry marked on the ticket and, on demand, such person shall pay such fee.

(3) After the person has paid the fee in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (2) he shall remove his motor vehicle from the car park as soon as is practicable thereafter and in any case within fifteen minutes of the latest time marked on the ticket and, on leaving the car park, shall surrender the lower half of his ticket or of his replacement ticket issued in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (2) or (3) of regulation 26 to the attendant at the exit from the car park :

Provided that if the motor vehicle is not removed from the car park within fifteen minutes of the latest time marked on the ticket, it shall not be permitted to be removed until a further payment at the rate of one dollar for each hour or part of an hour shall have been paid for all time in excess of such period of fifteen minutes during which the motor vehicle has been permitted to remain in the car park.

(4) If a motor vehicle is left in a car park while a valid monthly pass is duly exhibited on the motor vehicle but is not removed from the car park until after the date of expiry of the monthly pass no attendant, except in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (5), shall permit the motor vehicle to be removed from the car park until a replacement ticket or valid monthly pass has been obtained in respect thereof, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (3) of regulation 26.

(5) If for any reason a motor vehicle remains in a car park for more than fourteen consecutive days the Commissioner may cause the motor vehicle to be removed from the car park and any motor vehicle so removed shall be deemed to have been removed in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (3) of regulation 7 and paragraphs (5) and (6) of that regulation shall apply to any motor vehicle so removed.

Loss of ticket.

26. (1) For the purposes of this regulation "a daily parking period" (hereinafter referred to as the period) means a period extending from 8.00 o'clock in the morning of one day to 8.00 o'clock in the morning of the following day.

(2) If at any time during a daily parking period any person wishes to remove a motor vehicle from a car park but is unable to produce the ticket issued in respect of such vehicle, he may remove such vehicle if he satisfies an attendant that such a ticket was issued to him or that he is authorized to remove such vehicle by the person to whom such ticket was issued, provided that he shall, subject to the provisions of paragraph (3), pay the fee for a replacement ticket calculated in the following manner—

- (a) if the registration mark of such vehicle does not appear in the register at the commencement of such period, it shall be presumed that such vehicle has remained in the car park since the commencement of such period; or
- (b) if the registration mark of such vehicle does appear in the register at the commencement of such period, but not in the register at the commencement of the period immediately preceding such period, it shall be presumed that such vehicle has remained in the car park since the commencement of the period before such period; or
- (c) if the registration mark of such vehicle does appear in the register at the commencement of such period and of one or more periods immediately preceding such period, it shall be presumed that such vehicle has remained in the car park since the commencement of the period before the first of the preceding periods.

(3) If a motor vehicle was parked in the car park while it was exhibiting a valid monthly pass but is not removed from the car park before the date of expiry of the monthly pass, on application by any person wishing to remove the motor vehicle and on payment of the appropriate fee for the period since the expiry of the monthly pass, a replacement ticket shall be issued to such person :

Provided that the provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to any person who obtains a new valid monthly pass before he removes his car from the car park.

Offences by drivers.

27. (1) The driver of a motor vehicle in a car park shall obey all lawful directions given to him by an attendant.

(2) The driver of a motor vehicle in a car park shall obey all signs and signals exhibited in the car park for the direction or regulation of motor vehicles therein.

(3) When a motor vehicle has been parked in a car park, the driver and all passengers thereof shall leave the car park as soon as is practicable thereafter by such means of exit from the car park as is indicated by signs displayed for that purpose.

(4) On demand the driver of a motor vehicle shall give his name and address to an attendant.

(5) No person shall sound a warning instrument in a car park.

(6) No person shall park a motor vehicle in a car park in such manner that the motor vehicle unnecessarily projects over any line or other mark which divides the space in which the motor vehicle is parked from any other place.

(7) No person shall remove a motor vehicle from a car park, otherwise than in accordance with paragraph (5) of regulation 25 unless the appropriate fee has been paid in respect of the motor vehicle or the motor vehicle is duly displaying a valid monthly pass in respect thereof in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (6) of regulation 23.

28. (1) No person other than—

- (a) an attendant or any person employed at the car park in the course of his duties;
- (b) a police officer in the course of his duties;
- (c) a person driving a motor vehicle into the car park or a person coming to the car park to remove a vehicle therefrom;
- (d) a passenger in a motor vehicle entering a car park or a person intending to leave the car park as a passenger in a motor vehicle;
- (e) a person authorized to clean motor vehicles in accordance with the provisions of regulation 16,

Offences in relation to car parks.

shall enter a car park or any part thereof without having first obtained the permission of an attendant on duty at the entrance to the car park.

(2) No person shall smoke within a car park.

(3) No person shall walk in any part of a car park reserved exclusively for the passage of motor vehicles.

(4) No person shall remain in a car park after he has been lawfully ordered to leave the car park by an attendant.

(5) No person, without lawful authority, shall mutilate, deface or alter any ticket.

(6) No person, without lawful authority, shall tamper with or interfere with a motor vehicle in a car park.

Car cleaners.

29. (1) The Colonial Secretary may grant to any person upon such terms as he shall consider appropriate the exclusive right to contract with the owners of motor vehicles using a non-Council car park for the cleaning of their motor vehicles, upon such terms and conditions as he shall consider appropriate.

(2) The granting of such right shall be upon condition that—

(a) such person shall employ in such work only persons holding a cleaner's permit; and

(b) the fees charged for such cleaning shall not exceed such fees as may be prescribed by the Colonial Secretary.

(3) No such person or employee of such person shall interfere with or otherwise tamper with any motor vehicle unless he is duly authorized to do so by the registered owner of the motor vehicle.

(4) The Government shall not be responsible for nor shall accept any liability in respect of any injury or damage caused to any motor vehicle or to any person or thing by any person to whom such right as is referred to in paragraph (1) has been given in respect of a car park or by any person in the employ of such person.

PART V.

Offences, penalties and repeal.

Offences and penalties.

30. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of regulation 3, 5, 6, 9, 13, 14, 15, 27, 28, paragraph (2) of regulation 7, paragraph (1) of regulation 16, paragraph (2) of regulation 17, paragraphs (1) and (6) of regulation 23, paragraph (3) of regulation 25, or paragraph (3) of regulation 29, shall be guilty of an offence and, on summary conviction, shall be liable to a fine of five hundred dollars.

Rescission of parts of the "Vehicles and Traffic Regulation".

31. Regulations 19, 144, 187, 188 and 189 of the regulations headed "Vehicles and Traffic Regulation" appearing on pages 723 to 816 of Volume II of the Regulations of Hong Kong (1937 Edition) are rescinded.

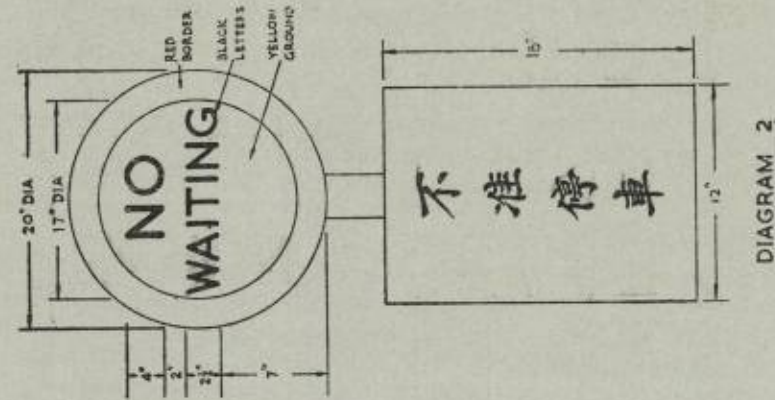


DIAGRAM 2

FIRST SCHEDULE. SIGNS.

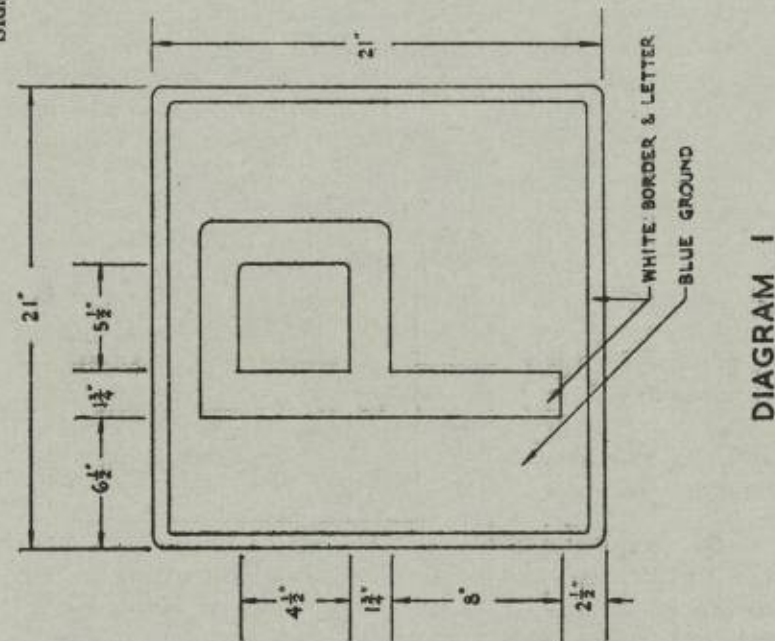

In exercise of the power conferred upon him by subsections (1) and (2) of section 1 and by section 3 of the Supplies and Services (Transitional Powers) Act, 1945, as extended and applied to the Colony by the Supplies and Services (Transitional Powers) (Colonies, etc.) Order in Council, 1946, the Governor has made the following Order—

1. This Order may be cited as the Defence Regulations (Revocation) Order, 1958. Citation.

2. All the Defence Regulations in force immediately before the coming into operation of this Order by virtue of the Defence Regulations (Continuation and Modification) (No. 1) Order, 1948, save those enactments set forth in the Schedule to the Defence Regulations (Continuation) Ordinance, 1958, are revoked. Revocation of Defence Regulations. (G.N.A. 265/48).

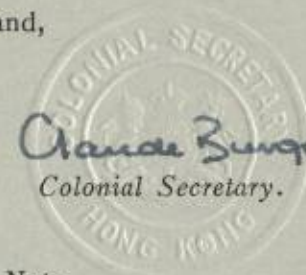
