JUDGMENTS (FACILITIES FOR ENFORCEMENT) ORDINANCE, 1921.

By His Excellency Sir REGINALD EDWARD STUBBS, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same:

Whereas it is provided by section 6 of the Judgments (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance 1921 that where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the legislature of any part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom for the enforcement within that part of His Majesty's dominions of judgments obtained in the Supreme Court the Governor may by order in council declare that the said Ordinance shall extend to judgments obtained in a superior court in that part of His Majesty's dominions in the like manner as it extends to judgments obtained in a superior court in the United Kingdom and that on any such order being made the said Ordinance shall apply accordingly:

And whereas I am satisfied that such reciprocal provisions have been made by the legislature of New South Wales:

Now therefore I, Sir REGINALD EDWARD STUBBS, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same do hereby by this order in council do declare that the said Ordinance shall extend to judgments obtained in superior courts in New South Wales.

By His Excellency Sir REGINALD EDWARD STUBBS, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same :

Whereas by section 2 (1) of the Military Stores (Exportation) Ordinance, 1862, it is enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council, by proclamation, to prohibit, for such period as might be therein mentioned, either to be exported from the Colony or to be carried coastwise within the Colony, arms, ammunition, and gunpowder, military and naval stores, and any articles which the Governor might judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores :

And whereas it is expedient to prohibit such exportation and carriage coastwise :

Now therefore, I, Sir REGINALD EDWARD STUBBS, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same, with the advice of the Executive Council of this Colony do, by this Proclamation, prohibit for a period of one year from and including the 15th day of October, 1925, either to be exported from the Colony or to be carried coastwise within the Colony, arms, ammunition and gunpowder, and military and naval stores, unless this Proclamation shall, in the meantime, be revoked or unless permission shall have been obtained under section 4 of the Ordinance above-mentioned.

Whereas by the second section of the Commissioners Powers Ordinance, 1886, it is enacted that the Governor in Council shall have power to nominate and appoint Commissioners under the public seal for the purpose of instituting, making, and conducting any inquiry that may be deemed advisable and for reporting thereon :

And whereas the Governor in Council has deemed it advisable that an inquiry should be instituted, made, and conducted as to the circumstances under which the S.S. *Sunning* was on the 15th November, 1926, seized by pirates while on the voyage from Shanghai to Hong Kong ; and in particular :—

- (d) to consider the supply of armed guards, the number to be carried and their administration.

### The Asiatic Emigration Ordinance, 1915.

By His Excellency Sir CECIL CLEMENTI, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Hong Kong and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same :

Whereas it is provided by section 3 of the Chinese Passengers Act, 1855, that it shall be lawful for the Governor of Hong Kong by proclamation to alter the scales of dietary, medicines, and medical comforts contained in Schedule A to the said Act annexed :

And Whereas by Proclamation (No. 7 of 1904) of the 6th day of July, 1904, the Officer Administering the Government of Hong Kong altered the said scales contained in the said Schedule A :

And Whereas the said scales, altered as aforesaid, are now set forth in regulation 4 (9) in the Sixth Schedule to the Asiatic Emigration Ordinance, 1915, Ordinance No. 30 of 1915 :

And Whereas I am satisfied that the said scale of medicines should be again altered as hereinafter appears :

Now therefore I Sir CECIL CLEMENTI, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Hong Kong and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same, do hereby by this Proclamation alter the said scale of medicines in the manner appearing in the scale hereunder set forth, which scale shall, from and after the date hereof, be substituted for the said altered scale of medicines set forth in regulation 4 (9) in the said Sixth Schedule to the Asiatic Emigration Ordinance, 1915.

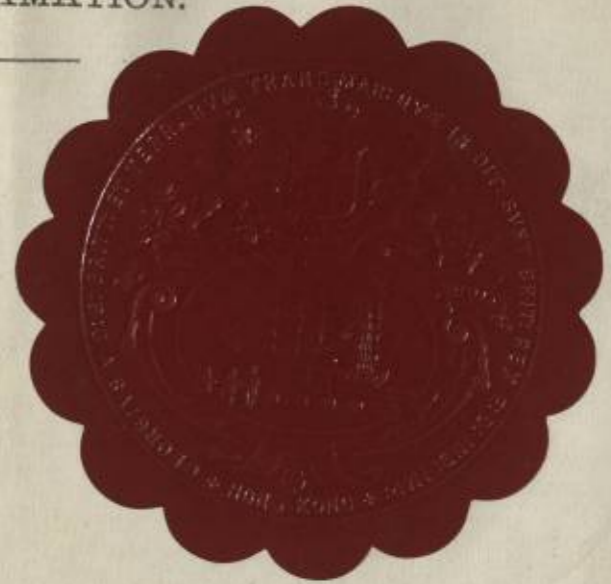




